PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

No Place for German Criminals Here—Britain's One Offer to Canada.

Ottawa, May 19.—Dr. Sproule brought the attention of the house yesterday to the speech of Hon. Joseph Chamberlain at Birmingham, and read that portion of it which referred to Canada making an exceptional offer for mutual preferential trade. Dr. Sproule asked if the government was prepared to lay these offers upon the table of the house and all correspondence in regard to the matter, and also to say whether there was any correspondence with the imperial government in respect to Germany, and if the government would bring down any further information on that subject.

Mr. Fielding replied that the government had already taken the house into its confidence in this matter, and the offer which Canada made as between the British manufactures and the foreign was contained in an imperial blue book and memorandum which Canada had made on the subject was quoted by him in his budget speech.

Dr. Sproule—Was that the only offer? Mr. Fielding—That was the only offer. We have had no recent correspondence in regard to the German question.

Mr. Charlton asked if the government had heard of the report that Germany intended to flood Canada with her ex-convicts. The United States had already made arrangements to prevent this.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier—We have received no official information that the German authorities contemplated any such policy. If they had we would take immediate action to prevent any such action being carried out. My impression is that we have sufficient power under the existing laws to deal with such a question, but if our powers should not be adequate we shall have no hesitation in asking parliament to suppress them.

In reply to a question by Mr. Fowler the minister of militia stated that a brigade camp will be held at Sussex (N.B.) this year. The names of corps to be called out will be published in due course.

The speaker ruled Mr. Bickerdike's cigarette bill out of order. It should have been introduced by way of a resolution. Mr. Bickerdike will therefore have to give notice of a resolution before the bill can be introduced.

Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick will introduce a bill to amend the act respecting the department of public printing and stationery. In 1893 parliament authorized the printing of the Intercolonial and P. E. Island railway to be done in the maritime provinces, as it was found more convenient than sending to Ottawa. A provision was inserted that the cost was not to exceed what would be charged at the bureau at Ottawa. The king's printer always certifies the bill for printing as being "fair and reasonable." Recently the auditor general decided that the king's printer must certify as the act requires, but this he was unable to do. A proposed change in the law will authorize the bill to be paid for "at a cost not exceeding customary and fair commercial rates for similar work or supplies in similar quantities."

BARBER SHOT HIM.

Former Governor of Louisiana Killed in the Public Street.

Tibodeaux, La., May 19.—A shooting affray which resulted in the death of former Lieut. Governor Clay Knoblock, occurred here today. The shooting was done by James Garault, a barber, in a section of Main street, usually crowded, but as the hour was early, few people were on the street. Several witnesses of the shooting were found, but they refused to talk further than to say that Garault shot in self defence.

The men were seen talking together when suddenly Knoblock drew his revolver. It appeared that he experienced some trouble with the weapon and the cartridge failed to explode. Before Knoblock could make another attempt to shoot, Garault whipped out his revolver and opened fire, shooting Mr. Knoblock five times. Any of the wounds would have proved fatal.

Garault surrendered to the authorities immediately, but it is believed he will be allowed bond.

Henry Clay Knoblock was a native of La Fourche Parish. He served as Lieut. governor under Governor Samuel D. McEnery, now United States senator.
