

MYSTERY SOLVED.

Girl Kidnapped Thirteen Years Ago.

PROBABLY LOCATED AMONG INDIANS.

The Victim Belonged to an Ontario Village.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., May 12.—From information recently received in the "Soo," it is believed that Maud Gillespie, who, as a girl thirteen years of age, mysteriously disappeared from her home near Thessalon, [thirteen years ago this coming summer, has been found living with Indians at Green Lake.

Maud Gillespie lived with her parents about three miles out of Thessalon. One morning in the summer she started to go into the little village, and has never been seen nor heard from by her relatives since then.

Thessalon at that time was a little place, of perhaps 500 or 600 inhabitants, who earned their living in a couple of sawmills established in what was then little more than a wilderness.

Late in the evening, after the parents of the girl had become alarmed at her absence, the entire population turned out to search for her, but no trace was found that night nor the following day.

Excitement became intense, and the mills were shut down and all kinds of business ceased while the people hunted for the girl. For two weeks this kept up without avail, and the neighboring towns of the two "Soo's" were searched, because of rumors that the girl had been seen in them; but no trace of any sort or description could be found, and at last she was given up for dead and the search abandoned.

Years passed and her father died. Her mother married a man named Dunphy, and now lives in the Canadian "Soo." Maud Gillespie has been forgotten by all but her mother, who has never given up hope of seeing her daughter again. A short time ago an old resident of Thessalon named White, while travelling on the "Soo" branch of the Canadian Pacific railway, overheard two prospectors who had been exploring the almost unknown regions back of Thessalon, telling of a white woman whom they had found living with Indians there. These Indians live in a most primitive manner in tents and few of them can speak a word of English.

White was interested in the story and soon called to mind the strange disappearance of Maud Gillespie thirteen years ago. He enquired of the prospectors regarding the woman, and upon his return communicated with Mrs. Dunphy, who has seen the Indian agent and taken the matter to the Government, asking that steps be taken to recover the girl, which will undoubtedly be done.

The story told by the prospectors is an interesting one. They had been exploring the regions back of Thessalon in search of mineral wealth, and had seen no human being for weeks. Suddenly they came upon this village of Indians on Green Lake, near Missisaga River, about 100 miles back of Thessalon. While trying to talk with the Indians, they were startled to see a white woman who appeared delighted when she heard them speak in English. They talked with her, and she told them that years ago, when she was a small girl, she had been stolen by Indians and had lived with them ever since, never seeing a white man except French trappers, with whom she was unable to talk. She was anxious to get away from the Indians and implored the prospectors to aid her. They promised to do so.

The girl speaks English in the manner of one who has not had occasion to use it for years, and is as unconfident as most of the Indians themselves. The prospectors found it necessary to use the simplest sort of language in order to make themselves understood. They said they were in

doubt as to whether the sight of the girl will be welcome to her mother.

THE LATE MRS. H. J. McGRATH.

An Esteemed Dorchester Lady Has Passed Away.

The many friends of Mrs. H. J. McGrath will regret to learn of her death which took place at Dorchester Saturday. Mrs. McGrath had been ill about ten days. She had been taking care of her mother, the late Mrs. King, and was very much worn out, being in a weakened condition when she contracted pneumonia. The deceased lady who passed away about twelve o'clock Saturday night, was very highly esteemed. Tributes to her memory were paid by the different clergymen in the town Sunday. Deceased was a daughter of the late Capt. Joshua King, of Dorchester. She was 49 years of age, and leaves a husband and five children. The sons are Dr. R. H. McGrath, Justin, D'Arcy and Cedric, and a daughter, Dorsey, about six years old. She leaves one sister, Mrs. (Rev.) A. W. Teed, and a brother, F. J. King, of the I. C. R. Moncton.

A Dorchester correspondent writing to The Transcript says: The deadly pneumonia has claimed its third victim in the thrice bereaved family of Mr. H. J. McGrath. From the first appearance of the disease, Mrs. McGrath had the tenderest and most scientific care, but her constitution, greatly weakened by the heroic care given to her mother, Mrs. King, and her brother-in-law, Hance Masters, in their last illness, precluded the possibility of a successful rally against the disease, and at 11.30 on Saturday night, death claimed the victory, leaving a husband bereft of an ideal wife, also four sons and one daughter motherless. The community is appalled at the repeated calls of the "Pale Messenger" in this town, and the bereaved family are the recipients of scores of messages of sympathy.

SIR OLIVER'S WILL.

Devises an Estate of \$105,000 to His Children.

ONE-QUARTER EACH GOES TO MISS MOWAT AND ARTHUR MOWAT

And One-Sixth Each to the Rest—Details of Estate.

The will of the late Lieutenant-Governor, Sir Oliver Mowat, has been filed for probate at Toronto. The estate amounts to \$105,340.79, and is devised as follows:—Three-twelfths each to Mr. Arthur Mowat and Miss Mowat, and two-twelfths each to Sheriff Mowat, Mrs. C. R. W. Biggar and Mrs. Thos. Langton. The estate was made up of realty, \$40,864.66, and personality, \$64,476.13.

The will which is dated Sept. 10th, 1902, is witnessed by Mr. Justice Maclean and Thos. Lynch, and appoints the two sons and Miss Mowat executors and executrix. The following special bequests are made:—To Sheriff Mowat the portrait presented by the Liberal members of the sixth Parliament of Ontario, and his mother's portrait, painted by G. A. Reid; "also the book of family worship, in which are recorded, in my handwriting, births, deaths and marriages, and the old family Bible, if in existence, in which there are some like entries made by my father."

"My letter books, containing letters received and sent, respectively, and all my manuscript I wish destroyed, with the exception of any which I may mark for preservation, and with the exception of any papers not specifically marked for destruction, and which my executors and executrix and the survivors or survivor of them shall think I would approve their preserving. I do this because I have not now time nor leisure, and I may not hereafter have time or leisure to examine my papers with a view to a more definite disposition thereof. Any that, by endorsement or otherwise, I mark for destruction shall be destroyed accordingly immediately after my death; but such marking is not to be deemed a part of this will."

The Typhoid Epidemic.

Ithaca, N. Y., May 12.—Dr. Geo. Soper, representative of the New York State Board of Health, who has been in Ithaca since the last of February to assist the authorities in their efforts to stamp out the typhoid fever epidemic, made public tonight a report addressed to the Common Council of Ithaca, which covers his investigations. Concerning the statistics of the epidemic, Dr. Soper said:—"So far as can be said at present there have been 955 cases and 64 deaths. This ranks the epidemic among the most important in modern times in this part of the world. Of the total number of cases, 288 were students and the remainder townspeople. The number of Cornell students who died of typhoid fever as a result

of the epidemic is 29. Of these thirteen died at Ithaca. At the present time there are 19 typhoid fever cases in bed and 35 convalescents. Since April 1 there have been eleven new cases and six deaths. Dr. Soper also states that recent examinations of the water supply from Six mile Creek have been made, and that the water was still polluted and impure.

Old Canadians Come Back to the West.

Toronto, May 12.—Mr. D. D. Mann confirms the despatch from St. Paul that Col. A. D. Davidson, of Duluth, and associates, have purchased the entire land grant of the Canadian Northern, exceeding three million acres, the consideration being twelve million dollars. There was some inaccuracy about the number of acres, and also about the price, and he could not tell from memory exactly what these details were, but the despatch was correct in substance.

He stated it was an interesting fact that Mr. Davidson and two-thirds of his associates were old Canadians, and he expects that forty per cent. of the colonists whom the company would locate would also be former Canadians, who had resolved to return. The conditions of the sale required bona fide settlement of these lands, and he expected an enormous influx of settlers within the next few years.

The lands which have been sold are in Manitoba and the Northwest.

Treated Like Cattle.

Bay City, Mich., May 12.—Deputy United States Marshal Tobias, who has returned from a trip north, is authority for the statement that at Patterson's Mill, Mullet Lake, two young men, apparently between 26 and 30 years old, and believed to be insane, are kept chained in an out house by their parents. The men are shackled by the legs to chains about twelve feet long, fastened to a post in the centre of the outhouse. The chain permits them to get near a stove, and a trough at one side of the room is a receptacle for their food, which is thrown in exactly as in a pig's trough. In summer time the men are chained to a tree. They have been chained in this manner several years, and residents thereabouts say that the men are generally docile. Governor Bliss' attention will be called to the matter.

To Welcome Lord Minto.

Lansing, Mich., May 12.—A concurrent resolution extending a formal welcome to the Earl of Minto, Governor General of Canada, on behalf of the State of Michigan, on his visit to Detroit next Wednesday, passed the house yesterday, and will come up in the Senate Monday evening. It is expected to have it amended then so that a committee of five, consisting of three Representatives and two Senators, will be appointed to extend the welcome at Detroit.

Gamey Bubble Burst.

The Toronto Globe says: The opponents of the Ontario government, having staked their all on the truth of the Gamey charges, are showing significant signs of distress. In the legislature and in the press, with an eagerness and unreserve that were dangerous as well as suspicious, they took up the hue and cry, denounced the provincial secretary, and condemned the government. The member for Manitoulin was a stranger, his character unproved, his record unscrutinized, but with one accord they applauded his plot to overthrow the government, and stood ready to profit by its success. Their Parliamentary and journalistic leaders, to whom experience should have taught caution, were instant in their judgment and did their utmost to stampede public opinion against the accused Minister. All that was before the evidence was presented and examined.

But there is a change in the temper of the Opposition. A second and a steady look at the situation has awakened doubts. The hero of March 11 is cold shouldered in the Legislature, made the victim of faint praise in the press, and openly slighted by his legal counsellors. There is a growing fear among his erstwhile friends that because of their sudden and ill-considered alliance with him they will suffer politically, or journalistically, or professionally. They are again prejudging the case, this time to the hurt of the accused, and they are inventing ways of escape for themselves from what they fear will be regarded by the public as an irreparably damaging situation. They are plainly making ready for a breakdown of the Gamey charges, and they are bent on escaping the inevitable consequences.

Gamey Costs Ontario \$25,000.

Toronto, May 12.—With the end of the Gamey enquiry in sight, the public are beginning to speculate as to the probable cost of it all.

A conservative estimate by a man who is in a position to figure on the matter, places the total at \$25,000. Of this sum fully \$12,000 will be divided between Messrs. Blake, Ritchie, Johnson, Riddell, McPherson and McEvoy, the counsel engaged in the case.

About \$5,000 more will be required to pay the fees to which the commissioners are entitled, acting as they do in an extra judicial capacity. Fully \$3,000 has been consumed in witnesses' fees, while the bill for stenographic reporting and printing will be at least as large. After adding the rental of the court room, the constables' fees and other incidental expenses, it will easily be seen that the figure named is a moderate estimate of the bill which the people of the province will be called upon to foot in the end, no matter what the result may be.
