Mr. William H. McInnis, a native of Cape Breton, N. S., has been elected to the state senate of Massachusetts from Berkshire county.

General regret will be felt at the announcement of the serious accident which happened to Rev. Dr. McLeod, and his many friends not only here but all over Canada, will sincerely hope that he may soon be restored to his usual physical vigor.

Emperor William of Germany has undergone a delicate surgical operation for the removal of a polypus from his larynx, an incident that gave rise to an unfounded report that he was suffering from cancer. The Kaiser's father died of cancer of the throat.

Mr. Foster is telling his audiences in England what a great boon Canada extended to the mother country in the trade preference inaugurated by the Liberal government, but he hides the fact that the Liberal policy in that respect was determinedly opposed by the Conservative party of which Mr. Foster has been one of the leaders.

King Edward the Seventh was sixty-two years old today, having been born Nov. 9, 1841. He was married to Princess Alexandra, March 10, 1863, and succeeded to the throne on the death of Queen Victoria in January, 1901. His Majesty is enjoying excellent health, and is easily one of the most popular sovereigns that ever ruled over the British Empire. Long may he reign, is the fervent prayer of his millions of dutiful and loyal subjects.

There is some disappointment in Canadian circles over the paucity of the King's birthday honors conferred on citizens of this country. It was rumored that the Canadian commissioners in the Alaska Boundary tribunal, the Minister of the Interior and a couple of well known senators would probably be remembered by His Majesty, but the expected titles did not materialize. A couple of C. M. G.'s and some more companions of the Imperial Service Order are all that are included in the Canadian list of birthday honors.

The London Daily Mail is boasting of a journalistic feat which it alleges will revolutionize reporting. Mr. Chamberlain's speech at Birmingham last Friday night was taken by reporters of the Daily Mail by means of the electrophone which allowed them, sitting in the London office, 113 miles distant, to hear every word spoken. The speech was printed verbatim, and the paper was selling on the street twenty-seven minutes after the speech was concluded. The electrophone beat the telegraph one hour and twenty-seven minutes.

We invite a careful perusal of the very able article published elsewhere today from the vigorous pen of Mr. Joseph Howe Dickson of this city, clerk of His Majesty's executive council in New Brunswick. It was written in reply to an article published in the National Magazine of Boston on "The American Invasion of Canada," and the managers of that publication promptly gave it a place in their columns from which it is transferred to the Herald. Mr. Dickson rightly sizes up the situation when he declares that there is absolutely no sentiment in Canada in favor of annexation, and he presents strong arguments to prove his premise.

Hon. L. F. R. Masson, who died Sunday at his home in Montreal, was for many years a prominent Conservative

politician. He sat in the House of Commons for Terrebonne, from 1867 until 1882, when he was called to the Senate, and was minister of militia in the Sir John A. Macdonald ministry from 1878 till 1880, when he resigned because of ill health. He was lieutenant governor of Quebec from 1882 to 1887, and was appointed to the Senate a second time in 1890, holding his seat until recently it was declared vacant for lack of Mr. Masson's attendance, due to ill health. Deceased was 70 years old, by profession a lawyer, and he had quite a military record, having served as brigade major of Quebec, and in repelling the Fenian raid of 1866.

Imperial Decorations.

Ottawa, Nov. 9.—His Excellency was notified last night of the following King's birthday honors to Canadians: To be C. M. G.: Col. L. F. Pinault, deputy minister of militia; L. Hebert, sculptor, Montreal. To be Companions of the Imperial Service Order: Dr. Robert Bell, acting director geological survey; Edwin Gulpie, deputy commissioner works and mines, Nova Scotia; J. Geo. Hodgins, librarian to the government of Ontario; David Ewart, chief architect of public works, Ottawa; Lieut. Col. H. R. Smith, sergeant-at-arms, House of Commons; Lieut. Col. A. G. Irvine, warden Manitoba penitentiary; J. N. Gregory, agent department of Marine, Quebec.

Scored Great Success.

On the 5th and 6th insts. the fine Scottish aggregation which appears here Dec. 1st, made a tremendous success in St. John, where they were received by not only crowded houses, but enthusiasm which has never been surpassed in that city. The bright particular star of the company proved to be the violinist, MacKenzie Murdoch, who in the two concerts was compelled to play more than 21 times although only on the programme for two numbers in each concert. What he can do with the Scottish airs is said to be past belief, and even Jessie MacLachlan with her memorable rendition of "Rule Britannia" never evoked such enthusiasm as did the playing of the "Scottish Paganini".
