Removed to Montreal and Promoted.

SUPT. OBORNE AND J.W. WETMORE GET A LIFT.

Latter a Well Known Frederictonian.

St. John, April 22.—James Osborne, the present superintendent of the Atlantic division of the C. P. R., with headquarters at St. John, is to be appointed to a similar but more important position at Montreal, for the Eastern division.

John W. Wetmore, claims agent of the Atlantic division, has been elevated to a similar position for all the C. P. R. system east of Fort William, Ont., and will have his office in Montreal.

[General regret will be felt at the removal of both these officials from this division, although the numerous friends of both gentlemen will be glad to hear of their promotion.

Mr. Wetmore is a Fredericton boy, son of the late Judge A. R. Wetmore, and brother of A. R. Wetmore, chief engineer of the public works department, and has been in the C. P. R. employ for a number of years as claims agent. His promotion to authority over the entire line east of Fort William shows the confidence the company have in Mr. Wetmore's ability, and is a testimony to the faithful manner in which he has served his employers.—Herald.]

HOUSE COMMITTEES.

Lunatic Asylum Accounts Dealt With This Morning.

The public accounts committee of the Legislature met at nine o'clock this morning, and dealt with the items of expenditure in connection with the provincial lunatic asylum. Messrs. W. A. Quinton, steward of the institution, and G. Gordon Boyne, the acting secretary, attended with the books and vouchers, and every facility was afforded the committee for a complete and searching enquiry. The maintenance account amounting to \$68,164, for the year ending October 31st, 1902, was carefully gone over, and every item was satisfactorily explained by the asylum officials. It was shown that about all the supplies were purchased by tender, and that in all cases the prices paid were very reasonable. The opposition members of the committee had very little criticism to offer, which is an indication, that they must have been fairly well satisfied with the showing made. Some few items for work done on the asylum buildings, under the auspices of the public works department, will likely be disposed of tomorrow morning.

The corporations committee this morning had under consideration Hon. Mr. Sweeney's bill to incorporate Barton E. Kingman, Frederick C. Sayles, Robert W. Sayles, Harry McLaughlin, and Matthew Lodge, as "The Electro Manganese Company, Limited." The object of the company is to search for, mine, mill, refine, and prepare for sale road and bog manganese, road and bog iron, and other ores into ferro-manganese by electric reduction and other processes. The capital stock is to be \$1,500,000, divided into fifteen thousand shares of \$100 each. The bill provides that the company must commence bona fide operations in the province within three years, or forfeit the charter.

Mr. McLaughlin of New York, one of the incorporators, and A. P. Barnhill of St. John were heard on the bill, and it was decided to recommend it to the House, with certain amendments.

Firemen Elect Officers.

The hook and ladder and salvage companies of the fire department met last evening and re-elected N. J. Smith and Arthur H. Woods captains for the ensuing year, and Charles Fleet, second captain. The rolls of all the fire companies are to be submitted to the city council for approval at the May meeting. There is some talk of reducing the strength of the department this year, but thus far no action in regard to the matter has been taken by the fire committee.

Dismissed.

The Halifax City Council have dismissed Chief Connolly of the fire department, for irregularities permitted among the men at the fire stations.
