The Ontario legislature, after one of the longest sessions on record, has been prorogued. The man from Manitoulin occupied the centre of the stage during most of the session, and comes out of it with a reputation.

The Ottawa Free Press, Liberal organ of Ottawa, has passed into the hands of Mr. Alfred Wood of Toronto. The paper was established thirty-five years ago by Mr. C. W. Mitchell who now passes it over to Mr. Wood. The Free Press will continue to support the government.

Mr. C. J. Milligan is to be sincerely congratulated on the verdict of a St. John jury in the libel suit which he brought to vindicate his good name before the public. He has had to put up with a great deal of unpleasant insinuation in connection with the crooked Rothesay electoral list, but Saturday's verdict will probably deter further efforts in that direction to besmirch Mr. Milligan's reputation. The forging of the list was a serious, stupid crime, but those who knew Mr. Milligan never believed that he would lend himself to any such offence.

Referring to the Halifax despatch that Premier Tweedie and Dr. Inch had made arrangements for New Brunswick deaf and dumb pupils to be educated at the Halifax school, Mr. Harvey Brown who is endeavoring to establish a school at St. John, says the Halifax report is misleading; that the matter has yet to come before the local government. The Herald does understand the matter that way. The Premier and Dr. Inch were appointed a committee of the Board of education to make arrangements with the Halifax authorities, and we fancy their action is final. There does not seem to be any great public demand for Mr. Brown's proposed school, and that gentleman whose generosity we have before commended, could better employ his means and his energy in some other philanthropic endeavor, than in an effort to establish another deaf and dumb school in this province.

A SPANISH TRAGEDY.

Thirty Persons Killed in a Railway Accident.

Madrid, June 29.—Fourteen bodies and five injured persons have been extricated from the wreck of the Bilbao train which overturned at Nejerilla River last night.

According to official information thirty persons were killed and sixty officers seriously injured. Many of the latter will die. Of the three hundred passengers on the train it is stated that only six escaped unhurt.

The train which was composed of two engines and sixteen coaches was crossing the bridge when the couplings between the engine broke. The second engine left the track and fell, followed by the entire train, to the bed of the river. Fortunately the water was low. The nearest medical attendance was a mile and a half distant, and those passengers who were least

injured aided the others and did all possible until the arrival of relief trains bringing nurses, doctors and soldiers from Bilbao.

Cheap Trip.
