

A LONG CHASE.

A Notorious Irish Criminal Captured at Indianapolis.

HAS EVADED THE POLICE OF TWO CONTINENTS FOR YEARS.

Will Be Taken Back to Ireland for Trial.

James Lynchehaun, the notorious Irish criminal and prison breaker, who escaped from Maryborough Goal last year, has been arrested at Indianapolis through the efforts of American detectives and members of the Royal Irish Constabulary. Sensational developments are likely to follow.

Assistance in Ireland and co-operation and financial support by influential men in Chicago are said to account for Lynchehaun's good fortune in evading the police of two continents. The prisoner a man of good family, was formerly a school teacher, and at one time a police officer.

The question whether or not he had been employed as a spy by the British Government has aroused great bitterness in Irish circles, particularly in Chicago, and Lynchehaun, has his sympathisers and accusers. His arrest was the direct result of his meeting with Mr. Michael Davitt in Chicago several months ago.

DENOUNCED BY MR. DAVITT.

When Lynchehaun extended the hand of greeting, Mr. Davitt denounced him and called for the police. Lynchehaun fled, but the incident called attention to his presence in Chicago, and resulted in putting the police on his track. The detectives eventually found him through following his wife and son, who were hastening to join him.

Several detectives are now bringing Lynchehaun to New York. His identification is complete, and he will probably be taken to Ireland in an early steamer.

To this it may be added that Lynchehaun is forty-four years of age, a native of Achill Island, off the coast of Mayo. He early developed roving and lawless propensities. He left his native island for Galway, but got into trouble there, and fled to Manchester. There he joined the local police, and is said at one time to have had a warrant in his possession for his own arrest for an offence committed in Ireland.

Eventually he left the constabulary and returned to Achill Island, where he obtained the post of bailiff on the estate of Mrs. Agnes McDonnell. He failed to give satisfaction, and at the end of three

months she dismissed him. Lynchehaun determined to murder her.

STORY OF THE MURDER.

On the night of Oct. 6, 1894, she was alone and in bed at her house, when she noticed that the stables were on fire. The bailiff came to the house, and asked her for the keys of the stable to let out the horses. Mrs. McDonnell gave them to him, and was returning to her room, when Lynchehaun caught her, dragged her into the burning building, and made a determined effort to throw her into the flames.

In her struggle she fell, and Lynchehaun tried to strangle her. He also struck her a terrific blow on the head. She became insensible, and he left her for dead. For several days the woman remained unconscious. When she was examined it was found that the frontal bone of her head was fractured, while her nose and a portion of her upper lip had been bitten off by human teeth, one of her eyes destroyed and the other permanently injured.

Lynchehaun, after firing the house, fled, but was soon arrested. While he was being driven to Castlebar gaol, however, he jumped from the car, handcuffed as he was, and ran into a wood. For half a year he remained at liberty, though 250 constables were searching for him. His capture is said to have been due to his desire that a friend might secure the reward of £100 offered for him.

LYNCHEHAUN HAS RECORD.

Lynchehaun was tried for attempted murder at the Castlebar Assizes on July 17, 1895, and was sentenced to life-long penal servitude. He was confined in Maryborough Convict Prison, in Queen's county, and here he made his successful dash for liberty.

On the night of Sept. 6, 1902, he destroyed the lock and tell-tale indicator of his cell, and ascended a staircase to the roof. There he climbed down to the ground by a drain pipe, scaled the outer wall, 27 feet high, by means of a rope and two planks, and disappeared into space.

The hue and cry was quickly raised. A second reward of £100 was offered for his capture, and an enquiry by the gaol authorities resulted in four of the warders being severely punished.

The chase of Lynchehaun over the United Kingdom lasted for months, and was the cause of many innocent persons bearing a more or less remote resemblance to the criminal being arrested. Among these was an ex soldier with an honorable record in the Boer war, a clergyman, a missionary, and a lunatic. For many months the chase on the other side of the Atlantic had been given up.
