FRATERNAL GREETINGS EXCHANGED WITH MANY SISTER SOCIETIES.

The members of the Fredericton Society of St. Andrew honored their patron saint in a fitting manner by a supper and reunion at the Barker House last evening. For the first time in years the celebration was confined to members of the society, but it appeared to be none the less enjoyable on that account. President Crockett occupied the chair, and the vice chairs were occupied by Vice Presidents F. L. Cooper and J. D. McKay. About fifty members were in attendance, including several from Stanley and other outside points.

An excellent repast was served at nine o'clock, and it is needless to say received full justice at the hands of those composing the jolly assemblage. The bill of fare, though not as elaborate as in former years, included the highly prized and highly flavored Scotch haggis, and also Scotch short bread, both direct from the old land, having been forwarded to the society by Mackie & Co., the famous distillers of Glasgow. This is Mackie & Co.'s annual offering, and it goes without saying that their kindness is warmly appreciated by the members of the society.

At the conclusion of the feast toasts to the King, governor general and lieutenant governor were proposed and duly honored.

"The Day and a' Wha Honor It," proposed by President Crockett was fittingly responded to by Donald Fraser, Esq., and Dr. D. R. Moore. The latter was in good form, and those who have had the pleasure of listening to his matchless eloquence need not be told that he held the assemblage spellbound and was cheered to the echo on resuming his seat.

There were a number of volunteer toasts, including one to Messrs. James Tennant, Jr., N. P. McLeod and James Pringle, members of the society who served in South Africa, and also one to our American cousins.

Messrs. A. E. Massie and F. L. Cooper delighted the gathering with several vocal selections rendered in their usual finished style.

The pleasant function broke up shortly after midnight with Auld Lang Syne and God Save the King.

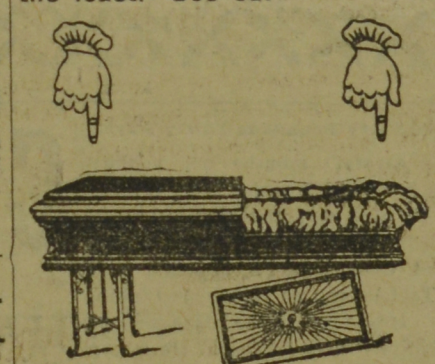
