

YANKEES WON.

Riflemen of the Republic Captured Palma Trophy

IN GREAT INTERNATIONAL SHOOT AT BISLEY.

Contest Chiefly Between Canada, United Kingdom and United States.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Bisley, Eng., July 11.—The annual contest of the national rifle association opened here this morning with the great international team match for the Palma trophy.

The weather conditions were favorable, though the heat was terrific.

The shooting at 800 yards resulted as follows:

From the first stages of the shooting it is seen that the contest will be between England, the United States, and Canada.

Lieut. Col. Sherwood is personally coaching the Canadian marksmen. In the course of conversation today he said: "The game is young yet, and the Canadians have a good chance for the trophy."

In the second stage, the American team was leading by a small margin.

London, July 11, 5 p.m.—The American team won the Palma trophy.

REV. JOHN READ DEAD.

Popular Methodist Clergyman Expired Suddenly at St. Stephen.

News of the very sudden death of Rev. John Read pastor of the Methodist church at St. Stephen and well known in this city and vicinity, will be heard with sincere regret wherever the deceased gentleman was known. A St. Stephen despatch of Friday night says:

"Rev. John Read, D. D., pastor of the Methodist church, died suddenly of neuralgia of the heart at 7 o'clock this evening. He participated in the services in this church on Sunday last, but had since been confined to his home. A fatal termination was not anticipated, and the end came very suddenly."

Rev. John Read, D. D., was a native of Albert county, and was educated at Mount Allison. He entered the work of the Methodist ministry in 1857, and was ordained in 1861. Part of his ministerial life was spent in the conference of Nova Scotia, where among other charges he occupied those of Truro, Grafton street, Halifax and Yarmouth. About the year 1880 he was transferred to the N. B. and P.

E. Island conference, his first charge being the Queen square church in St. John. His next charge was Exmouth street church, and while there, in 1884, he was elected president of the conference. That was the year when the various Methodist connections in Canada united as the Methodist church. Rev. Dr. Read was thus the president of the last N. B. and P. E. I. conference of the old Methodist church of Canada, and the first president of the new N. B. and P. E. I. conference of the Methodist church. He was twice elected a delegate to the general conference, the highest court of the church, and attended the conference at Winnipeg in 1902. He has several times filled the position of chairman of district, was a member of the book committee, and has been for years a member of the board of regents of Mt. Allison University, which conferred on him the degree of D. D., when he was pastor of Centenary church in St. John. He was a member of all the important committees and his practical business ability and strong common sense have been of great service to the church on trying and difficult occasions. He was a wise administrator, a faithful pastor and good preacher.

Rev. Dr. Read's pastorate in the N. B. and P. E. I. conference were Queen Square, Exmouth street, Marysville, First Charlottetown; Central, Moncton; Wesley Memorial, Moncton; Centenary and St. Stephen. He went to St. Stephen two years ago from Centenary church.

Dr. Read is survived by a widow, formerly Miss Sterling of Nashwaak, sister of Mrs. J. A. Vanwart, formerly of this city, and two sons, J. Walter Read, who resides at Marysville, and Lee, in the employ of the Sumner Co. at Moncton, and one daughter at home in St. Stephen. Dr. Read was 68 years old.

POPE SLEEPS.

It is Feared Unnaturally from Extreme Weakness.

LATEST BULLETINS RESPECTING HIS CONDITION.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Rome, July 11.—The following bulletin was issued at 9 o'clock this morning by the physicians attending the Pope.

"During the night his holiness rested well at intervals. His pulse is 90, and has shown no diversity since last night. His respiration is 30, and his temperature 86. The functions of his kidneys are still deficient. His general condition, however, is fairly easy."

At 12 30 the Pope's condition was still unchanged. His Holiness partook of his mid-day meal and afterwards fell into a peaceful sleep which still continues."

Rome, July 11 3 30 p. m.—The Pope continues to sleep, and those about him consider this sleep to be unnatural, and arising from an augmentation of weakness.

It is agreed that all the doctors will go to the sick room twice this afternoon, at 5 and 7 p. m.

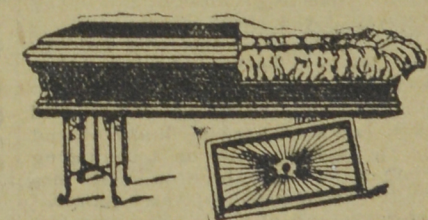
