A NEW INDUSTRY.

It will be pleasing intelligence to the citizens of Fredericton, to the residents of Nashwaakies and others in the vicinity, that a company of capitalists, some of them Frederictonians, is being organized for the prosecution of an important industrial enterprise, which will give employment to a large number of skilled mechanics.

The company which will shortly seek incorporation, will have a capital of \$150,000, and propose establishing a wood-working factory at Nashwaakies, availing themselves of the splendid waterpower formerly used by Mr. C. E. Hill in his mills at that point, and more recently by Mr. Neill's saw factory.

The company propose manufacturing hardwood flooring, sashes, doors, shutters, blinds and kindred productions, and will have their warehouses in Fredericton.

The Herald is not at liberty to mention the names of the promoters at the present time, but is assured that the gentlemen interesting themselves in the enterprise mean to establish their business on an extensive scale, and the surrounding country will reap important benefits therefrom.

It is proposed to erect the necessary buildings during the approaching summer, and to have the enterprise in full swing next autumn.

A PROFITABLE DISCUSSION.

The Assembly discussion on the necessity of greater secrecy of the ballot, the need of putting down corrupt methods in election, and the proposed consideration of these matters by a special committee with a view to at least reducing the volume of electoral corruption, should lead to good. Mr. Loggie's resolution and Mr. Hill's amendment, both excellent in themselves, combined and passed unanimously, furnish a basis for valuable results.

The House, we think, showed wisdom in not committing itself to what is known as the Australian ballot, now used in federal elections, and the suggestions of the Attorney General with a view of surrounding the present form of ballot with greater secrecy, were most valuable and should go a long way towards assisting the committee in arriving at some amendments to the present law that will ensure to the voter greater facility for exercising his franchise without being subjected to by improper influences. Mr. McLatchy, made a strong point against the Australian ballot, when he pointed out the many mistakes that are made by ignorant and infirm electors when they go into the booth to cast their vote, and the Attorney General emphasized abuses that arise in this connexion.

Mr. Hazen and his friends found the amendment went so much farther than Mr. Loggie's resolution that they accepted the former, as part of the original motion, and the unanimous passage of the resolution as amended, made every member feel that he was doing something towards blotting out the disgraceful, corrupt methods which unhappily prevail in all our election contests.

The politician, especially, should feel grateful if some measure can be devised by which they may be relieved from raising enormous campaign funds, often at great personal sacrifice and the country should rejoice if the stigma of electoral corruption is forever removed from the political arena.

The votes for public works passed by the House of Commons, Tuesday, included \$6,000 for the new wharf at Oromocto.

MAIDEN SPEECHES.

Two new members of the legislature, Mr. McLatchy and Mr. Smith, delivered their maiden speeches in that body yesterday, and both gentlemen were heartily received and delivered well conceived, well spoken and practical addresses. The member for Restigouche, who is a lawyer with an excellent practice, delivered himself with all the ease and eloquence of an old parliamentarian, giving promise of great usefulness in the debates of the House, and the member for Carleton, while confessing to some timidity, gave no evidence of it, but found his ideas flowing readily with well chosen language to express them. Mr. Smith is a business man who has not had great opportunities for public speaking, but with the chances now available to him is pretty sure to develop into an interesting and successful speaker. The new House is certainly a talking legislature, as the official reporter has already discovered.

WILL MEET PUBLIC APPROVAL.

The government bill committed in the assembly by Premier Tweedie, taking authority for the crown to control and lease the splendid water power at Grand Falls, is one that will meet with the support of the country, and called forth the approval of the opposition leader. This privilege was granted some years ago to a company which has failed to exercise the franchise granted to it, the charter has expired, and the government propose to make the privilege a provincial asset, and one which may in the future prove profitable to the province. The bill provides that when any person afforded evidence to the government of their financial ability to develop this water power and made a deposit with the receiver general of not less than \$50,000 they might receive incorporation by letters patent, and in case they made default the deposit shall be forfeited.

The Sun sought to deceive the public by intimating that Hon. Mr. McKeown secured an unopposed election by reason of having entered into an agreement to do certain things demanded of him by Tory leaders in St. John, but the solicitor general denies having so committed himself. There is no doubt the Sun clique would have opposed Mr. McKeown had they seen any chance of success, but they discovered the sentiment of the better thinking men of their own party against any such move, and were forced to abandon it.

Col. White, D. O. C., who was so anxious to remove to St. John, got rather a chilly reception there yesterday. No office was ready for him as he expected, and he has had to appeal to Ottawa for a place in which to discharge his official duties.

Mr. Fielding is to deliver his budget speech in parliament April 16, and in the meantime the men who are urging changes in the tariff are kept guessing.

INTERCOLLEGIATE DEBATE.

University and Mount Allison Orators to Engage in Wordy Warfare.

A great deal of interest is being taken in the intercollegiate debate between representatives of the University of New Brunswick and Mount Allison University to take place in the college library this evening, commencing at 8 o'clock. Each institution is to be represented by three speakers, and the subject is: "Resolved that Canada should contribute to an imperial fund for the support of the Empire." Mount Allison will be represented by Allison Borden of Kentville, N. S., Aubrey Tuttle of Wallace, N. S., and Frank Day of Lockport, N. S., and the University's honor will be upheld by Messrs. Lewin, Richards and Rideout. The judges selected are Mr. Justice Landry, Mr. J. D. Phinney, K. C., and Prof. W. M. Tweedie of Mount Allison. Admission, 25 cents. University students free.

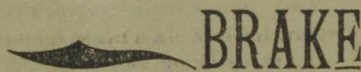
