

ALASKAN AWARD

Discussed by President
Roosevelt in His Mes-
sage to Congress.

IS VERY SATISFACTORY
TO UNITED STATES.

The Colombo Situation and
Other Important Matters
Touched Upon.

Washington, Dec. 7.—President Roosevelt opened the regular session of congress today, the special session having expired on Saturday. In his annual message the president dealt at length with the Alaskan affair, and after outlining the decision of the tribunal and the circumstances which led up to it, declared that the result was entirely satisfactory to the United States. He recommended the immediate appointment of a commission to confer with the British commission to determine the boundary under the award.

In reference to the Trusts and Labor Unions he declared it to be the policy of the government to enforce the law against illegal action to both alike, while leaving them free to carry on legal objects. He proposed a general staff for the navy and naval station in Subeg Bay, Philippines.

Many measures for the development of Alaska were recommended and Congress was advised to appropriate funds for investigation of further postal naturalization and the western land frauds.

The relations with Turkey were declared friendly despite the Besuit incident and the treaty with China securing abolition of liking and ought to leave lands in perpetuity as reported.

The message concluded with a long review of affairs in Colombo, the president defending the action of the United States on the ground that Colombo in 1844 had been able to retain authority only by American support and that the canal was an interest so great to be trifled with, not only in the interest of the United States but of the world. There was no reference to reciprocity with Canada.

ESTEEMED LADY'S DEATH.

Mrs. R. A. Estey Passed Away on
Sunday Morning.

The death occurred at seven o'clock Sunday morning at her home on Carleton street, of Mrs. Catherine Estey, wife of Mr. Richard A. Estey, the well known lumberman and mill owner. She had been a great sufferer from rheumatism and for the past twelve years has been an invalid, and at times unable to move about the house without assistance. Her death was due to a complication of diseases, however, and she was only confined to her room a few days. The news of her death was a painful shock to her friends about the city, very few of whom were aware of the serious nature of her illness.

The deceased lady was fifty-five years of age, and leaves besides a sorrowing husband, a family of one son, Frederick A. Estey, of this city, and two daughters, Mrs. R. B. H. Phillips of this city, and Mrs. G. Wilbert Carrie of St. John. She was a daughter of the late Martin Mackey of this city, and is survived by an aged mother, five brothers and two sisters. They are Henry C., and George Mackey of this city, John Mackey of St. John, Martin and William of Boston, Mrs. A. L. Shaw of Providence and Mrs. Charles Came of Rochester, N. Y.

The late Mrs. Estey was a lady of a most kindly and amiable disposition, and was possessed of other good qualities which made her beloved and esteemed by all who enjoyed her acquaintance. The sincere sympathy of the whole community will be extended to the husband and family in the hour of their great bereavement.

Mr. and Mrs. G. Wilbert Carrie arrived from St. John on Saturday evening in response to a telegram, and Frederick A. Estey, who has been at Edmundston for some time looking after his father's

lumbering operations on the Rockway, is expected here this evening.

The funeral will take place tomorrow (Tuesday) afternoon, with services at the house at 2.30 p. m., by Rev. J. A. Rogers. Undertaker John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

DOWIE WILL SETTLE.

Presents Satisfactory Assurances to His
Creditors.

Chicago, Dec. 6.—By a stroke of diplomacy John Alexander Dowie has established harmony between Zion, its receivers and its creditors in and out of court. He proposes to settle with his immediate creditors, to arrange with others on a reasonable time basis, and to end the receivership. At a conference yesterday between the attorneys representing the heaviest creditors and Jacob Newman, attorney for the receivers, Dowie showed the lawyers a statement setting forth Zion's assets and liabilities. He declared he valued Zion's estate at \$14,000,000 above all liabilities. He exhibited large orders for lace and candy. He said neither the lace nor candy factory could supply its orders. He showed an order for 75 carloads of candy from a Cincinnati firm. He showed a draft for \$50,000 from a wealthy well wisher, and declared he could draw for \$200,000 more on one of Zion's friends in Wisconsin.

On this showing he offered to settle all urgent claims in cash and put Zion on a cash basis in all future dealings with the outside world. With his heaviest creditors out of the way he said his debts demanding immediate payment would not amount to more than \$150,000. Samuel Stevenson's judgment notes for \$100,000 are not yet due.

Dowie's presentation of figures and his offers of settlement were satisfactory to the attorneys. His plan will be submitted tomorrow at the meeting of the receivers, their attorneys and the attorneys for his creditors, and it is believed will be accepted. In that event receivers and all creditors will join hands with Dowie in a plea to Judge Kohlsaat to dismiss the pending litigation and permit Dowie freedom to gather funds and settle obligations.

A BRAVE GIRL.

Mortally Wounded an Outlaw Who Took
Liberties With Her.

Williamston, W. Va., Dec. 7.—Wm. Howardson, an outlaw of notoriety, has been mortally wounded by Miss Katie Roubough, a girl of less than 20 years, who is employed as telegraph operator for the Norfolk & Western railway at Thacker. Howardson, Saturday night entered the tower where the girl was at work alone, and attempted to embrace her, but the girl had a revolver. Four shots were fired, two of which penetrated Howardson's chest. The girl, after firing the fatal shots, called up the operator at Williamston, related her experience and told him she would no longer be on duty that night. She then walked a quarter of a mile in the darkness and surrendered to a magistrate.

Miss Roubough was released on her own recognizance.

HER REVENGE.

Austrian Princess
Shot and Seri-
ously Wounded

AN ACTRESS WHO HAD A
LIASON WITH FORMER'S
HUSBAND.

Guilty Pair Found in the
Prince's Apartments.

New York, Dec. 7.—A despatch from Vienna to the Herald says that Princess Elizabeth Marie shot and seriously wounded an actress with whom her husband, Prince Otto of Windeich Greetz, was having a rendezvous in the Palace of the Prince's family estate at Prague.

Prince Otto and Princess Elizabeth Marie were married a year ago, the Princess renouncing her rights to the throne of Austria-Hungary. Prince Otto was only a poor lieutenant.

The Princess is, or was deeply in love with the Prince, and it is said that news of his unfaithfulness provoked a storm of passion.

Grasping a revolver of small calibre, the Princess crept along the corridor of the Prince's apartments.

A valet at the door of the ante chamber declined to allow her to enter, and she became infuriated and fired at the man, who fled.

It appears that Prince Otto had been secretly paying assiduous attention to the actress. The Princess was blissfully ignorant of the intrigue until on a certain night she was informed presumably by some disappointed suitor of the actress, that the Prince was entertaining in his apartments in the palace, the lovely actress.

Then the Princess proceeded to the Prince's apartments.

Filled with rage and humiliation she stood before the guilty pair, revolver in hand. The Prince sprang towards the angered Princess, but as he did she cried "You beast" and shot the actress in the breast.

The woman uttered a shriek and fell to the floor. The Prince seized his wife, who would have made her revenge complete with another shot, had not her intention been thwarted.

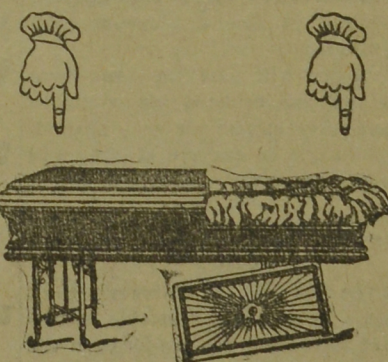
