WELL KNOWN HERE.

Mrs. B. R. Stevenson, formerly of St. Andrews, Died Suddenly at Truro.

Truro, N. S., April 11.—Mrs. Kate Stevenson, relict of the late Hon. B. R. Stevenson of St. Andrews, N. B., died suddenly here last evening at the residence of her son-in-law, A. D. Wetmore, after an illness of two weeks from an internal malignant growth.

She was a sister of the late Hon. John Bolton, M. P. for Charlotte, N. B., and her late husband was speaker of the New Brunswick Assembly and surveyor general in the Fraser-King government.

The remains will go by the C. P. R. Sunday night to St. Andrews for interment.

Deceased leaves one daughter, Mrs. Wetmore of this town, her son J. Fletcher Stevenson having died here some years ago.

KILLED 1,500.

Awful Explosion in a Chinese Arsenal.

London, April 11.—News has been received from Canton of an explosion in the powder factory of an arsenal there, in which fifteen hundred persons were killed.

The establishment was one of the largest in the world, and the explosion so terrific that buildings were demolished and the entire arsenal damaged.

Laid to Rest.

The remains of the late Mrs. T. E. Babbitt of Gibson, were taken to Upper Gagetown by the David Weston yesterday and interred in the Baptist cemetery at that place. An impressive service was conducted at the grave by Rev. W. R. Robinson of Gibson and Rev. Mr. Mutch of Gagetown. A number of relatives and friends accompanied the remains and returned home by the tug Ernest. Undertaker John G. Adams had charge of the arrangements.

Loss Will be Slight.

The logs belonging to James M. Scott of Dumfries, which broke away at the mouth of the Nackawick on Wednesday night, were nearly all caught at the Sugar Island boom. Mr. Scott, who was in the city yesterday, says that about two thousand pieces got away, but out of that lot he does not expect to lose more than one hundred.

J. Fred Ryan of this city will operate the Grafton, Carleton county brick yard this summer, employing 12 to 15 men. He has given contracts for 300 cords of wood, 200 cords of which will be put in by Robert McElroy. Brick making will commence about June 1st.

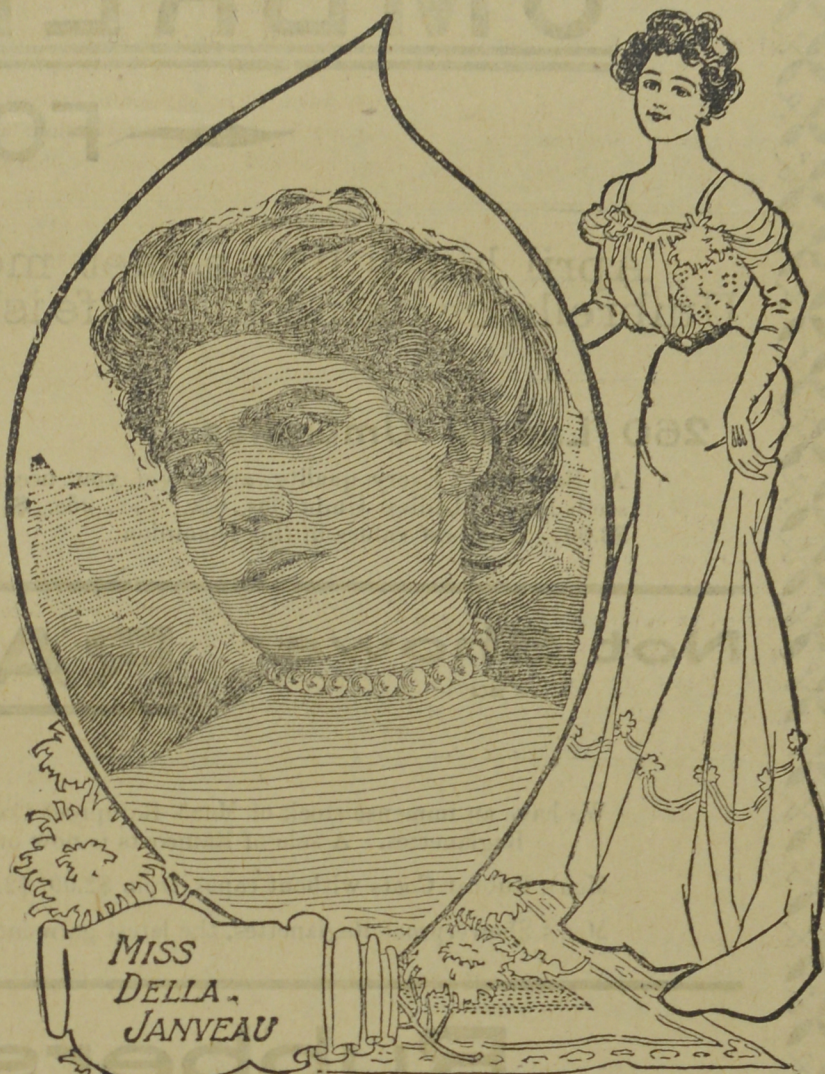
