County Court.

The Log Stealing Case.

At the county court this morning Judge Wilson delivered judgment on the application of O. S. Crockett to quash the indictment against Alex. Goodine charged with stealing logs. His Honor overruled all the objections raised by the prisoner's counsel and fixed the trial for November 10th. Bail was fixed at \$800, of which Goodine is to furnish \$400, and two sureties of \$200 each.

Inspecting the Scales.

Mr. James Barry, of St. John, the Dominion government inspector of weights and measures, is in the city on an official visit. Yesterday he made an examination of the bay scales in front of the court house, and reports having found them badly out of order. He readjusted them as well as it was possible to do so but thinks it will be a little difficult to keep them in order in future. Mr. Barry also examined the city ball scales and found them in good order and accurate.

Death at Central Blissville.

John E. Smith a prominent resident of Central Blissville, Sunbury died yesterday of cancer aged 77 years. De-

ceased was a brother of the late A. C. Smith M. P. P. of St. John, and of Israel E. Smith, formerly of this city. Deceased was a lumberman up to five years ago when he retired, being succeeded by his sons in the business. He was for many years a leading Liberal of the county, and was more than once pressed to seek a seat in the legislature, but declined.

Police Court.

A short time ago a child of Joseph Myshrahl was bitten by a dog owned by Andrew Hughie, coachman of the Queen hotel. The child's father took the law in his own hands putting the dog out of business with a gun. For this action Mr. Hughie has commenced an action against him in the police court, and Mr. Myshrahl by way of retaliation lodged a complaint with the police magistrate against Mr. Hughie for keeping a cross dog about his premises. The cases were to have been tried at the police court this morning but at the request of J. H. Barry, K. C. who appealed for Myshrahl, and with the consent of W. P. Taylor, counsel for Hughie, an adjournment was made for one week. It is said that the dog which Mr. Myshrahl shot was not the one that bit his child.

The Stranded Lumber.

It is said that one lumber operator who is interested in the logs stranded in the river above Grand Falls will not consent to the proposition to boom the lumber for the winter near Van Buren, and the others are in a quandary as to what course to take. There is no possible chance now to get the logs out this season, and most of the owners do not care to take the risk of leaving them scattered about the river. As it will be impossible to sort them, they will all have to be boomed or left where they are. It will cost something to collect them at the boom and unless all the kicking operators can be brought into line, it is doubtful if anything will be done.

A Big Rush for Seats.

The sale of tickets for the Coldstream Guards Band concerts at the opera house on Tuesday commenced at ten o'clock this forenoon. There was a big rush for a time and a great many tickets were disposed of. 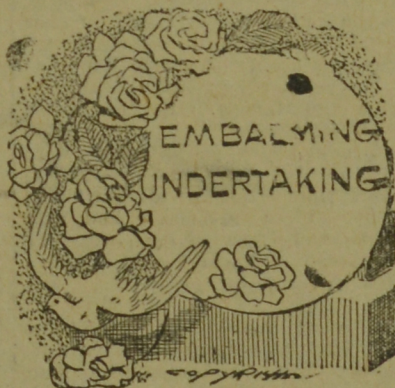
