Proceedings of the Annual Meeting

AN ADDRESS BY PRESIDENT EDGE-COMBE.

Very Interesting Report From the Tourist Committee.

MR. DIBBLEE AND OTHER MEMBERS OF THE BOARD AIR GRIEVANCES.

The annual meeting of the Fredericton Board of Trade was held in the city council chamber Monday afternoon with the President, F. B. Edgecombe, in the chair and was one of the most successful in years. The other gentlemen present were:

Secretary McCready read the minutes of the last regular meeting, which were approved.

The secretary read a communication from the Montreal Chamber of Commerce, enclosing a copy of a resolution lately adopted by that body, urging the Imperial government to appoint Lord Strathcona the next governor-general of Canada. The communication asked for an endorsement of the proposition by the Fredericton board.

Another communication was read from a British Columbia board of trade asking for the support of the board in an effort to procure from the Dominion government an increase in the tariff on lead and lead products.

There was also read by the secretary a letter from the Montreal Board of Trade, requesting that delegates be sent to the Imperial Congress of the Boards of Trade of the Empire to be held in Montreal next August.

Mr. Wiley moved that all three communications be referred to the council.

Mr. Dibblee thought that the communications referred to matters with which the Board of Trade had nothing to do. The appointment of a governor general was a political matter, and he thought the board should have nothing to do with politics. He would move that the communications be received and placed on file. The motion was seconded by Mr. Hodge.

Mr. Chestnut thought that as the board had been represented at the Imperial Congress held at London a few years ago, they should consider the advisability of sending a delegate to Montreal.

Mr. Plinney spoke of the importance of the Montreal Chamber of Commerce, and regarded it but natural that having been a great benefactor to Montreal, the people of that city should be anxious to have Lord Strathcona appointed Governor General. If there was a great movement all over Canada in favor of Lord Strathcona's appointment he thought the board should take hold and assist.

After some further discussion the secretary was instructed to acknowledge the first two communications and the third was referred to the council.

M. Tennant, treasurer of the association, submitted his report, showing a balance on hand of \$20.97. Adopted.

TOURIST COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

C. Fred Chestnut, chairman of the Tourist Committee, then submitted his annual report as follows:

To the President and Members of the Fredericton Board of Trade:

Gentlemen:—The Tourist Committee of your honorable body beg leave to report as follows:

Immediately after its appointment one year ago, your committee waited upon the Provincial Government and strongly urge that a game exhibit from this province under government auspices be made at the Massachusetts Sportman's Show, advertised to open in Boston on February 22nd. The suggestion was heartily endorsed by Surveyor General Dunn, and after due consideration was acted upon by the government with highly satisfactory results. A splendid collection of 'mounted specimens of the fauna of New Brunswick, was forwarded to Boston and kept on exhibition there for nearly three weeks, being viewed by upwards of one hundred thousand persons. The splendid opportunity which the show afforded for reaching a large class of probable tourists was taken advantage of by your committee, and several of its members were in constant attendance at the very attractive booth fitted up by our government. Four thousand copies of the Fredericton tourist pamphlet were carefully distributed by them, besides a quantity of other literature descriptive of New Brunswick, furnished by the Intercolonial and Canadian Pacific Railways. This extensive advertising cannot fail to have a beneficial effect.

ADVERTISING FREDERICTON.

Early in the spring your committee communicated with a number of organizations in the large cities of the Eastern States, which make a business of circulating tourist literature, and succeeded in placing in their hands for distribution no less than 2,250 copies of the Fredericton tourist pamphlet as follows:

In addition to the above a great many single copies were mailed to applicants in the United States, the West Indies and Great Britain.

In the month of May your committee, by way of an experiment, had a small advertisement, setting forth the attractions of Fredericton, inserted in the Sunday edition of the New York Journal. It brought a number of letters of enquiry, which were given careful attention, and in every case a copy of the Fredericton pamphlet was mailed to the writer's address.

Your committee's next important step was to have printed in two colors ten thousand souvenir mailing cards, illustrating local scenery. These were placed on sale at the book stores and hotels, and your committee is pleased to report that a large number were disposed of during the season, chiefly to American tourists and other visitors.

By special arrangement with the publishers your committee was enabled to have inserted in the last June number of the National Magazine of Boston a five page illustrated article descriptive of Fredericton. The matter and engravings were furnished by your committee, and the cost of publication was largely defrayed by yearly subscriptions to the magazine which the committee were able to secure in Fredericton and vicinity.

BEAUTIFYING THE CITY.

Through the instrumentality of your committee a movement to further beautify the city by establishing flower beds at points much frequented by the public was set on foot at the beginning of last summer. A communication, suggesting that some improvements be made to Parliament Square, was forwarded to the Hon. Chief Commissioner of Public Works, and elicited a courteous reply assuring the committee that the matter would receive the careful consideration of the government. The committee is pleased to report that a modern fountain now adorns the centre of the square, and that no less than four flower beds have been placed about the grounds. The improvements were made under the super-

vision of Mr. T. B. Winslow, Secretary to the Public Works Department, who has displayed the greatest interest in the movement from the first. Thanks to the efforts of Postmaster Hilyard a large flower bed was erected on Fenety avenue, above the club house, the cost of the same being defrayed by public subscription, and your committee had another set up a few rods further down; and still another was established by Miss Ada Schleyer, the Charlotte street florist, at her own expense, at the head of Brunswick street near the Victoria Hospital. Your committee earnestly hopes that the newly organized local improvement association will give this matter its attention, and make an effort to have new flower beds established, as well as the old ones renewed year after year.

It is very gratifying to your committee to note that citizens have done more during the past season towards beautifying their premises, notably Mr. Henry Chestnut, who has made a decided improvement to the river bank in front of his residence. His example is one the committee would like to see emulated by others.

Through the good offices of our respected Lieutenant Governor, two smooth bore cannon of very large size were lately procured from the Dominion Government and mounted on the river bank in front of the Parliament buildings. Being veritable old timers, with a century or so of service to their credit, they cannot fail to be objects of much interest to the tourist.

VISITORS ENTERTAINED.

Miss Tenny, a talented young lady of Boston, made a tour of New Brunswick last season in search of material for a lecture which she is now delivering throughout the New England States. She spent two days in Fredericton taking notes of our city and its environment, and was entertained by the members of your committee, and also by His Worship the Mayor and Mrs. Crockett. She was shown all the points of interest and the fullest information was placed at her disposal.
