#### Canadians Stay in South Africa.

Miss Florence J. Wilkinson, late of Toronto, one of the Canadian teachers in the Transvaal, writing home by the last mail, states that she and Miss Mabel Yennet, formerly of Peterboro, have re-engaged with the Education Department of the colony as teachers in the Klerksdorp schools for a period of three years.

It appears that the Canadian teachers in South Africa have had very liberal offers made to them to induce them to remain longer in the country. The following options were open up to a recent date for their acceptance:

1. The teachers may go home at end of the year's engagement and are entitled to have their passage paid.  
2. Or they may sign an agreement for three years from present date. In this case they can have: (a) Three months' leave of absence without pay, with passage paid home and return, at any time convenient to the Education Department. (b) A gratuity of three months' salary at end of three years' service—the three months' leave of absence not being counted in the three years.

Final passage home will not be paid for any teacher who has taken the three months' leave. If a teacher does not take leave she will have: (a) Free passage home at end of engagement (or on terminating engagement at three months' notice). (b) Gratuity of three months' salary at end of three years' service.  
3. Or they may sign for three years from date of original engagement. In this case all right to three months' leave of absence is foregone. The teacher entering into this agreement may have: (a) Full gratuity at end of engagement, or at three months' notice.

The salary paid the teachers for the past year has been at the rate of £100 and maintenance, which was considered equal, in all, to about £200. It is understood that the salary offered for the re-engagement period will be at the rate of £180 per annum, which will include salary and maintenance. It is not yet known how many of the Canadian teachers will remain in Africa for a longer period.
