Fifth Annual Convention of the Order of King's Daughters

OPENED IN THE K. OF P.
HALL FRIDAY EVENING.

Address of Welcome by
Mrs. F. P. Thompson.

A LOT OF BUSINESS TRANSACTED AT
TODAY'S SESSION.

The fifth convention of the New Brunswick International Order of the King's Daughters, opened in the K. of P. Hall, Carleton street, last evening, with about thirty delegates in attendance. The hall was prettily decorated for the occasion, white and blue, the emblematic colors being used, and conspicuously displayed on one of the wall was the insignia of the order. Besides the delegates there were a number of visitors present.

Mrs. Isabella Davis of New York, formally declared the convention open, after which an address of welcome to the city was delivered by Mrs. F. P. Thompson. Mrs. J. E. Dean of St. John and Mrs. Davis responded in felicitous terms. The remainder of the session was taken up with business of a routine character.

This morning's session opened with the usual devotional exercises, conducted by Miss Brown of Toronto, who fills the important position of Dominion secretary.

Miss Barker of St. John, the provincial secretary, then read her report, which dealt with the work of the order in New Brunswick during the past year. The report was of a most interesting character and was listened to with marked attention.

There was a brief discussion of the report, taken part in by Miss Brown, Mrs. Davis, Mrs. Thompson and Miss Thorne.

Reports from a number of the circles were then read to the meeting. Mrs. H. G. Chestnut presented that of the ministering circle of the city, which showed that \$161.42 had been collected during the year and \$120.73 had been expended in giving relief to thirty-one families. Miss Mabel Gaynor read the report of the Fredericton High School Circle.

Miss Meliss of Charlottetown submitted a most encouraging report on the work in Prince Edward Island.

A well considered and most entertaining paper on "Rais" prepared by Miss Knowlton of St. John was read to the meeting by Miss Thorne.

At twelve o'clock the convention adjourned until this evening at eight.

This afternoon the delegates are being entertained to a drive about the city by the local branch and they will be entertained to tea at the K. of P. Hall.

TRUSTEES MEET.

Special Session of School Board Yesterday—Overflow of Pupils Provided For.

Principal Foster, of the High school was invited to a special meeting of the school trustees yesterday to confer with them and Secretary Sampson with a view to a more equitable distribution of the pupils under the various teachers. The register of attendance this term is so large that some of the lady teachers have pupils far beyond the number limit, and the excess has been coupled with an unequal proportion in the two grades under each. The principals of the schools have had the matter under consideration and the discussion between Mr. Foster and the trustees yesterday will have the effect of restoring the equilibrium, and endowing each teacher with the utmost power to handle her respective grades.

The trustees present at the meeting were Dr. Atherton, chairman, Sheriff Sterling, Mr. Sharkey, Mr. Spurdin, Mr. Weddall, Dr. Vanwart and Mrs. Dayer. A committee was appointed to act with Mr. Foster in completing the details of a comprehensive plan for permanent rearrangement. By this means some of the teachers who have had classes of 60 pupils each will have their burdens lightened, and teachers of the primary grades will be able to accomplish better work in their departments.

The Board had much pleasure in granting Principal Perry's request for temporary absence on the auspicious occasion which calls for it. At the end of the month, it is understood that he

will lead captive one of the fair daughters of Carleton county, and though the newest he will be the first among the schools of the city proper to venture on the experiment of housekeeping. Mr. DeLong will be the substitute at Charlotte street for Principal Perry during his absence.

A request from Prof. McCready of the schools of manual training, to have three pupils from the Charlotte street department at work during the regular school hours at the exhibition, was complied with. The Professor is bound to make the best showing possible for the school on this occasion, and he will receive the active cooperation of the School Board for this purpose.

Samuel Honang, whose Chinese parents are British subjects, and among the wealthiest of the residents of the Island of Damerara, has been denied a landing by the immigration inspector at New York, on the ground that it would be a violation of the Chinese exclusion act. Mr. Honang, who is a well-educated and loyal citizen of the empire, has never seen China, and came to America to tour the Continent. He is staying on a steamer in New York harbor while the Treasury Department officials at Washington decide on his case.
