Chickens by Steam.

Addison Bowman of Springhill has gone into the chicken raising business on a very extensive scale. Some weeks ago he installed a modern incubator in his henery, and on Sunday last it produced 110 chickens from a setting of 120 eggs. They have since been placed in a brooder, and are getting along swimmingly. Mr. Bowman deals in nothing but pure bred stock, and the eggs used by him for hatching purposes, were imported from the Ontario Experimental farm. He expects to handle about five hundred chickens during the coming season.

Presentation to Mr. Simonds.

Native of Boiestown.

The Buffalo Evening Times April 13, says: Mrs. Margaret S. Sharp, the estimable wife of Arthur J. Sharp, manager of the New England Wool and Dressed Beef Co., died at 5.20 o'clock last evening, after an illness of ten days. Mrs. Sharp was one of the city's most estimable women and had a host of friends who will sincerely mourn her untimely death. Mrs. Sharp was born Oct. 23rd, 1859, in Boiestown, N. B., and was educated in the public schools. She was married August 2nd, 1886, at Fredericton, N. B. Her parents lived at Boiestown. Both are dead. A brother resides at Boiestown and will be here for the funeral.

City Hall Insurance.

The city hall committee of the city council met last evening to consider the question of renewing the insurance on the city hall. It was decided to cut down the amount of insurance on the building from \$20,000 to \$10,000, and divide the amount between the Anglo-American, represented by R. W. L. Tibbits and the Quebec Company, of which W. S. Hooper is the local agent. The premium rate is to be one per cent. per year, and the policies will be in force for three years. Mr. Tibbits has already taken out a policy on the building, and Mr. Hooper will do so immediately.

A RIVER MYSTERY.

Body of an Unknown Man Found at Springhill.

DISCOVERY WAS MADE BY ONE OF GLASIER'S MEN.

The Body Supposed to Have Been in the Water Since Last Fall.

Considerable excitement was created at Springhill this morning by the discovery of the body of a man floating in the river near that place. The find was made by a raftsmen named Nason, an employe of D. D. Glasier & Sons. The body was that of a man about twenty-five years of age, and from appearances has evidently been in the water since last fall. It was partially covered with clothing, but there is no means by which the unfortunate man can be identified.

A telephone message was sent to the city for a coroner shortly after the find was made, but since the death of Dr. Seery the city has been without an official of that kind, and Coroner Mullin of St. Marys was not available. Up to noon the body was still in the river, as no one clothed with the necessary authority to order its removal had visited the locality.

Who the man is and where he came from, are questions that nobody seems to be able to answer at the present time. An inquest will no doubt be held just as soon as a coroner is available, and an effort will be made to clear up the mystery.

A gentleman who examined the body at Springhill this morning, informs the Herald that in his opinion it is that of a young man between twenty and thirty years of age. The man had on a heavy woolen shirt and sweater, dark trousers, and a pair of heavy boots, though the latter were not of the pattern usually worn by stream drivers. Just below the right knee, was a mark, which would indicate that the man's leg had been broken, at one time and not properly reset.

The body was badly disfigured in places, though some of the clothing was in a good state of preservation.

As the man cannot be identified, he will likely be buried at the expense of the poor authorities of Kingsclear.

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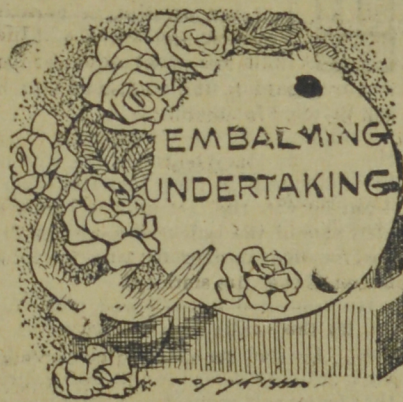
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
