

DAMAGES AWARDED

Corporations Mulcted for Killing Men.

VERDICT IN ONE CASE BY A JURY.

Settlement out of Court in Two Others.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Brantford, Ont., Sept. 30.—At the fall assizes here yesterday, Mrs. George Brown sued the Waterous Engine Company for \$10,000 for the death of her husband, George Brown, who fell from an unprotected projection at the Waterous Works last May, and sustained injuries which resulted in his death about a month later. The jury awarded \$1,000 to the plaintiff.

St. Thomas, Ont., Sept. 20.—At the assizes here, actions brought against the Lake Erie and Detroit River Railway for damages for the death of John McNeill and Thomas Luter, killed in a collision between a gravel train and a passenger train at West Lorne in April last, were settled out of court. In the McNeill case the settlement was \$1,750, and \$150 costs, and in the Luter case, \$1,500 and \$150 costs.

CANADA'S DEVELOPMENT.

Sir Horace Tozer Immensely Pleased with us.

London, Sept. 30.—Sir Horace Tozer, official representative in London of Queensland, has returned immensely impressed with the signs of development everywhere apparent in Canada. He praised the government's attention to immigrants, saying that the methods of distributing them could hardly be improved upon. It is, he says, no idle boast to say that the Dominion is the granary of the empire. "Canada," he added, "is intensely loyal. Imagine a whole Parliament marching out to meet the Coldstream Guards Band; and that spirit pervades the whole people."

THEY LIKE STRATHCONA.

SERIOUS RIOTS.

Vienna, Sept. 30.—Serious riots have occurred at Budapest, where striking van drivers came in conflict with the police, and sixty persons were injured, ten of them seriously. The police ultimately fired on the rioters and several of the latter were wounded. Troops were summoned to restore order.
