### TRADE WITH CANADA

NEW ZEALAND AS SELLER AND BUYER TO AND FROM DOMINION.

Representative of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association in the Island Colony Has Indicated Lines in Which Mutual Benefit Would Occur in Trading—Canada Can Compete With United States to New Zealand's Advantage.

Mr. T. de Schryver, who has taken up his headquarters for the time being at Auckland, as representative of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, is at present on a visit to Christchurch, says the Christchurch, New Zealand, Press. In the course of an interview yesterday a representative of The Press obtained some interesting information regarding trade relations between Canada and New Zealand. The association Mr. de Schryver represents is a very powerful one, and one of its greatest objects is to develop manufacturing enterprise, and, as he expressed himself, "I am representing in New Zealand all Canadian manufacturers which have no direct representation of their own in this colony."

Canada, he went on to say, had much in common with New Zealand, and while supplying the latter country with many articles of commerce could take much from New Zealand in return. It was, he thought, a duty that one part of the Empire owed to another part to assist it and take its goods in exchange in preference to dealing with foreign countries, when the conditions were equal. He maintained that Canada absolutely filled the bill in this respect with regard to New Zealand, in that she could send us the lines we are now getting from the United States and the Continent of Europe at equally low, if not lower, prices, and that the articles supplied would in all cases equal the goods sent from the foreign countries, and in most instances be superior. This was business, and altogether apart from sentiment. What the Canadian manufacturers desired was to find out suitable lines to supply and to purchase, and he was now looking out for suitable agents for Canadian manufacturers throughout New Zealand.

"I am not here alone to sell for Canada, but to buy also," said Mr. de Schryver, and went on to enumerate the lines which lent themselves to export to the Dominion, specially referring to flax, mutton casings, mutton tallow, sheepskins (raw and tanned), and kauri gum. Only the other day arrangements had been made with one of Dunedin's principal firms to introduce its lines through the association in Canada, and the trade, it was hoped, would grow by leaps and bounds. It was quite a fallacy in trade to believe that in every instance price was the only ruling factor, and this was practically proved by the fact that McLaren's Imperial Cheese Company of Toronto found a good market here for their wares. There was not the slightest doubt that New Zealand woollen goods (particularly blankets and rugs) would sell well in Canada, where there was a large wealthy class who would not care what they paid for the best article and the article that suited.

Canada could send direct to New Zealand canned vegetables, biscuits, lager beers (all of these lines in competition with the United States), and canned fish from the factories of Nova Scotia in the east to British Columbia in the west. Last year the Dominion exported canned fish to Australia to the value of \$203,244, and to the United States \$3,608,936 worth. It was reasonable to presume that a large proportion of this found its way to New Zealand and other British colonies as American goods, through New York. Why not trade direct with Canada, and save the middle profit?

Canada, with her up-to-date appliances, was easily able to compete with the States in the manufacture of paper, and he had proved this satisfactorily; she was now sending annually paper pulp to the value of \$2,000,000 into the United States. Office furniture (now largely imported to New Zealand from America) could be just as well obtained from the Dominion; the latter's bicycles were equal to any in the market for quality, and sold at competitive prices. In agricultural implements the Dominion had yet to be beaten, and leather was one of her principal exports. In textiles Canada was able to send her manufactures to the Old World centres of those industries and hold her own. Was not this proof that even in these lines she ought to be considered? Canadian cottons were freely sold and eagerly bought all through Australasia, an evidence of their quality gaining appreciation; while for indiarubber goods the Dominion claimed to be absolutely at the top of the tree. New Zealand only wanted to know more about Canada and what she had to offer to become a big customer of the Dominion. Her enamelled ware, now a big industry, was equally low in price and superior to any

continental make, and had the added advantage of being a British article. In concluding his remarks, Mr. de Schryver said Canada was bound to take a lead. Her natural resources, her unlimited water supply would bring her to the fore in the world's markets in leaps and bounds. She has as a nation adopted the pushing methods of the United States, and at the same time united with these the solidity and reliability of the Britisher. "Add to this the artistic element embodied in the French-Canadian citizens of the Dominion, and it is obvious to any close observer that the Canadian manufacturers will take a front place throughout the world in the very near future." The only drawback this advocate of the extensions of the Empire's trade within her own bounds would admit was that up to the present there had been insufficient direct communication with other overseas countries, but this would be overcome. Canada wished to free her stuff from her own ports so that the United States should not be able to take credit for much of her exports as at present, owing to transshipment. The New Zealand statistics showed that this colony's imports from Canada were actually set down at about £40,000 in value, but if the quantities which had come via the States were credited to Canada he was in a position to state that the figures would be very much higher.

#### A Secession Movement.

Robert Philp, Premier of Queensland, who, according to the latest telegrams, is heading a movement in the direction of secession from the Commonwealth, is a native of Scotland, and at the age of 10 accompanied his parents to Queensland. Mr. Philp was the only Australian Premier absent from his State during the visit of the Prince and Princess of Wales last year, and it was said at the time that he took a trip to Japan to escape knighthood. At the coronation he passed the proffered knighthood on to his Attorney-General, Sir Arthur Rutledge, an ex-Wesleyan minister.
