The Weather.

The weather probs today say:—Moderate north to northwest winds, fair; Saturday, moderate west winds and a little warmer.

Salary Raised.

Mr. Harry J. McGrath, masonry inspector on the I. C. R., father of Dr. McGrath of this city, has had his salary raised \$300.

Logs Purchased.

The season's cut of logs on the Nashwaakie, amounting to about two hundred thousand feet, was purchased yesterday by James M. Scott of Dumfries.

Prorogation.

The legislature will be formally prorogued by Governor Snowball at 9 a. m. tomorrow. A guard of honor from the R. C. R. headed by the band will be on duty for the occasion.

The DeBury Bill.

The law committee met this morning and had under consideration the bill relating to the DeBury estate. It is understood that the committee will report against the measure, and that it will be withdrawn.

At the Hospital.

Harry W. Bailey of Little River, Sunbury county, was operated upon at the Victoria Hospital last evening by Drs. Vanwart and Bridges for appendicitis. The operation was a success and the patient is today resting easily.

Deserters Punished.

The finding of the court marshal, which lately tried Privates Worth, Gade and Patterson of the R. C. R. for desertion, was returned from Ottawa yesterday and read out at a parade of the troops this morning. Gade was sentenced to 42 days imprisonment and the others to 21 days each.

Postponed His Trip.

Chief Anthony Sacobi, of the St. Marys reserve, did not leave for Ottawa yesterday afternoon as he had intended doing. Just prior to the departure of the train he received a telegram from the governor general's secretary informing him that His Excellency had gone to Toronto. This intelligence rather upset the chief's arrangements, and his trip to the capital has been indefinitely postponed.

The Cut of Bank Logs.

So far this season in the neighborhood of 7,500,000 feet of bank logs have been brought to Springhill and sold. This quantity included about 3,000,000 feet of hemlock, the balance being spruce. It is estimated that there are 3,000,000 feet still to come, which will bring the total up to 10,500,000 feet or thereabouts. Last season 12,000,000 of bank logs were hauled at Springhill. Spruce is now worth \$11.50 per thousand, and hemlock \$4.75.

CONTINGENCIES COMMITTEE.

Last Meeting of the Session Held This Morning.

The contingencies committee of the legislature held a meeting this morning, and passed a number of bills contracted during the session, and recommended that the usual allowance of \$10 each be made to the three pages for extra services.

It was recommended that Dr. Hannay, the official reporter, be paid \$300 extra for reporting the debates of the session, and \$100 for furnishing synoptic reports. J. H. Hawthorn, the junior engrossing clerk is now in receipt of \$200 per session, and the committee will recommend that this amount be increased to \$300. The usual allowance of \$50 was voted Deputy Speaker Allen, and it was recommended Clerk Assistant Dibblee be paid \$50 for

his services as secretary to the committee. No extra allowance was voted the other clerks or messengers.

The committee recommended Frank L. Magee, the senior page, who retires this year, be paid at the rate of \$1.50 per day for the present session.

DEANERY MEETING.

Regular Quarterly Meeting of C. of E. Clergymen.

On Wednesday afternoon the opening meeting of the regular quarterly gathering of the clergy of Fredericton deanery was held at the rectory, here. There were present the Rural Dean Rev. H. E. Dibblee, and the Revs. Dr. Roberts, H. Montgomery, T. W. Street, also Revs. W. B. Belliss, rector-elect of Westfield, Revd. R. W. Colston, rector of Petersville, and the Revd. S. Weston Jones, rector of Windsor, N. S.

The 10th Chapter of the Acts, from verse 25, was read in the original and discussed.

The Deanery Magazine Business manager Rev. W. B. Belliss reported on the state of that publication, and tendered his resignation owing to his removal to the parish of Westfield.

In the evening at 7.30 service was held in the Parish church, Rev. A. B. Murray said prayers, Revs. H. Montgomery, and R. W. Colston reading the Scripture lessons. The sermon was preached by Rev. S. Weston Jones who eloquently set forth the claims of King's College, Windsor, upon the Church people of the lower provinces.

At 8 a. m. on Thursday the regular deanery celebration of the Holy Communion was held in the parish church. The rural dean celebrated, assisted by the rector, Rev. Dr. Roberts.

Upon resuming the business meeting at the rectory on Thursday morning, arrangements were made for the visitation to several of the parishes of the deanery by Rev. Weston Jones in the interests of King's College.

Representatives to the Diocesan Board of Missions were elected by the Chapter, Rev. H. Montgomery and Mr. Geo. A. Armstrong being chosen.

The delegates from the deanery on the Sunday school committee are, Rural Dean Dibblee and Mr. W. T. H. Fenety.

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ONLY BEGINNING.

News from Montreal Strike Not Assuring.

MILITIA HAVE ALREADY A BIG BILL AGAINST THE CITY.

Sir Wm. Mulock in Conference With Conflicting Interests.

Montreal, May 8.—O'Neill, leader of the 'longshoremen's strike, says that instead of it being ended, the strike is only beginning, and that the men are determined to hold out for recognition.

It is announced that the militia on duty at the harbor front have been granted an increase of pay to \$1 per day. It is said the money has been put up by public spirited citizens but is believed that the shipping interests have provided the money.

Sir William Mulock was closeted with the steamship people and the labor leaders all last evening, but evidently nothing has come out of the conference. Shipping men refused to accept the proposition made by the strike leaders for a settlement of the strike.

Col. Gordon, D. O. C., has handed the city a bill for \$5,000 for services of the militia since the strike commenced.

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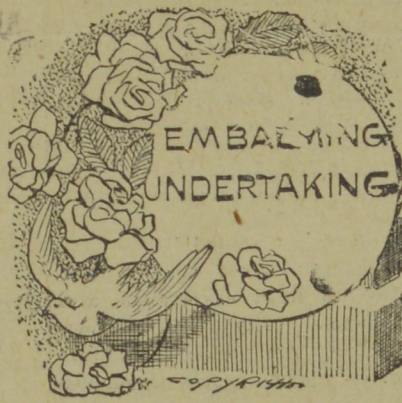
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
