FORMER FREDERICTON MAN

Running in Vancouver for British Columbia Legis- lature.

DR. BRYDONE-JACK'S MAIDEN SPEECH TO THE ELECTORS.

Made an Eloquent Appeal for Liberal Support.

One of the five Liberal candidates in Vancouver for the British Columbia legislature, the elections for which take place on Saturday next is Dr. Brydone-Jack, formerly of this city, son of the late Dr. Brydone-Jack, president of the University of New Brunswick. Dr. Jack received the unanimous nomination of the Liberal party convention and is proving a strong candidate. Vancouver generally goes Conservative but the World of that city prophesies that Dr. Jack, and Hon. Joseph Martin are pretty certain of election on Saturday.

Dr. Jack delivered his maiden speech at a Liberal rally in Vancouver last Wednesday evening and was given a very hearty reception. He said: The number of candidates coming out for election in the present campaign should, to a certain extent, indicate the importance of the situation at the present time. We have Liberal, Labor, Conservative and Socialist, a great variety with altogether 16 different candidates. With your kind permission I would like first to say a few words about our opponents, or rather those who call themselves our opponents, the Labor candidates and the Socialist candidates. I had hoped when I entered this contest that there would be only two parties in the field, the Liberals and Conservatives, and I believe that this would have been best and that the Labor party in the long run would probably have gained more advantages in a contest than by entering the field themselves. But while I do not consider it the part of wisdom with them to enter the field at the present time, they have that privilege and that right and they are equally as entitled to their views and have the same license to enter the field as individuals or as a party as has anyone else, and with this I have no quarrel. But I do not think that they will gain any advantage by so doing.

"Let me say a few words about the Conservative party which is nominally in power now. I would point out to you that while heretofore there have been no political party lines drawn it has for years been practically a Conservative government at Victoria, and in view of that fact I ask you if the province has fared as it should have done, when we take into consideration our vast natural resources of forest and mine and field. Is our country opened up as it should be? Have we good roads? Are the means of communication between cities and districts what they should be? Have our mines prospered as they should have, considering the vast wealth stored up in them awaiting development? Are our agricultural districts and farming lands developing and going ahead as they should? Do we not every year have to import quantities of farm produce from the Northwest and other territories when all could be just as well raised here, providing suitable means of transportation were provided and proper facilities afforded the farmers and the pioneers. Have the best available lands of the province been conserved for the farmers or the speculators?

"Gentlemen, my question answers itself. You all know how our public lands have been administered. There are others who on this platform tonight will criticize the acts and maladministration of the various Conservative governments and I will leave the matter in their hands.

"To the so-called Labor party I would point out the fact that the Liberal party is a Labor party of itself. We are none

of us independent of work, we all have to work for our daily bread, and we may all of us thank God that we have to work for work is beneficial and necessary for the maintenance of mental and physical health. There is nothing in the Liberal platform but what I am sure you will all most heartily endorse and subscribe to, and you may rest assured that if the Liberal party gets in with a working majority, as from present indications there is every probability of their doing, your interests and welfare will come first before that of any other party or clique or trust.

"And let me say a word to the Socialists. I may say that they have the right to their opinions and to advance their views and ideas and principles in every way that is right and constitutional, and although I have not had an opportunity of studying their platform or of hearing their speakers I am convinced that they have many good ideas which, if put into force, would work out to the great benefit of humanity.

"Socialists believe that the present economic order in which industry is carried on by private competitive capital must and ought to pass away; that the normal economic conditions of the future will be one with collective means of production and associated labor working for the general good. Socialism means in short that no industry in the economic arrangements of society the collective or co-operative principle shall become universal and that all who are able shall contribute to the services of society and that all shall share in the fruits of associated labor according to some good and equitable principle. In such a condition of things the widest field of ambition will be in the services of society.

"It means to me that if the millennium were only here and all men were good and faithful their principles might be given more consideration, and there would be more opportunity for the carrying out of these principles.

"May I suggest, gentlemen, that the election of the Liberal party to power in this province may perchance hasten the days of the millennium in B. C.? In fact many good and learned divines have an idea that that day is not so very far off.

"Now as to the Liberal party of B. C., which has honored me with a nomination as one of their candidates, and on whose ticket I hope to become one of their representatives. I say representatives advisedly, because I hope you will elect the whole Liberal ticket. In unity is strength, as you all know from your experience with unions and societies; one or two out of a party may be able to do very little, but five may accomplish much, especially if they stand together. We want to see the Liberal ticket elected not only here but throughout the whole province.

"Personally, I am not going to ask any one to support me, because I think that the office should come to the man and not the man to the office. The appointment of your representatives is in your hands; I have not sought the nomination. I am not asking you to elect me, but, gentlemen, I am asking you for the election of the Liberal ticket. Why? Because I have lived in B. C. for some years now and have watched what has been going on as well, perhaps, as you have, and I feel that if you elect the Liberal party to power on the platform that they have presented to you, you will find that the country will prosper by leaps and bounds; that we will be able to do what no government hitherto has done, that is to say, place the affairs of the province on a firm and stable basis, financially and otherwise, and inaugurate a period of prosperity for British Columbia such as it has never known in all its history before."

A Triple Drowning.

Winnipeg, Sept. 28.—A triple drowning accident occurred yesterday at the Bow River, Blackfoot Indian reserve, near Gleichen, N. W. T. Sergt. Brooks of the Northwest Mounted Police; A. Beaupre and Joseph Disbury, all of Gleichen, were attempting to cross the river, when horses, waggon and all three

men went down and were lost. A few Indians noticed the accident, and brought word to the town, and a searching party has gone out to endeavor to locate the bodies. All were married.

Sergt. Brooks had been twenty years with the force. He was a member of the contingent which represented the police at the coronation, and originally came from England. Beaupre was an interpreter attached to the police force, and belonged to Gleichen, where his parents reside. Disbury was a resident of the Calgary district.

MR. BLAIR'S ATTITUDE

In Full Accord With Government on all Questions Except G. I. P.

When the late minister of railways resigned his portfolio, his secession from the cabinet raised strong hopes among members of the opposition that the ministry would be greatly reorganized, perhaps fatally weakened. There is no doubt to suppose that Mr. Blair himself either expected or desired such an outcome, but small men, judging him by their own standards, misunderstood him and disappointed themselves. He stated from the first that the transcontinental railway question was the only one on which he differed from the government. After he made his speech in opposition to the railway measure he dropped out of the discussion entirely, never offering a word of further criticism and never interfering in any way with either the press or the politicians of New Brunswick.

Now that the railway bill has been disposed of by the House of Commons, Mr. Blair has in his usual forceful and manly way reiterated that while he is still a disbeliever in the Government railway policy he is "in accord with his former colleagues on all other questions." The occasion of the interview in which he thus defined his attitude was the uncertain tone of the St. John Telegraph, which was naturally supposed to be controlled in Mr. Blair's interest, if not by his authority. When the text of the contract was published The Telegraph steadily and ably antagonized it until a few days ago, when it recanted and accepted the Government scheme. Still more recently it abandoned this friendly attitude and went back to its former hostile one. The public will promptly and finally accept Mr. Blair's declaration that he had nothing to do with either change of opinion.

ELEPHANT FIGHTS LIONS.

A Terrible Struggle Witnessed at Coney Island.

New York, Sept. 28.—Hurled over the top of a steel-barred arena by an elephant it had engaged in mortal combat, Brutus, a large lion escaped into a crowd of three thousand persons at Luna Park, Coney Island, yesterday, and then into the open streets, causing a panic, in which men, women and children were knocked down and trampled upon. All Coney Island was terror-stricken. Several women fainted, and Joseph Gues, a bartender, over whom the lion leaped in its flight, was thrown into violent hysteria. No one was seriously injured. The lion was caught after having been confronted by a tall picket fence, before which he quickly paced back and forth, under the impression apparently that he was in his cage. The arena in which the beasts fought is located on an island in the park lagoon, near the electrical tower. "Tony" Lewando, the trainer, was making a trial of a new art. With out warning Brutus leaped at Columbia's throat and buried his teeth and claws in her flesh. This was the signal for the other two lions, who pounced upon the elephant's back. The battle-royal which followed thrilled and fascinated the large crowd of spectators. Weighted with three powerful foes, Columbia tore madly about the arena, hurling herself against its sides in an endeavor to dislodge them. Suddenly Columbia halted. She reached up with her trunk and gained a hold on Brutus' leg. She gave a mighty tug, and then slowly broke the lion's hold. The crowd, whose sympathy had been with Columbia, raised a shout of triumph, which was quickly changed into one of terror when Columbia was seen to grasp the lion around the middle, and, even with the two other beasts still on her back, haul her enemy over the top of the enclosure.

Brutus fell on the gang-plank, recovered himself quickly, rushed through the German village, jumping over Quine's head on his way, and after running around the streets a short time was captured without difficulty. He was seemingly badly frightened by the crowd. It required the greatest efforts on the part of half a dozen keepers to get the other lions from Columbia's back and into their cages. All the animals were badly excited.

WAS DONE TO DEATH.

Russian of Wealth Was Poisoned by Use of a Hypodermic Syringe.

London, Sept. 28.—A case of murder by the injection of poison by means of a hypodermic syringe is reported by the Moscow correspondent of the Daily Mail, who writes that an unpleasant smell, proceeding from a wicker basket, which arrived as luggage at the Brest railway station in Moscow, and for which no claimant appeared, caused an examination to be made, when the body of a well dressed man was found.

Inquiries were instituted which proved that the murdered man was a well-to-do land owner named Martin Tomashefsky. The perpetrators of the crime have been discovered and have admitted their guilt.

Tomashefsky had no occupation and resided at a hotel. He was passionately fond of card playing and visited a club every night, where he played for heavy stakes, and was as a rule very fortunate. On the day of the murder his cousin called at the hotel and asked him to come to his mother's house to play cards with two other friends of his family. At a given signal he was seized, his mouth covered so that he could not cry for assistance and the poison was injected under the skin of the forehead

at the same time taking his money from his pocket which they divided among themselves.

After their victim died they placed the body in a basket and one of them tied a piece of rope tightly around the throat to make sure, as he says, that there could be no further trouble with the murdered man.

The perpetrators of the crime were confident that their social positions would prevent any suspicion falling on them. It was only after the strong chain of evidence had been completed that they confessed.

Rev. Dr. Bond Resigns.

Toronto, Sept. 29.—It is understood that the Rev. Dr. G. J. Bond has on account of his health tendered his resignation of the position of editor of The Christian Guardian, to which he was appointed on the retirement of the Rev. Dr. A. C. Courtice. The Rev. Dr. Bond's health has been very unsatisfactory since the death of his wife a few months ago, and the recent visit of his brother, Sir Robert Bond, the Premier of Newfoundland, to this city was connected with the decision of the Rev. Dr. Bond to retire from active work.

There is very general regret in Methodist circles over the resignation, as Dr. Bond was very highly esteemed. The question of a successor to Dr. Bond has not yet been discussed by the Methodist authorities, but it is probable the choice will fall on one of the young men of the Church who have been previously associated with The Guardian.

Cross Channel by Balloon.

London, Sept. 29.—Count de la Vaulx and Count d'Outremont descended today in a balloon near Hull, Yorkshire, having journeyed from Paris in 17½ hours. This is the first time that a balloon has successfully travelled from France to England. Several experiments have previously been made to prove the utility of balloons in case of war.
