NO TRUTH IN REPORT
THAT DATE OF ELEC-

Decision Will Not be Made
for a Week.

SOLDIERS AMBUSHED

And Slaughtered—A Reign of Terror.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 26.—Vaquitos Indians of Sonora, Mexico, have started a new rebellion. They made a night attack at Rapairosell upon a sleeping company of the 50th regiment of the Mexican Rurales, sixty men under Col. Francisco Picarordo, and in the fight destroyed the entire force.

Only six bodies were recovered, the soldiers having been driven into the bush and killed, some afterwards being tarred. There is reign terror in the country about Camrpania.

MET TRAGIC END.

Discoverer of Famous Mine Burned in
His Cabin.

Vancouver, Nov. 26.—In the destruction of his humble cabin, Jas. F. Bell, discoverer of the famous White Water mine, Slocan, lost his life last week.

The veteran lived at an isolated point on the mountain side out of White Water, and no one knew of the fire until the finding of the charred remains.

Mr. Bell was 75 years old and was worth about \$100,000.

MONUMENT TO MR. NEILL.

Elegant Royal Bank Premises at Vancouver

---Fredericton Boy Given Great Credit
for Increased Business.

Vancouver World, Nov. 17.—Yesterday the Royal Bank of Canada opened for business in their handsome and spacious new quarters, corner of Hastings and Homer streets. Without exception these are the most elaborately furnished offices in the province. The dimensions of the new premises are 85 x 45 feet, with 18 foot ceilings; the floors are of highly polished mosaic and the panelling and furnishings throughout are of American quarter-cut white oak, in antique finish and of very artistic design. The manager's and assistant manager's offices, which are immediately to the left of the entrance, are luxuriously fitted up, and from thence the handsome oak counter desks—ornamented with oxidized brass furnishings and grill work—for the convenience of the staff, extend up the east and along the south side, leaving a large open space for the accommodation of the public.

And the comfort of the public has certainly not been overlooked. A cheery fire burns in the huge fireplace, and in addition to the usual desks are to be seen several massive oak seats. The fittings were installed by the Canadian Office & School Furniture Co., of Preston, Ont.

Of late the bank has been somewhat hampered in the matter of accommodation for their increased staff, but now every thing is changed, and in addition to their increased desk room there are three large vaults for cash, books and stationery respectively.

The bank opened here for business in 1897 with a staff of three, and when Mr. Chas. E. Neill took charge, just three years ago, the staff numbered seven. Since then their business has increased enormously, and in their main office is a staff of fourteen, and in the Westminster avenue branch is a staff of five.

The new offices are really a monument to Mr. Neill, whose ideas were carried out by the architects and furnishers.

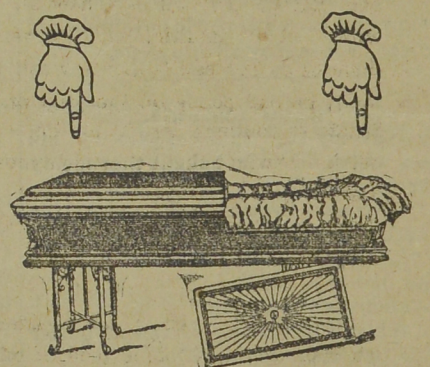
