Slated to Succeed Blair in Cabinet.

WITH PORTFOLIO OF MARINE AND FISHERIES.

Sutherland Probable Minister of Railways.

Ottawa, July 14.—While no official announcement has been made, there is no doubt that Hon. A. G. Blair has resigned. Gossip is already busy regarding his successor. Emmerson is most generally slated for a cabinet position, although some profess to believe that Costigan may be chosen.

The general belief is that Sutherland will be minister of railways and canals, Prefontaine minister of public works, and Emmerson, marine and fisheries.

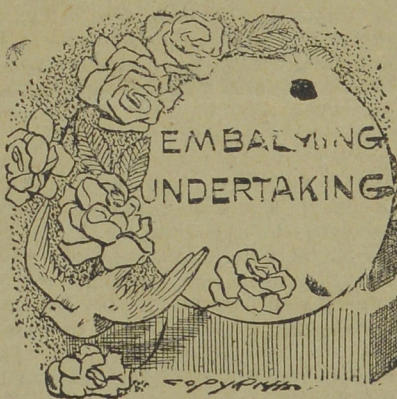
