General News Notes.

The Bank of Toronto has decided to increase its capital from \$3,000,000 to \$4,000,000.

Liberals of Antigonish, N. S., have nominated F. R. Trotter for the legislature, vice Hon. A. McGillivray created County Court Judge.

The House of Representatives at Washington by a vote of 258 to 5 have passed a bill ordering rebate of duty on foreign coal for one year.

Burglars in ransacking the residence of Mrs. Adelaide Anderson, at Minneapolis last night, carried off 400 pounds of anthracite coal in sacks. They did not touch the jewelry and plate.

The C. P. R. Co. have acquired the property of the St. Andrew Land Co. at St. Andrews, for railway purposes, and to extend accommodation for summer tourists.

A terrific explosion occurred at the Hamilton Powder Company's works, Departure Bay, B. C., yesterday. Geo. Simonette, Jesse Falfort and 10 Chinese were killed. Only one body, that of a Chinese, was recovered. Others were absolutely blown to fragments.

While a large crowd was skating on the bathing basin near the Washington monument at Washington last night the ice suddenly gave way and precipitated 20 or more persons in the water. At least three persons are known to have lost their lives.

The Dominion trade returns just issued show marvellous growth. The aggregate trade of the dominion for the six months was \$231,342,201 compared with \$213,231,609 for the same time last year or an increase of \$18,110,592. The trade of the past six months is about \$11,000,000 greater than for the whole of the year 1896.

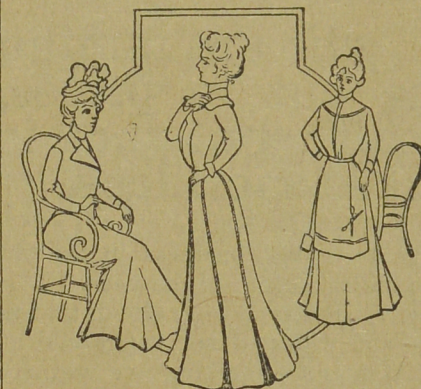
