Rival Labor Organizations in St. John

MOVING TO CONSOLIDATE THEIR FORCES.

Meeting to be Held Tomorrow Night.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. John, N. B., May 19.—An important movement is on in ship laboring circles, and a joint meeting of the two rival organizations is to be held Wednesday evening.

A union will in all probability be brought about.

This will be a very important matter in local labor circles, as over 3000 men make a living in loading and unloading shipping at this port, particularly in the winter time when nearly all of Canada's trade passes through St. John.

For the past four years the Ship Laborers' Union have been in keen competition for the bulk of the work.

ANOTHER STRIKE PROBABLE.

Montreal Heat, Light and Power Co. and Street Railway Co. Look for Trouble.

Montreal, May 19.—Employees of the Montreal Light, Heat and Power Co. have made a demand upon the company for an increase of pay and recognition of the union employees. This company, as well as the Street Railway is given until Thursday noon, to grant the demands of the men.

The management of both concerns say they will fight, and a general tie up is feared.

OPERATIONS PARALYZED.

Toronto, May 19.—Architects claim that two million dollars worth of building has been absolutely stopped owing to strikes in the building trades.

Lumber dealers have decided not to supply firms who consented to pay union wages with lumber to carry on their business.

DR. PARKIN IN LONDON.

Given an Enthusiastic Reception and Discussed Imperial Federation.

London, May 16.—Major Harold Parsons, the chief ordnance officer at Natal, read a paper before the Royal Colonial Institute last night, in which he held that the colonies should not expect to share the sea power of Great Britain until they were willing to assume their share of the burden in maintaining the British navy.

Sir John Colomb, who followed, discussed the paper and argued strongly in favor of the mother country and the colonies combining for Imperial defence.

Dr. Parkin of Toronto was given a great reception. He spoke for twenty minutes beyond the usual ten minutes allowed each speaker, and was asked, amid cheers, to continue his address. He was strongly in favor of the colonies contributing towards the cost of naval defence. His remarks were chiefly confined, however, to a comparison of the United States and the British Empire. In the former each State had its own government, yet acknowledged the government at Washington. A similar arrangement was suggested for the colonies and the Mother Land.

HOT TIME AT DUBLIN.

King's Proposed Visit to Ireland the Cause.

Dublin, May 19.—Scenes of extreme disorder were witnessed at a meeting of citizens last night in the rotunda, in support of the Irish parliamentary fund, owing to the presence of members of the Gaelic League, who are opposed to giving King Edward a friendly welcome on his coming visit to Ireland.

Timothy Harrington, lord mayor of Dublin, was in the chair.

While John Redmond was addressing

the audience, Mrs. McBride, formerly Miss Maude Gonne, advanced to the platform and interrupted the proceedings by asking Lord Mayor Harrington whether he intended as head of the municipality to oppose the presentation of an address of welcome to the king.

Mr. Harrington replied in an evasive way. Mrs. McBride insisted on a direct answer, whereupon scenes of the wildest disorder occurred and prevented John Redmond from continuing his speech.

The members of the Gaelic League tried to storm the platform amid cries of "put them out." Fierce collisions between the Gaelic Leaguers and the other members of the assembly ensued. Chairs were hurled to and from the platform and many persons were injured in the desperate efforts made to eject the disturbers and restore order.

John O'Donnell, member of parliament for South Mayo, was badly injured in the head during the scuffle. Many persons fled terror-stricken from the hall.

John Redmond persevered in continuing his speech, and eventually a semblance of order was regained and a resolution in accordance with the object of the meeting was carried.

Disliked the Tall Hat.

Houston, Tex., May 19.—Philip Bantz, of New York, travelling agent for a Bible house, was killed last night in Logan, west of here, in the cowboy country, because he wore a high silk hat, and also because he ordered a glass of lemonade at a bar instead of good "red licker." These two breaches of the social ethics were too much for the cowboys present, one of whom threw a lariat around Bantz's neck. The colporteur showed fight. He was felled to the floor by a blow from the butt of a heavy revolver, his skull being fractured. Death followed in a few minutes. Letters were found on him signed "your sister" and postmarked New York.

NEW MILITARY DEPOTS.

Canada's Permanent Force to be Increased to 1,500 Men.

Ottawa, May 18.—It is understood that legislation will be brought down before the supplementary estimates appear, providing for the creation of two military depots, one at Montreal and one at Edmonton, (N. W. T.) Provision will also be made for the increasing of the permanent force from its present establishment, 1,000 all ranks, to 1,500. The depot at Montreal will likely consist of at least two arms of the force for the present. These will likely be infantry and artillery. The Edmonton depot will be mounted infantry.

The Word "Jolly."

On the adoption of the word "jolly" into the English it had the meaning of beautiful, as it has among the French today. The English dramatist Beaumont of the sixteenth century speaks of our first mother as "the jolly Eve." In time, however, it came to mean hilarious, regardless of physical beauty. But this latter meaning is probably the right one after all, as the word doubtless comes from Yule (Yule), the pagan Christmas, so to speak, for be it known that what we now observe as Christmas day was a heathen holiday called Yule, and the Yule festival was one of noisy demonstration.

Yule indeed means noise or outcry, praising in loud voice, chanting, singing, making outcry in honor of their god. From yule, then, to jolly the step is short and easy, both meaning revelry, rejoicing. Ours is a risen Lord, theirs the same. The words are identical. So, too, in large degree the Christmas jollities, praises and those of heathen Yule. Into such close relation do simple words sometimes connect the present with the past.

BARR LEFT THEM

Leader of Saskatoon Colonists Abandons His Charge.

OPEN DISSATISFACTION AT HIS MANAGEMENT.

Charged With Making Personal Profit.

Saskatoon, N. W. T., May 19.—Reports from the Barr Colony say that a stormy meeting of the colonists has been held, the outcome of dissatisfaction over the allegation that Rev. Mr. Barr was making private profit out of the stores.

Rev. Mr. Lloyd and two other members of the party were appointed to take control and act with the government agents and are now returning to Battleford.

As a consequence, it is added, Mr. Barr has left the colony and, it is believed, will not return.

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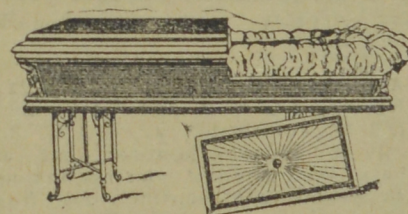
