

END OF GAMEY CASE.

Evidence for the Defence Concluded Today.

COUNSEL WILL PRESENT THEIR ARGUMENTS TUESDAY.

Mr. Stratton Punctured Conspirators Evidence from End to End.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Toronto, May 6.—The case for the defence in the Gamey investigation, was closed this morning, with the evidence of J. M. Conmee, M. P. P. He said Gamey had expressed disapproval of Whitney, the opposition leader, in a conversation with him.

Two minor witnesses will be heard this afternoon, and the court will adjourn till Tuesday when counsel will present their arguments.

Toronto, May, 6.—Hon. J. R. Stratton left the witness box yesterday afternoon, shortly before adjournment, having been under cross-examination for about five hours. Little was done to show any inconsistency in his story. At the conclusion of the session, Mr. Johnston stated he and Mr. Blake desired to consult as to whether it was necessary to call any more witnesses, or declare the case closed. He suggested the commission might adjourn until this morning, and the court agreed.

In the afternoon, Mr. Stratton's cross-examination was continued with regard to the Globe interview. Mr. Stratton said none of the members of the government knew about it until after it was published.

Mr. Blake said he was instructed to ask whether he got any money from the firm of Stratton & Hall last August, and he replied he was willing to produce all his books.

Asked why Gamey proposed to send two incriminating letters to the premier, he replied that was for Gamey to explain.

The reason Gamey did not go to the premier for the letter might have been because he knew him (Stratton) better than the premier; but he (Gamey) did not give any reason, merely asking him to get the letter.

He never answered the letter of Gamey of November 4, asking for \$2,000 loan, because he had no money to loan. "To close the examination," said Mr. Blake, "you won't tell us where the money came from."

"I don't know," said Mr. Stratton. "There are the books; you are welcome to examine them."

Mr. Johnston then began the re-examination. Gamey never used the words to him, "sold my people," nor was anything said about the constituency being sold. Members on both sides of the house consulted him about different matters, but there was no occasion for him to be hostile to any of them, Liberal or Conservative, and he never was.

Johnston noted one letter from him was addressed "My dear Gamey," and another "Dear Sir," and asked the reason for the distinction.

Mr. Stratton: "I may have been thinking of 'My Dear Foy,' a hit at Mr. Blake and his letter to Foy, M.P.P., previous to the last election."

Continuing, he said it was never held out to Gamey that his support of the government would be of any benefit to him.

THE MONTREAL STRIKES.

Number of Men Out Steadily Increasing—

May 4.—We have had very fine weather of late, but are having quite a rain today. The water is still rising.

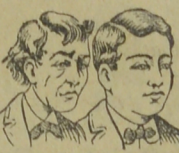

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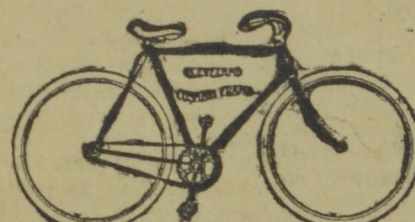
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
