## DYNAMITE EXPLOSION.

Nova Scotia Contractor and Another Instantly Killed.

Montreal, May 27.—An explosion of dynamite near Labelle, Tuesday, resulted in J. Lawrence Sutherland, railway contractor of River John N. S. and Frederick Migner, boarding house keeper, being killed, and Telesphore Michaud of Labelle being seriously injured.

Michaud was using a rod to force the dynamite down to the bottom of a fifteen foot hole where the blast was.

Migner was blown fifty feet through the air, landing at his wife's feet.

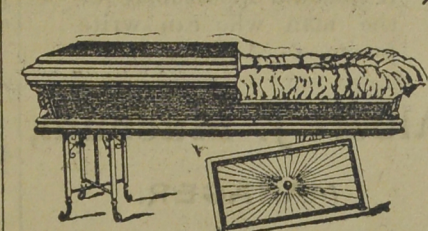

## MORE IMMIGRANTS.

Halifax, May, 27. The steamship Bulgaria, with three thousand immigrants, arrived here this morning. They go west on five special trains, the first leaving this evening.

## BURNED TO DEATH.

Charlottetown, May 27.—Mrs. Dougan, aged 84, was burned to a crisp in a fire, which destroyed her son's residence at Donaldson, near Bedford last night. She belongs here, and was visiting her son.

## DESTRUCTIVE TORNADO.

Blanchard, Iowa, May 27.—A most destructive tornado struck the town of Elmo, six miles from here last night, killing nine persons outright and injuring five others. Over 40 buildings were blown to pieces.

## GOVERNMENT IN DANGER.

Victoria, B. C., May 27.—As a result of their connection with the land scandal investigation, Premier Prior has asked Attorney General Eberts and Wells, Minister of Crown Lands, to resign. The government may be defeated.

## TENEMENT TRAGEDY.

New York, May 27.—Four persons were suffocated to death and two others were fatally burned in a fire, believed to be of incendiary origin, in an apartment house on 135th. street this morning. The building was only slightly damaged.

## THE MEN BEATEN.

Montreal, May 26.—The city has a vastly improved street railway service today, over 100 cars being in operation in all lines, including a suburban service. Many old employees are returning to work, and it is generally recognized that the men are beaten.

## HALIGONIAN'S SUDDEN DEATH.

Halifax, May 27.—James Mitchell, formerly of the West India firm of G. P. Mitchell & Sons, and brother of George Mitchell, M. P. P., was found dead today in his new residence. He was boarding at Wolfville. He was a prominent citizen and was about moving to the country for his health.

## STEAMER FOUNDERED.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Antwerp, Belgium, May 27.—The British steamer, Huddersfield, Captain Hamon, which sailed from this port last evening, collided with the Norwegian steamer, Uto, and is reported to have foundered. Fifteen or twenty passengers are said to be drowned. The crew were saved. The passengers were mostly seamen, returning to England, and it is believed they were crushed to death.

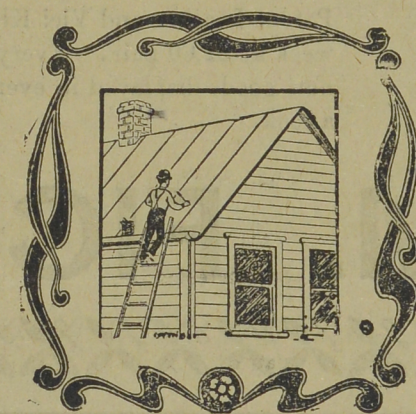
