CHAIRS OF FORESTRY AND AGRICULTURE RECOM- MENDED.

A Registrar to Take Place of Bursar, Solicitor and Secretary.

The annual meeting of the Senate of the University of New Brunswick was held today at the Education office. The first session opened at 10.45. Dr. Inch the president was in the chair, the others present being, Chancellor Harrison, Mr. Justice Barker, Mr. Justice McLeod, Mr. J. D. Hazen, M. P. P., Inspector Bridges and Wm. Brodie, with the secretary, Dr. Scott.

The chancellor read the annual report which will afterwards be submitted to the legislature. From this it appears that there are 134 students in attendance, 59 of them in the engineering department, and that 47 new students have entered the college this year. Reference was made to the Rhodes scholarships, one of which is in the gift of the University for the year 1904, and to the necessity for financial assistance to meet the growing needs, and provide more adequate salaries. The chancellor recommended that steps be taken to establish at the University a chair of Forestry and also a chair in Agricultural Chemistry.

The auditor's report was presented by Inspector Bridges, and a supplementary report was read by Judge Barker, containing a review of the financial position of the University for the past six years, and making a number of recommendations with regard to future management.

It was decided to return to the old system of having a registrar, who will perform the duties at present discharged by the bursar, solicitor and secretary of the senate.

The annual conference between the professors and the members of the Senate was held at the afternoon session, which met at 2.30, at which the present standing and needs of the institution were discussed. Dr. Riley made a statement concerning the new Psychological Laboratory, and all the professors showed in their reports the effect of the large number of students in attendance.

A delegation of students came before the Senate to present their views concerning a new gymnasium.

A Pleasing Announcement.

Probably the most pleasing as well as one of the most important items of business was the report from Dr. Scott, Prof. of Physics and Electrical Engineering, that a wealthy citizen of St. John who is interested in highest technical education, had through him donated to the University the sum of \$4,000 for the Engineering department.

The money was set aside on the first day of October last, and will remain on interest at the bank until the Senate is ready to receive it for investment. The interest is to be used each year for the extension of the present equipment, one half the income to be for the electrical, the other for the civil engineering course.

This is probably the largest individual gift ever made to the funds of the University, and many expressions of appreciation are heard for the kindness and liberality of the donor, while Dr. Scott is being congratulated for his share in an event so helpful to the University. Let others follow the good example set and the U. N. B. is bound to occupy the proud place her admirers covet for her.

The donor further showed a most practical sympathy with the work of the underpaid professoriate by offering to give the sum of \$300.00 for this year to increase the remuneration of those professors whose salary at present is not over one thousand dollars, on condition that the sum be guaranteed from other sources in future to provide a permanent increase in salaries.

Dowie's Crusade.

Deaconess Mrs. W. T. L. Reed of the Zion Christian Catholic Church, who was

A London paper in discussing Dowie says that Americans are more easily imposed upon than the English. It adds that Dowie has "worked" the Americans to the tune of \$15,000,000, while two years ago when in England, the proceeds of his meetings were insufficient to defray his hotel expenses.

WHO ARE THEY HITTING?

Sackville Football Men Explain Why They Declined One Game.

The Argosy, official organ of the Mount Allison students says:

Several newspapers have also gone out of their way to censure Mount Allison, on this account and in doing so have by no means paid as strict regard to the truth as might be expected. The reason was that Mount Allison objects to meeting a team whose chief aim seems to be to win regardless of the cost and means of

winning. Let this refusal be called un-sportsmanlike or whatever our critics please, but we sincerely trust that Mount Allison traditions shall never be so far forgotten that a team wearing the garnet and old gold will be found engaging in football of this nature. We have always played football, not for the chance of winning victories alone, but for the sport that there is in it. Played for victories alone, football ceases to be a game for gentlemen.

FIRST FOREIGN GAME.

St. John Curlers of the Olden Time Defeated in Fredericton.

The St. John Sun publishes some interesting reminiscences of curling in that city, the game having been introduced there by Mr. Thomas McLelland who is still living at the advanced age of 84 years. It was in the winter of 1853-54 that the first game was played in St. John and shortly afterwards the curlers of that city came to Fredericton and were defeated by our club. It was a merry lot of players says the Sun, that left St. John in a coach at daylight one fine sunny day, taking dinner on the road and arriving in Fredericton at dark that evening. The following day was stormy and wet, so it was not until two days after their arrival the game could be played. There were of course, at that time no rinks, so the game was played out on the river with barricades on either side of the allotted space to keep off the wind. A prominent member of one of the Fredericton rinks was John Neill, father of James S. Neill of this city. The game was fiercely contested, and the visiting team was defeated by a small margin. That evening the St. John men were most royally entertained by the Fredericton club and on the following day they left for home. Mr. McLelland refers to the trip as being full of pleasure, and says the party arrived home none the worse for their long drive.

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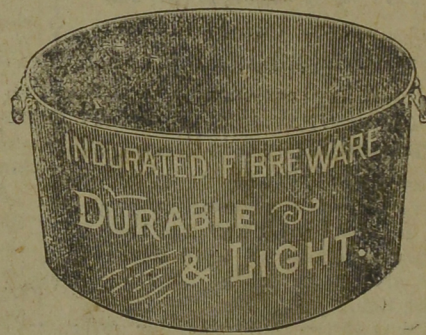
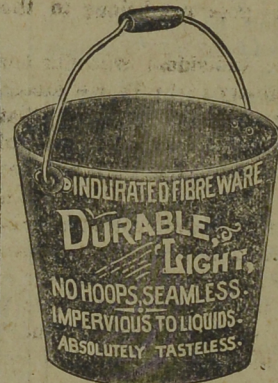
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
