A JUDGE'S DEATH.

Distinguished Member of the Supreme Court Bench of Canada

PASSED AWAY AT LONDON

Whither He Went as an Alaskan Boundary Commissioner.

(Special to the Daily Herald).

London, July 11.—Hon. Mr. Justice Armour, of the Canadian Supreme Court at Ottawa, and a member of the Alaskan Boundary Tribunal, passed away this morning at 7.15 o'clock. He had been ill for some time, and no hope was held out of his recovery.

[Hon. John Douglas Armour, was the youngest son of the late Rev. Samuel Armour, Anglican rector for many years at Cavan, Ont., and was born May 1830.

He was educated at Upper Canada College, and Toronto University, graduating at the latter institution in 1850 after a distinguished course. He studied law, and was called to the bar of Ontario in 1853. He practised at Coburg until appointed a judge of the supreme court of Ontario in Nov. 1877, by the Liberal government. In 1887 Sir John Macdonald made Judge Armour chief justice, a position he held up to about a year ago when he was appointed to a seat on the bench of the supreme court of Canada. A few months ago he was made a member of the Alaskan Boundary tribunal and recently, although in poor health, went to London to discharge his duties in that connection. He failed to rally however, and for some weeks has been hovering between life and death.]
