It is said that the energetic Scott Lumbering company, who now own the Victoria mill, and will commence running it early next season, will also erect a large shingle mill to run winter and summer, and that they will also erect at least twenty dwellings for their employees, and a large store. It is anticipated that the company will employ at least 175 men in their industries in this city.

Something New Promised.

The congregation of St. Anthony's church, St. Mary's, have decided to make a departure in their Christmas holiday entertainment this year. They are going to hold a supper on the Tuesday between Christmas and New Year's, December 29th, and the principal attraction will be the fortune-telling Christmas cakes. These have been found very attractive in the British Isles, and St. Anthony's congregation have decided to make the experiment here.

Motion for New Trial.

In the case of Reid vs. McGivney tried at the last term of the York county court, the plaintiff seeking to recover damages for the destruction of a wood lot by fire, alleged to have been negligently set by the defendant, the jury found a verdict for the latter. On Saturday before Judge Wilson at chambers, Mr. O. S. Crockett for the plaintiff, moved for a new trial on the ground of the misdirection of the Judge in his charge to the jury, Mr. J. H. Barry, K. C. contra. Judgment reserved.

Skating Tonight.

Manager Hanson will open the Arctic rink for skating this evening. He has a splendid sheet of ice and the band of the R. C. R. has been engaged to furnish a program of fifteen pieces, the first to be played at eight o'clock. Prof. Washington has fitted up a booth inside the building for the sale of refreshments. The Arctic rink promises to be more popular than ever during the coming season, and the early start which Manager Hanson is making will be greatly appreciated by skaters. The doors will be opened at 7:30 o'clock.

A Slim Turnout.

A delegation of four representing the once great Conservative party of York, went to St. John by the 9.45 train this morning to assist in doing "honor" to Mr. Borden, the Conservative leader. Those making up the quartette were Mr. George J. Colter of Keswick, Mr. John B. Gunter, Mr. John Oldham and Mr. Harry F. McLeod of this city. Notwithstanding the fact that a large number of invitations had been sent out and a strong effort made to interest the faithful, the "delegation" was not sufficiently strong to secure the benefit of excursion rates, and they had to pay full fare.

Funeral of Late Harry Ryan.

The funeral of the late Harry C. Ryan took place at nine o'clock this morning and was very largely attended. The remains were taken to St. Danstan's church where high mass of requiem was chanted, after which the remains were conveyed to the Hermitage for interment. The veterans of the South African war walked in a body behind the hearse.

Among the floral offerings were handsome wreaths from the South African veterans; from "Some friends at St. Mary's"; and from his fellow clerks, also a very handsome broken column from "Some of the Boys."

QUITE SERIOUSLY ILL.

Archdeacon Neales of Woodstock Had a Hemorrhage.

Woodstock, Dec. 6.—Archdeacon Neales of Woodstock, was taken seriously ill Saturday afternoon. Just before tea he was attacked with a hemorrhage which was only stopped by the prompt action of his physician. The archdeacon has been subject to comparatively slight attacks of this kind for many years, but the attack of Saturday was more severe than any he has experienced for a long time. The news was heard with anxiety from all classes of people in town, who were much relieved on learning this morning that he had a comfortable night and was resting easily. The doctor insists on absolute rest for some time to come.

Police Court.

John McNutt, who was arrested on Saturday afternoon for annoying a young lady and creating a disturbance on Queen street, was this morning bound over by Col. Marsh to keep the peace for a period of twelve months. He gave bonds to the amount of \$800, half of which was furnished by himself, and the balance was made up of two sureties of \$200 each. The prisoner was given a severe lecture by Col. Marsh, and was told quite plainly that writing threatening letters is an offence punishable by a long term of imprisonment. It is likely that he will return to the west in a few days.

Death at Gibson.

Mrs. Mary Ann Stephenson, widow of the late Andrew Stephenson of Burton, Sunbury County, died at her home at Gibson this morning after having reached the ripe old age of 92 years and nine months. She is survived by one son, Isaac W. Stephenson, J.P., a well known farmer of Sheffield, and three daughters, Mrs. Horatio N. Fradsham of Gibson, and the Misses Annie and Jennie Stephenson at home. The funeral will take place from her late home on Wednesday at 8 o'clock with services by Rev. J. A. Rogers. Interment will be made at Pine Grove cemetery, Burton. Undertaker John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

REV. DR. McLEAN

Editor of the Wesleyan
Officiates at the Methodist Church.

**BROTHERHOOD OF MAN
AND FATHERHOOD
OF GOD**

Large congregations attended the missionary services in the Methodist church yesterday and most able sermons were preached morning and evening by Rev. Dr. McLean, editor of The Wesleyan. Rev. J. A. Rogers, pastor, presided at both services, and in the morning Rev. A. Lucas, field secretary of the Provincial Sunday School Association, took part in the exercises. Rev. J. J. Teasdale and Rev. J. J. Colter assisted in the evening. At the morning service the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man was the theme of Dr. McLean's sermon, and his text was Acts xvii. 26—"And hath made of one blood all nations of men for to dwell on the face of the earth, etc." From this text the preacher at once proceeded to show that the blood of the ape and wild beast was not the same as that of the human family; but the Indian, the negro, the caucasian are all of one blood; that environment has much to do with the color and character of the man and in many ways presented man's responsibility to his fellow man. Among the marked features of distinction between the human being and the animal were that man walks upright, has two hands and two feet, and is the only animal able to lay the thumb in the palm of the hand, or close the fingers and make the hand in the shape of a cup. The treatment of the subject was much enjoyed by the congregation.

In the evening [Dr. McLean preached from Isaiah LIV. 2 and 3, and dealt lavishly with the great heritage we as Canadians possess in the great Northwest country. His description of the country and people was intensely interesting, and the responsibility of the church to send forth laborers to meet the immense inflow of people was clearly set out. Canada is greatly indebted to the missionary for the peace and prosperity of its people, and he claimed that the teaching of the Christ religion was a stronger force in the Riel rebellion than the bullet. All the churches are endeavoring to meet the demand of the great western immigrant by sending to them additional missionaries, and he appealed to all Methodists to give of their means to carry the gospel to those afar off. In concluding his address the doctor presented the claims of the Wesleyan for increased support, and he complimented the Fredericton people upon their fine church and upon the prosperity of the people.

Excellent music was rendered by the choir under the leadership of Mr. Frank Harrison, and in the evening a solo was nicely rendered by Secretary Ley of the Y. M. C. A.
