RINGING SPEECH.

Hon. H. R. Emmerson, M. P., Rouses Westmorland Liberal Convention,

AND PREDICTS A GREAT VICTORY FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

The "Noble County" Will Return a Full Government Delegation.

At the Westmorland Liberal convention to nominate candidates for the local legislature in support of the government, Hon. H. R. Emmerson, M. P., on rising to speak was received with loud cheers. He said that it must cheer the heart of every true Liberal to see such a large and representative gathering here today and called at such very short notice. His own feelings since coming were of a very mixed character and somewhat reminiscent. He had mentally been glancing over the past history of Liberal conventions in this county. Our conventions were always held but they were not always so successful as in recent years. But though formerly smaller in numbers than now, there were always much true zeal and enthusiasm. It had been in the past impossible to trample the Liberals out of existence. Their fighting qualities were excellent. The last Liberal convention held in this city marked the turning of the tide in Liberalism in this county. (Cheers.)

A voice "Yes and we conquered." Mr. Emmerson proceeding "Yes we conquered and will do it again." (Renewed cheers.)

Continuing, Mr. Emmerson said—"As your representative in the Federal Parliament for the County of Westmorland, I have always endeavored to deal out even-handed justice to all, irrespective of personal feelings. I thank you heartily for the confidence you reposed in me by electing me as your representative. It has not been our habit, as a party, to elect representatives at Fredericton, based particularly on Dominion party lines. I have always had the courage of my convictions. I do not think today that it is in the interests of a province or of a city, that their provincial affairs should be carried on on Dominion Federal lines. There are circumstances, however, which put a different aspect on the state of affairs. I think the time has come in the history of this province, and this county, when from the instincts of self-preservation the Liberal party has to take that stand. In 1900 there was a convention of the Conservative party held in this city. They laid down principles by resolution that the affairs of the province should be carried on on Dominion party lines. The result was that after the election, four members and a half one, were returned in the interests of the opposition party at Fredericton. Now Mr. Hazen comes out and says he is willing to have Liberals come in with him. His stand is only a masked battery. The object is to catch the Liberals napping. If he once reaches that citadel, he will throw off his mask and appear in his true colors." (Enthusiastic cheering.) "In the interests of the Liberal party it is our duty to stand shoulder to shoulder and fight out the great cause of Liberalism."

Continuing, Mr. Emmerson pointed out that when he was leader of the provincial government, the Tory press didn't have much good to say about him, now they say that if Emmerson was leader, there would be some reason for the Liberals to support the government. The present effort of the Tory press is to vilify Tweedie and Pugsley. It is only a question of history repeating itself. Mr. Emmerson referred to the vilification by the Tory press, of

Hon. Alex. McKenzie, when he was leader of the Liberal government, and after he had passed away, this same Tory press canonized him as a saint in comparison with his successor. The Tory party think that it is in their own interests to down the Tweedie government at Fredericton. "What for?" asked Mr. Emmerson. "Simply that it may be able to get control of this province in the Conservative interests for the next federal election. I feel it to be my bounden duty to stand up and support the present government at Fredericton. I think it is the duty of every true Liberal if he wants to serve his party. From my judgment and knowledge, I say the government is better in the hands of those who are there now than if it were in the hands of the opposition. There will be no question as to the success of the Liberal party in this county in the coming election. It all depends upon the Liberals themselves. The party as a party in this county can send four representatives to Fredericton, and I believe they will send them."

Mr. Emmerson's closing remarks were most enthusiastically applauded.

THE LATE W. W. GRAHAM.

Appreciative Sketch of the Deceased Gentleman.

Dumfries, Feb. 14.—An event which has cast a gloom over Prince William and the neighboring parishes, is the death on the 10th inst., of Mr. Wm. W. Graham, after an illness of only a few days. Until within about three weeks, deceased was in his usual health, and went about his work with something of his old time energy and despatch. He was taken by what the doctor thought was an attack of indigestion, and for eight or ten days struggled manfully with his indisposition and his work, until within a week and a half ago, when he returned to his daughter's, Mrs. James M. Scott. His doctor was then called and pronounced his trouble peritonitis. The disease spread rapidly, and notwithstanding all that loving hands and best skill could do, he gradually sank into extreme weakness until the peaceful, victorious end on the 10th inst. in his 62nd year.

His funeral, which took place on the 12th inst., was perhaps the largest we have seen. Very appropriate services were conducted by Rev. H. Montgomery, at Springhill, after which the remains were interred in St. Clements church yard beside those of his beloved wife.

Mr. Graham was one of our best known and most highly respected citizens. For years and years he represented the parish at the municipal council, and until his resignation a year or two ago, discharged the duties of the position in such a way as to do himself and his constituents credit and honor. He was a man of cheerful and genial disposition. The firm grasp of his hand and the kind look from his eyes did one good like a medicine. One brother, Gilbert, of Magundy, survives him, besides whom he leaves a large family to mourn the loss of one of the most indulgent of parents. At Aberdeen, Wash., George, Miss Cassie, and Mrs. Wm. Thomson reside. Pat Graham of Medicine Hat is another son. Robert and Arthur, Lucinda and Ethel, Mrs. Thos. Davidson and Mrs. James Scott are residents of their native county, to all of whom the warmest and sincerest sympathy of the community goes forth in their sudden bereavement.

Feb. 13.—Mrs. Elizabeth Burrell, wife of Isaac Burrell of Tweedside, died at her home there early this morning after a short illness of pneumonia. Deceased lady was in the eightieth year of her age. She was a native of Northumberland County, England, her maiden name being Nesbitt. She was one of four brothers and three sisters of that name who came to Harvey amongst the first settlers. Early in life she married a soldier named Barclay, belonging to the regiment stationed at Fredericton at that time. She returned to England with her husband, and on the outbreak of the Crimean war he was sent to the front where he fell before the famous fortress of Sebastopol. She returned to her people here and afterwards married Mr. Burrell. Besides an aged mother she leaves one sister, Mrs. Grieve of Comox, B. C., and one son and one daughter residing here, Thos. Burrell, and Mrs. Alex. Swan, jr., also a son and daughter of her former marriage, Mr. John Barclay, of Comox, B. C., and Mrs. Wm. Atkinson, of Houlton.
