WAR PROBABLE.

Turkish Authorities Persecuting Bulgarians.

WHO MAY BE GOADED INTO REBELLION.

London, June 29.—A despatch from Vienna says that the situation in Vilayet, Adrianople, is very grave.

There are many indications that Bulgaria and Turkey regard an outbreak of war as a probable contingency. It is reliably stated that Turkish authorities are organizing a regular persecution of Bulgarian inhabitants, their villages being razed to the ground and many notable Bulgarians being imprisoned on slight pretexts.

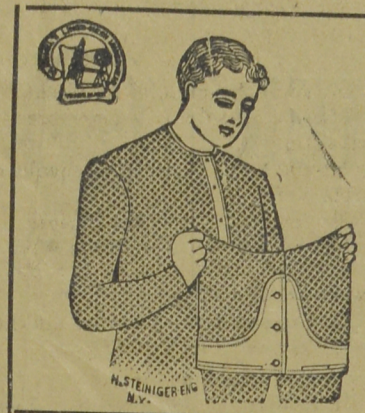
