DEATH OF REV. W. H. STREET.

Near Relative of Well Known Fredericton Families.

Rev. William H. Street, rector of Campobello, died at Brookline, Mass., Friday. The deceased gentleman was a son of the late Alfred L. Street, barrister of St. John, and was about sixty-eight years old. He was in charge of the Church of England parishes at Bathurst, Welsford and other places before he went to Campobello about ten years ago. Owing to illness about a year ago he went to Boston, where his death occurred.

Mr. Street married a Miss French, of St. John, who died about a year ago. Two sisters survive him and also two brothers.

Collector of Customs A. F. Street, of this city, and Rev. Thomas W. Street, sub-dean of the Cathedral, are cousins of the deceased gentleman. Collector Street went to St. John last night, and Rev. Mr. Street this morning, to attend the funeral tomorrow.

Aged Lady's Death.

The death occurred last night at her home on Campbell street of Mrs. Theresa Sutherland, widow of the late Robert Sutherland. She had been in delicate health for some time and her death was not unexpected. The deceased lady was a daughter of the late William Agnew, of Kingsclear, and was seventy-eight years of age. A family of three sons and one daughter survive her. They are William and Nathaniel of this city, Robert, of New York, and Miss Sutherland, who resided with her mother. She is also survived by one brother, William Agnew, of Centreville, and one sister, Mrs. Good, of Millville. The funeral will take place on Sunday afternoon with services at the house by R. v. Willard Macdonald, commencing at 3.45 o'clock.

A Pleasant Excursion.

THE DEAF AND DUMB.

Board of Education Decides to Send Pupils to Halifax.

A meeting of the Board of Education was held yesterday afternoon, all the members being present except His Honor the Lieutenant Governor. Premier Tweedie and Dr. J. R. Loch, who had been delegated by the board to visit Halifax in the interests of the deaf and dumb, submitted a report in which they recommended that in future deaf and dumb children, belonging to this province, be sent to the school at Halifax for their education. The report was adopted by the board, and it was decided to give the proper notification to parents and guardians of deaf and dumb children, through the columns of the *Royal Gazette*. The price to be paid for each pupil is \$165 per annum, one half of which is to be paid by the government and the remainder by the municipality. This arrangement goes into effect at the beginning of next term.

This was the only matter which engaged the attention of the board, apart from the regular routine business.

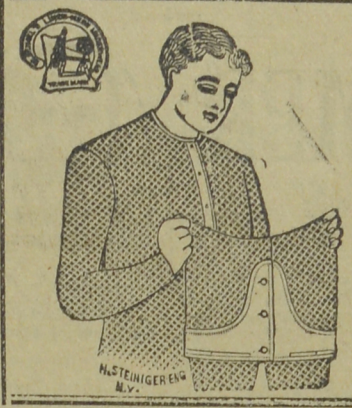

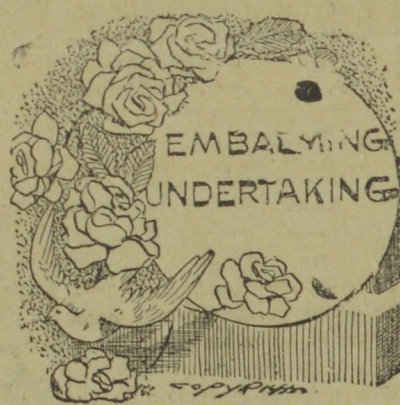
