The Peculiar Habits of the Historian's Daily Life.

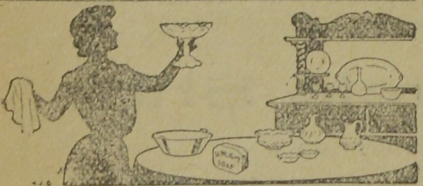

For some extraordinary reason his dinner hour was 7.50, and he was very punctual. 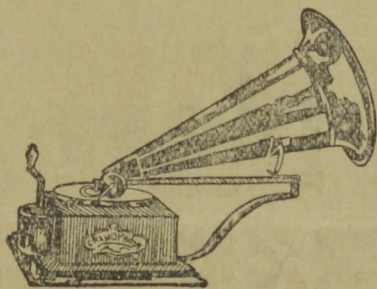

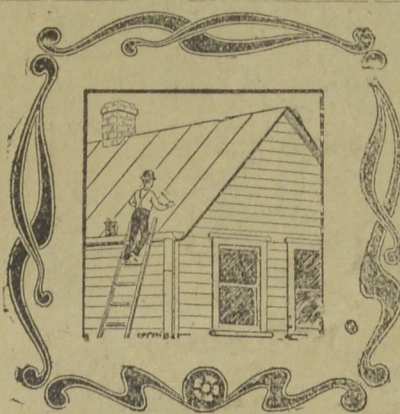

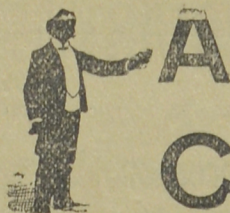
