TOO MANY CHILDREN.

Sad Tale of a New York Family and the Hard-Heartedness of the Landlords.

New York, Dec. 17.—After having lived seventeen years in the neighborhood of First Avenue, between Fifty-second and Fifty-third streets, where they are well known, Mr. and Mrs. John McCaffrey are at a loss to find a home owing to the possession of a family of nine children, to which their landlords invariably objected.

Mr. and Mrs. McCaffrey recently lived at No. 941 First Avenue, but they had to leave because of their many young children. They engaged rooms at No. 334 East Fifty-fourth Street, into which they moved Monday, a week ago. Again their new landlord was aghast when he beheld the size of the family that moved into the four room on the top floor. He shook his head and told the McCaffreys they would have to leave by the first of the next month.

According to the janitors of the various houses in which the family has lived, the McCaffrey children are quiet and give not the least trouble. The McCaffreys always pay their rent promptly and there is no objection to them other than that mentioned above.

"I don't know what on earth we are going to do," said Mrs. McCaffrey yesterday. "We want to stay in this neighborhood, because all the children have gone or are going to Public school No. 135, in First Avenue.

Our children are not noisy. But we can't stay in any place more than a month or so, because the landlords seem to think the family is too large.

Little Florence and Veronica, the youngest, are the only ones who stay at home. The two eldest girls work in a store, while the others go to school.

"They are good children, too. James and John get up at five o'clock every morning and work until eight o'clock in a bakery. Then they go to school.

"I had to hunt two weeks to get these rooms, and although there are only four of them, it is our home and we could make it pleasant enough. All our furniture is packed up and we don't dare to unpack it because we've got to leave again. Our only hope is that we may hear of some landlord who doesn't object to the presence of children."

Autocratic Application.

San Francisco, Dec. 17.—Referring to the case of Kenneth Harper, the New Zealand bank clerk, who was refused a landing here on the ground that he was violating the contract labor law, attorneys for the Bank of British North America say an appeal was made to secretary Cortelyou to have the decision of the local inspector of immigration set aside.

They assert that Mr. Harper comes under the exemption of the statute which allows landing of those engaged in a learned profession. Secretary Cortelyou did not grant the appeal and would not allow Harper to proceed to Victoria and enter the employ of a branch of the bank in that city, but insisted upon his deportation and return to New Zealand. Upon his return to New Zealand Harper immediately took passage by a Canadian line for Victoria.
