

WHO'S LYING.

Frank Sullivan Contradicts Gamey's Story.

DECLARES HE NEVER RECEIVED MONEY FROM STRATTON.

Bank Managers on the Stand.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Toronto, April 25.—This morning's session of the Gamey investigation was devoted to further probing of bank accounts. Chas. McGill, general manager of the Ontario bank, was called to the stand.

The examination of the books has more than one object in view. Not only does the prosecution want to find out whence came the money which Gamey is alleged to have received, but they are also trying to trace the deposit which may have been made by Frank Sullivan, or some one else acting for him.

Toronto, April 25.—The cross examination of Frank Sullivan, was commenced by Mr. Johnston when the Gamey-Stratton investigation was resumed yesterday morning.

Sullivan denied emphatically he ever received any money from Gamey or that he ever got any money from the government other than the \$2 a day, he was drawing as departmental clerk.

His talk about "deals" with Gamey had happened because the government had a small majority and needed support and Gamey said he was going to support it.

Gamey had complained he was not getting enough patronage and that their timber "deal" was not going through, but Gamey had given witness to understand the inducement offered him was that he was to be minister of mines.

Another deal that had not before come out in evidence was mentioned, when Sullivan admitted he and Gamey were in correspondence with H. H. Collin, of St. Catharines in regard to some pulp lands.

The story that the parcel of money was delivered to Gamey or witness in the smoking room of the parliament buildings from Stratton was denied by Sullivan, and he also denied there was any written document between them about Gamey receiving \$5,000 for his support, consequently he never tore up such document as Gamey said.

Ontario Bank Teller Bartlett was examined and a careful search was made through the books which he produced for anything relating to \$3,000 which Gamey said was given him from Mr. Stratton on September 10 and a half of which he deposited at the Traders' Bank.

Sullivan gave some details of the interview between Gamey and Stratton and said when the latter used the word "consideration" it simply meant that Gamey would receive the same consideration as other supporters of the government.

"That is a lie," said Sullivan emphatically when confronted with Gamey's statement that they had divided \$3,000 on Ontario Banks bills.

Upon the subject of the Crossin piano factory episode Sullivan said while he did not know any one was concealed there, he noticed a wet umbrella on the chair and that made him suspicious. Stratton, he said, knew nothing of any deals between himself and Gamey.

Frank Ford, stenographer of the treasury department, admitted typewriting "X. Y. Z." letter and enclosure to Gamey in which the latter was told how to deal with this Manitoulin constituents. He did this at the request of Sullivan.

He also typewrote the Globe interview and letter Gamey signed, in which the latter agreed to support the Ross government. Mr. Stratton had asked him to do this.

There was one entry on September 13

of ten 50's, and ten 100's. in Ontario Bank bills received through the clearing house from the Traders' Bank in one parcel.

RUSH OF IMMIGRATION.

Nearly 3,000 Persons Landed Today at Halifax.
