IMAGINATIVE CORRESPONDENT.

The young man who serves up the Fredericton news for the Sun, when essaying to produce political paragraphs generally puts his foot in it. Not many months ago, several hours after Hon. H. A. McKeown had been sworn in solicitor general and had left for Ottawa on public business, the Sun correspondent wired that newspaper that there was a terrible row in the local government, and that Mr. McKeown, having failed to secure the portfolio which he was seeking, had rushed off to Ottawa to enlist the assistance of Mr. Blair that he might achieve his ambition. The Sun gravely announced the alleged crisis the next morning, when all the country learned from other newspapers that Mr. McKeown was already solicitor general. The Sun found it rather embarrassing to explain its correspondent's bad break, and the incident caused a great deal of amusement in newspaper and other circles at the time.

The Sun's young man since then has kept pretty well clear of political topics, but last night made another serious break. He represented to his paper that scores of Liberals in this city are known to be hostile to the government's railway policy, quoting an alleged prominent member of the party as authority for the statement. Without entering into details, the Herald takes the liberty of doubting that any prominent Liberal in Fredericton has given the Sun correspondent liberty to make the statement. The Liberals of this city are not in the habit of confiding their political opinions to the emissaries of the enemy, and moreover like a great many other people, they are willing to await the full official statement of the government railway policy before expressing a decided opinion on the subject. Doubtless efforts have already been made to prejudice the government's friends in the matter, but the Liberals of Fredericton who are thinking, intelligent men, do not readily jump at conclusions, nor form their political opinions from street talk and corner grocery gossip. No doubt the retirement of Mr. Blair from the cabinet and his opposition to the railway policy, has slightly confused Liberals all over Canada, and especially in his native province in which he has wielded such a large influence, but one swallow does not make a summer, nor does a single feature of a government's policy constitute the whole party program. Liberals may differ from the ministry on any given line of policy, yet retain their confidence in the government's general policy and administration. This, we believe, is the attitude of the ex-minister of railways himself, and it may be the feeling of some of his old time political supporters, when the railway proposals are definitely known and understood, but the Sun correspondent is taxing public credulity to an almost unlimited extent, when he represents that leading Liberals of this city are volunteering to him their intention of splitting with their party, and forecasting the downfall of the government.

MR. EMMERSON'S FUTURE.

Although a Tory newspaper is booming another gentleman for New Brunswick's position in the cabinet, the Liberals of this province are looking to Hon. H. R. Emmerson as the natural successor to Hon. A. G. Blair, and will hail with a great deal of satisfaction the elevation of the popular Westmorland M. P. Mr. Emmerson is a tried and true Liberal, and developed qualities of leadership and administration when in the local arena

that marked him as a gentleman certain to achieve honors in the wider field of federal politics.

He is respected and esteemed for his many admirable personal qualities, his rugged honesty of purpose, as well as for his fidelity and service to his party, and the Liberals of New Brunswick expect that his ability and claims on the party will be recognized when the Premier feels called upon to fill the vacant position in the cabinet.

It will be observed from an extract in another column, that our old friend, General Hutton, whose official career in Canada was not an unmixed pleasure stay, has been butting up against a journalist-militiaman in Australia, with results disastrous to the General, who has been severely snubbed by the Minister of Militia. The newspaper man very naturally objected to Hutton holding court martial on him on a matter that was none of the General's particular business.

IMPORTANT CHANGE

In Grand Trunk Agreement Affecting St. John.

Ottawa, Ont. July 30.—It is understood that in connection with the Grand Trunk Pacific the government have obtained an important concession from the company in regard to the routing of freight. All unrouled freight in winter will require to be delivered by the company at either St. John or Halifax at the same rate as if delivered at Portland, which is the winter terminus of the Grand Trunk. This will make up for the geographical disadvantage of the maritime province ports as far as distance is concerned.

There are said to be other modifications and improvements in the contract, so that the government has not been idle during the past few days in their negotiations with the Grand Trunk Pacific. It is also understood that the government will have representation on the Grand Trunk Pacific directorship.

Honor in Death.

Montreal, July 30.—Developments make still more pathetic the circumstances connected with the suicide of Albert Fournier the defuncting cashier of the Recorder's court.

Fournier gave his life to pay his debts. He sought death, not as a way of escaping his financial obligations, but as the only means within his power of providing the money to meet them.

At the time of his death he was carrying \$7,000 life insurance and it was to make that sum available for covering the shortage in his account that he threw himself into the St. Lawrence River. This is the explanation he makes in the letter to his wife, which he posted just before he took his own life.

Big Loss in Ice.

Winnipeg, July 29.—Fire last evening destroyed the large storehouse of the Arctic Ice Company, at the corner of River avenue and Main street, together with their stables and wagon sheds, and the two residences on River avenue, immediately to the east. The loss is about \$40,000. A load of hay was being unloaded into one end of the icehouse, when a small boy with a match ignited the load. In the endeavor to get it away from the building the load upset, scattering the fire in all directions, and the result was as above stated. About 10,000 tons of ice will be rendered useless.

Murder at Death-Bed.

Hamburg, July 29.—A sensation has been caused in North-western Germany by a tragedy in Altona, where, alongside the death bed of his mother, Judge Baur, a well-known and very much respected man, shot and killed his brother, who was a lawyer, his mother's housekeeper and himself. It is stated that Mrs. Baur left all her property to her housekeeper, which caused a quarrel between the brothers. The murders and suicide occurred Sunday night. The bodies, including that of Mrs. Baur, were not found until yesterday.
