

INTERCOLLEGIATE DEBATES PLANNED

Report of Conference on
Debates.

Recently representatives of the various colleges of the maritime provinces met at Wolfville, and planned a series of inter-collegiate debates, the details of which will be found in the appended report:

Wolfville, N. S., Nov. 7, '03.

Your committee, representing Dalhousie, Acadia, St. Francis Xavier, University of N. B. and Mt. Allison, beg leave to submit the following report:

I. Kings, although not present, expressed by letter their hearty approval of the object of the conference.

II. General scheme for debates.

1. The debates shall be held annually according to the following schedule:

1st year—U. N. B. vs. Mt. Allison, Sackville; Acadia vs. St. Francis Xavier, Wolfville. Dalhousie out.

2nd year—Dalhousie vs. U. N. B., Halifax; St. Francis Xavier vs. Mt. Allison, Antigonish. Acadia out.

3rd year—Dalhousie vs. Mt. Allison, Sackville; Acadia vs. U. N. B., Fredericton. St. Francis Xavier out.

4th year—Dalhousie vs. St. Francis Xavier, Antigonish; Mt. Allison vs. Acadia, Wolfville. U. N. B. out.

5th year—Acadia vs. Dalhousie, Halifax; U. N. B. vs. St. Francis Xavier, Fredericton. Mt. Allison out.

2. This schedule shall be adhered to in following cycles, except that places of meeting shall alternate.

3. Any bona fide student of the colleges named not holding a college degree, shall be eligible to represent his college in these debates.

4. There shall be three speakers from each college, each speaker shall be allowed fifteen minutes, except speakers who shall close the debate, who shall be limited to ten minutes each.

5. The affirmatives shall have the closing speech.

6. No new arguments shall be advanced in the closing speeches.

7. The debate shall be decided by one judge, who shall not be a professor, lecturer or instructor in any of the colleges named, to be agreed upon by both colleges debating at least two weeks before time set for debate.

8. The decision shall be given on the basis of two-thirds for argument and one third for presentation.

9. The debate shall be held between Feb. 21, and March 31, on a date to be agreed upon by both colleges debating.

10. The resolutions shall be chosen by the visiting team, and announced by Dec. 1st; the home team shall have choice of sides and shall announce their choice by Dec. 10, except as provided for in sub. sec. 11.

11. If in the opinion of the home team, the statement or terms of the resolution are ambiguous, they may demand an explanation of the ambiguity and shall have ten days from time such explanation is received to announce their choice of side.

12. If visiting team fails to announce the resolution by Dec. 1, the home team shall have privilege of choosing both resolution and side.

13. The resolution shall be stated positively.

14. All resolutions dealing with religious topics shall be debarred.

15. Any subject debated in any year shall not be again proposed for at least five years.

16. Receipts and expenses of each debate shall be shared equally by the colleges debating.

III. There shall be a general committee known as the Maritime Inter-collegiate Debating Committee, which shall consist of one representative from each college named.

1. The duties of this committee shall be to settle all disputes and to make any additions or amendments to this scheme.

2. The chairman of this committee shall be the representative of the college not debating that year.

3. The chairman of this committee shall be notified of the names of her representatives by Oct. 10.

4. The chairman shall have a vote on all questions.

5. A tie vote shall be considered negative.

6. Additions or amendments shall require a unanimous vote.

7. The expenses of any meeting of this committee shall be shared equally by all colleges named.

IV. Should any of the colleges named fail to adopt this report, the remaining colleges shall carry out the plan embodied in this report with the necessary amendments in sec. 2, sub-sec. 1.

Railway Casualties.

Washington, Nov. 17.—The Interstate Commerce Commission today issued a bulletin showing a large increase in the number of railroad casualties in the year ended June 30, as compared with the previous year. There were 3,553 persons killed and 45,997 injured in the year, against 2,819 killed and 39,890 injured the year before. The large increase is partially attributed to the gain in railroad traffic and the increase of twelve per cent in the number of men employed in train service. It is also pointed out that accidents are now being much more fully reported.

KLONDIKE'S FUTURE.

An Interesting Report by a
Visiting Scientist.

THE COUNTRY HAS STILL MANY YEARS
OF ACTIVE GOLD PRODUCTION
AHEAD OF IT.

Geological Features.

A mining engineer writing to the Toronto Globe from New York says:

"Having been sent by the French government to report on the Klondike, I have travelled during the past summer through the richest placer mining part of the territory, and think it may be of interest to your readers to hear the impressions formed by an impartial and disinterested traveller as to the future prospects of this district. During several months which I have passed in the Yukon Territory I have seen evidences of a steady and regular development. The Klondike region is very rich, the gold being apparently sown everywhere, but that does not mean that it can be picked up like shells on the seashore. On the contrary, it can only be secured by intelligent and continued hard work.

As at first some colossal fortunes were realized by a few strokes of the shovel or pick-axe (so to speak), it is quite possible that others may still be made in the same way, but it is much more reasonable to consider the harvest of these riches as one which, although certainly rich, requires a steady development, but with an assured future.

Under present conditions the extraction of gold has resolved itself into a commercial proposition, where vast and improved machinery must take the place of manual labor, as it has already commenced to do, backed up by the capital of strong companies, but it does not at all follow from this that the individual miner is to disappear. On the contrary, there will always be room for him as the pioneer, happy and independent, discovering new riches in the inexhaustible territory.

As I have already remarked, the reign of machinery has commenced, and everywhere one hears the rum of steam, not only from the simple boiler, but also from machinery of the latest and most approved styles. Surrounding the Dome, one of the highest and most central peaks of the Klondike district, we find Bonanza, Dominion and Gold Run Creeks, with their numerous tributaries, all of which have yielded rich golden harvests. The one with which I have had the opportunity of becoming best acquainted, and of which I can speak with the most confidence, is Gold Run Creek, which interested me particularly from both an industrial and a scientific point of view. The lower part of this creek is very rich, and is owned by the Gold Run (Klon-

dike) Mining Co., under the able management of Dr. A. E. Wilms (one of the pioneer miners of the country), a company composed of French, Americans and Canadians, and owning a series of claims extending for a distance of about two miles, all in full operation. I have been present at clean-ups on numerous creeks, but here I may say I saw streams of the precious metal amounting to over 100 ounces at the production of each shaft for a period of three days' work. By the introduction of new and improved machinery, which is already on the ground, the cost of production will be greatly reduced, and the future of this section of country assured.

The soil of the Gold Run Valley is composed of a layer of frozen muck from ten to twenty-five feet thick, beneath which is to be found a layer of frozen gravel, rich in antediluvian remains of mastodon, mammoth, elk, giant moose, buffalo and other animals of ancient geological periods, and also containing the golden harvest mentioned above, under which is found a decomposed bed rock, sometimes very rich in gold, and showing traces of precious stones, platinum, etc.

The composition of the soil of Gold Run Valley may be considered as a type of that of the whole Klondike region, and is most interesting, not only from a commercial, but also from a scientific point of view, containing, as it does, so much antediluvian treasure.

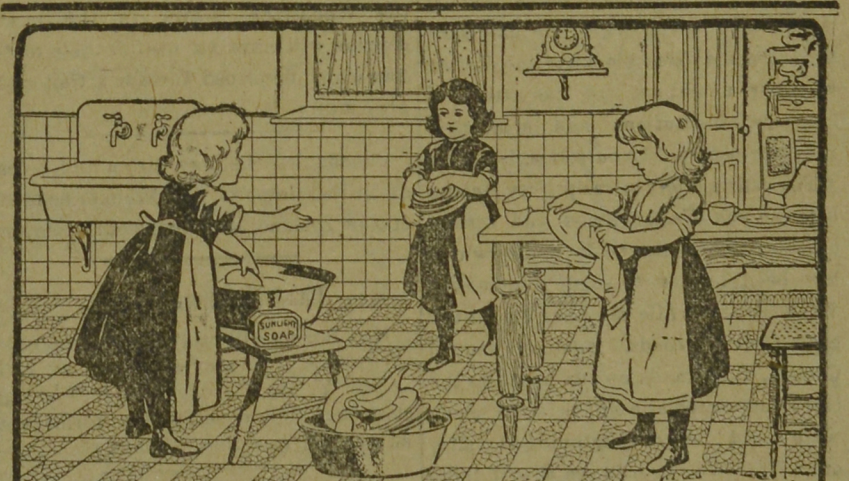
The Geological Survey Department at Ottawa, Canada, requested me to inform them of the results of my researches in this interesting valley, which I have done, and I have sent to France two large cases of fossils and of other most interesting remains, which will be submitted to the observations and study of leading scientists, and which will, I believe, prove of the greatest value in adding to the knowledge of the world.
