STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.

House and Barns at York Mills Destroyed.

During the terrific thunder storm which passed over that section Sunday evening, the house and barns of James Lieter, at York Mills, parish of Manners Sutton, this county, were struck by lightning and burned to the ground in a few minutes. The fire caught in the barns, which were filled with the season's crop. The lightning also entered the house and tore up carpets and splintered some of the wood work.

About eight or nine persons were in the house at the time, but no one was hurt. The house was nearly new and was one of the finest in the parish. The damage is estimated at about \$2000, uninsured. Mr. Lieter and his son who resided with him, recently put up a flour mill, but this being apart from the other building was not burned.

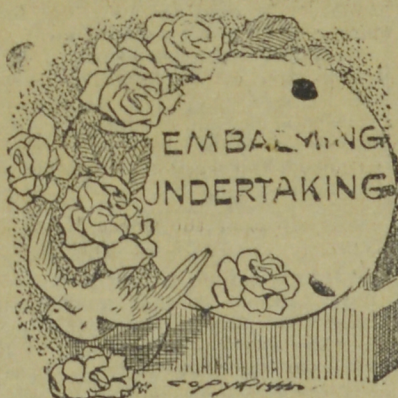
