VOTED IT DOWN.

defeated, and voted down.

out of employment, came to an end to-

CHARGED WITH MANSLAUGHTER

Montreal, Jan. 3.—Thomas Bird, en-
gineer of the Grand Trunk railway, was
arraigned before Judge Lafontaine, to-
day charged with manslaughter.

A coroner's jury yesterday declared
that the death of Octave Tremblay, who
was killed on the Victoria Bridge on
Wednesday, was due to lack of caution
and the ignoring of danger signals by the
engineer of the second train. Bird plead-
ed not guilty.

ANOTHER RAILWAY COLLISION.

Niagara Falls, Jan. 3.—At Merriton
tunnel early this morning, a Grand Trunk
express collided with an engine that was
running to Hamilton light.

The accident occurred just as the en-
gine was emerging from the west side of
the tunnel.

F. Creman Dessault of Sarnia, of the
Chicago Express was killed and Engineers
Buchitt and Duke, and Fireman Horning
were injured.

The passengers were shaken up but not
seriously injured.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

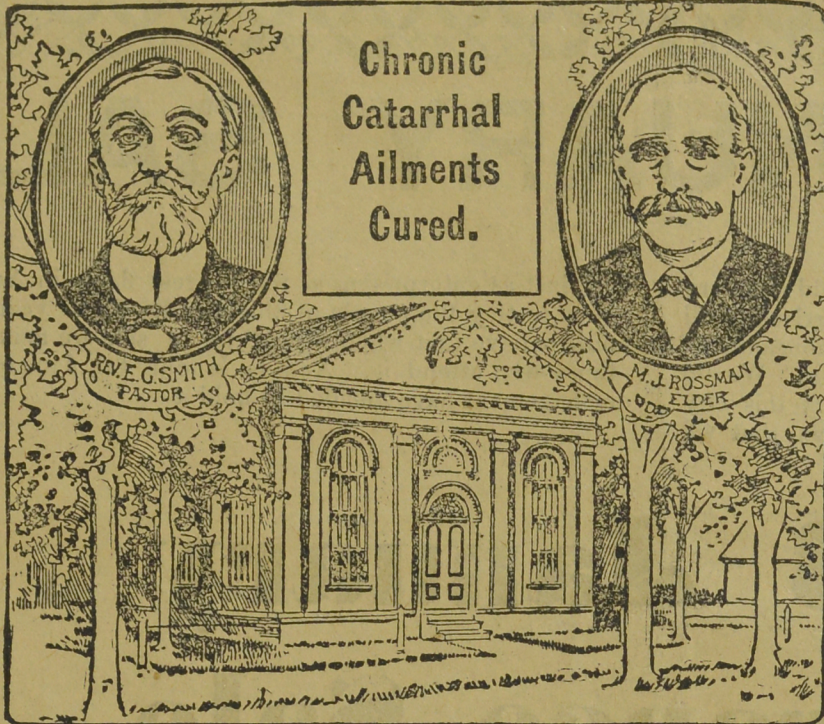
London, Jan. 3.—The bye-election at

Brasey, Conservative, 3,907.

As the Conservatives at the last election
had a majority of upwards of 1,000, Mr.
Rose's victory is notable.
