The booms at Douglas, Sugar Island and Lincoln are now in readiness for the reception of lumber, and the shear booms at Crock's Point are also in position. A few new logs from the Tobique, the first of the season, ran into the Sugar Island boom yesterday afternoon.

Fire at the Grove.

The fence between Scully's grove and Queen Square caught fire yesterday afternoon in some mysterious way and suffered considerable damage. The fire department was called to the scene, and with the aid of a hose was not long in extinguishing the flames. Whether the fire was set by a spark from a locomotive, or whether it was set by some small boys playing in the vicinity, is a matter not yet determined.

Home from Europe.

Randolph, but remained there for a few days to visit Charles F. Randolph, another son at present located at the Hub. Miss Randolph, who accompanied her mother on her trans-Atlantic trip, will remain in England for some weeks longer with Capt. and Mrs. D. I. V. Eaton.

A Boy Seriously Injured.

Bert Dunphy, the fourteen year old son of Edward Dunphy, who is employed at C. H. Burt's grocery store, met with a painful accident at St. Mary's yesterday afternoon. A horse attached to the grocery delivery wagon, which he was driving, ran away, and he was thrown heavily to the ground. He was immediately removed to his home and a physician who was called in found that his left leg had been fractured above the knee and that he had sustained other injuries, but of a less serious nature. The broken bone was reset and he is reported to be resting easily today.

PRETTY SERIOUS CHARGE.

Two Young Men in Jail Accused of "Firing" the Blue Shanty.

The firemen were called out shortly before twelve o'clock last evening by an alarm from Box 36 for a slight blaze in a wooden tenement on Regent Street, owned by Archie Jewett and familiarly known as the "blue shanty." The building, though unoccupied, has been the scene of several incipient fires of late, and there seems to be a determination on the part of somebody to send it up in smoke. When the firemen reached the spot last night, in response to the alarm, they found a slight blaze inside the building, and were able to extinguish it before any great damage had been done.

Robert King and Alfred Elliott, two young men well known about the hotels and livery stables of the city, were found acting in a suspicious manner by Policemen Rideout and O'Neill near the scene of the threatened conflagration and both were placed under arrest. They are charged with having set the fire, and the police claim to be in the possession of evidence that will substantiate the charge. It is claimed that after the alarm was rung in both young men were seen scurrying through the Barker House alley in the direction of Queen street, and a conversation of theirs, in which they made use of such expressions as "mum's the word," were overheard by a third party. The police carefully examined the footprints made in the soft mud in rear of the blue shanty, and claim that they correspond in size with the boots worn by the prisoners.

King and Elliot, spent the night in the police station, and this morning were arraigned before Judge Marsh on the charge made against them by the police. They signified their readiness to have the trial proceed, but the prosecution not having all the witnesses ready, an adjournment was made until Monday, and the accused remanded to jail.

The police are confident that there are others mixed up in the affair, and it is likely that further arrests will follow. King and Elliot are not accused of sounding the alarm of fire, but the public and firemen seem to be quite sure that the persons who applied the match, and afterwards pulled the hook of the fire alarm box, were one and the same.

Colored Gents in Trouble.

George Peters and John Wright, two well known colored gents, were before the police court this morning on the complaint of City Marshal Roberts, charged with depositing night soil on the roadside near the residence of Robert Aiken. Both were convicted of the offence, but Col. Marsh announced that at the request of the prosecutor he would defer passing sentence until Wednesday next. He intimated that if the defendants would in the meantime remove the night soil, he would be inclined to deal more leniently with them than he otherwise would.

The city bills introduced in the legislature last week, will probably be dealt with by the municipalities committee on Wednesday. Secretary-treasurer Blise and Warden Grosvenor will strongly oppose the bill to give the city council representation on the county administration of justice committee. The sewerage and election bills will also be opposed.

The matinee given at the opera house this afternoon by the Hospital Aid society was highly successful in every particular. The audience, which was made up largely of ladies and children, was a large and appreciative one. The program was exactly the same as presented on Thursday evening.

A REAL CURIOSITY.

Jacobs Weazel's Live Eagle an Object of Much Interests.

It is not a difficult matter to tame the wild goose, as several residents of this locality have demonstrated, but so far as known, (Jacob Weazel), the King street junk dealer, is the only person in these parts who has made a success of domesticating the eagle. Mr. Weazel has had in his possession for several years one of these birds, and it seems to get along swimmingly in captivity. It is a very large specimen of the grey variety, and was captured at Grand Lake, Queens county, when quite young, and brought to Fredericton. Mr. Weazel deems it advisable to keep his pet shut up the greater part of the time, not because he is afraid of it leaving him, for it is too much attached to its owner to do that, but he knows that if allowed the run in the back yard, and Barker House alley it would be constantly waging war upon stray cats and dogs, as well as roosters and hens, and causing no end of trouble in the neighbourhood. The bird is domiciled in a large dry goods box in rear of Mr. Weazel's residence, and is naturally an object of much interest.

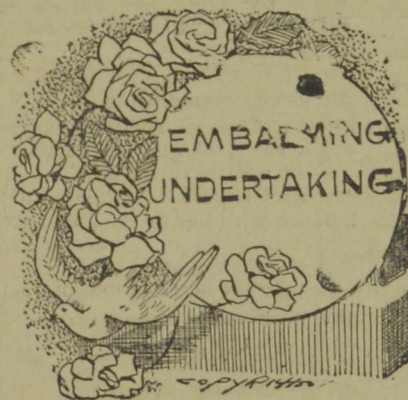
