The Intercolonial railway under Mr. Blair's able management has doubled its revenue in four years.

Another town is to be added to the New Brunswick list. The ratepayers of Sackville Monday carried incorporation, the vote standing 167 for and 137 against.

Ontario Conservatives generally are kicking against clique rule in their party, and blame the machine for recent defeats. It was the Tory machine that helped to kill the party in this province.

The Moncton Times laments the disorganized condition of the Conservative party in New Brunswick, and calls for the appointment of a competent organizer working under a central committee. Is the Times also tiring of the Tory machine?

The St. John Globe, which unfairly attacked the local government in connection with Deaf and Dumb school matters, finds itself compelled to defend itself in a rear guard assault from the Telegraph. The Globe grows angry, scolds and threatens in a manner out of harmony with supposed senatorial dignity.

About once a week Tory correspondents start the yarn that Sir Wilfrid Laurier is about to retire from public life, and the premier has at last taken the trouble to deny the groundless rumors. He declares he feels good for at least one parliament more, and all his friends rejoice at his present fit physical condition.

The Ontario Liberals expect to add a couple more members to their ranks in the legislature. Petitions are pending, against the Conservative members for Centre Bruce and Sault St. Marie, and it is expected that both seats will be opened. The Tory majority in the former constituency has only seven in the general election.

The Calgary Herald speaks very highly of the late John R. Costigan, whose sudden death in that town last week was a great shock to his family and friends. The deceased gentleman was a native of Grand Falls, and his wife, formerly Miss Ada Dowling, was the daughter of a former well known resident of Fredericton. Mr. Costigan, who was a lawyer, son of Hon. John Costigan, stood high in his profession, and in the personal regard of the people among whom he lived in the west.

The Mayor of Ottawa, who is a Conservative newspaper man, in his inaugural address was constrained to bear testimony to the great prosperity of Canada. He says that "Canada is being born, our trade and commerce is developing in a marvellous degree, every line of industry is pulsating with new energy, the tide of immigration is commencing to pour in. This year it is estimated that there will be an increase in population, through immigration alone of 150,000 souls." Mr. Cook had no such opportunity for testifying in that manner during the Tory regime.

GOODSPEED CASE.

St. John, Jan. 13.—Speeches of the counsel for the defence and prosecution in the Goodspeed case were made this forenoon. Chief Justice Tuck delivered his charge to the jury, concluding shortly after noon when the jury retired.

LATER.—St. John, Jan. 13.—The jury in the Goodspeed trial disagree and are still out. If no decision is arrived at this afternoon they will be dismissed.

When Goodspeed was giving evidence in his own behalf yesterday, His Honor the Chief Justice took occasion to remark to the prisoner that he was taken with his appearance and bright, active mind. He felt convinced that the boy was telling absolutely the truth. He spoke to the boy quite kindly, telling him if he had had better training and not got in with bad companions he might have made a very clever man. These were the first kindly words that have been spoken to the boy since this trial began, at least, and they had the to be expected effect. Goodspeed hung his head and began to cry quietly. The eyes of the jurymen were wet, and even Mr. McKewen, the crown prosecutor, found it hard to overcome the wave of sympathy that influenced all.

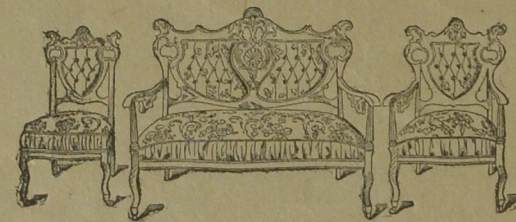
