Col. Herbert, a former commander in chief of the Canadian militia, is contesting South Monmouthshire for a seat in the Imperial House of Commons.

Mr. Alexander Fraser, the Ottawa lumberman who died Monday, leaves an estate valued at fifteen million dollars. He started life as a lumber driver.

A Halifax policeman has been found asleep at his post and fined a month's pay. This will afford outside newspaper jokers an opportunity to poke fun at the Nova Scotia capital, but Halifax is not the only place where policemen, if they do not actually sleep, travel about in an apparently semi-comatose condition. The Halifax case will be a warning to "the finest" in many cities.

In Quebec as in this province, the business of teaching in the public schools is falling largely into the hands of women, owing to the beggarly salaries paid. At the session of the McGill Normal school just closed at Montreal, it was reported that of the 183 student teachers in attendance there were only two men. This fact drew a strong condemnatory speech from Rev. Dr. Barclay on the small salaries for teachers, which he said would eventually render practically useless the education system of the province.

Mr. McNeill's report on the orchard meetings in New Brunswick published on our first page, is full of encouragement to those who desire to see development in fruit growing in this province. Mr. McNeill declares that New Brunswick is admirably adapted for fruit culture, and especially in the St. John river district are the conditions most favorable. The local government's proposal to furnish two or three orchards for practical illustration of what can be done in this line should give an impetus to the industry, still practically in its infancy.

The use of the overhead check rein on horses, becoming very general in Fredericton, is a wickedly cruel practice and should be frowned down. Prominent veterinary surgeons have testified to the cruelty and injury inflicted by the overhead check. A sore mouth is a common result of the overhead check, and it greatly aggravates the suffering of the animal. In every case of sore mouth the check is a positive cruelty. The swelling of the veins of the neck is another sign of suffering, the unnatural strain having a tendency to stop the circulation and to produce a temporary paralysis of the muscles.

New Brunswick has lost one of her great captains of industry in the death of Mr. William Richards the well known lumberman of Boiestown. The deceased gentleman, starting life under modest conditions, by industry and intelligence built up a splendid business, giving employment to a large number of people and assisting in the development of an important industry. He was a man of large heart and generous impulses, and was deservedly held in high respect. Mr. Richards found time from his engrossing business interests to take an active part in politics. He was a strong Liberal, and a sturdy friend of Hon. A. G. Blair from the moment that gentleman entered the political arena.

After a gallant struggle in the face of overwhelming odds, C. I. Prior and his British Columbia government have gone to the wall. Never very healthy, the administration was finally wrecked by scandals against Attorney General

Eberts and Crown Land Commissioner Wells, and against the Premier himself. Col. Prior fought hard for a dissolution of the House, but Governor Joly resisted, and gave the Col. and his remaining colleagues their walking ticket. Mr. McBride, the opposition leader has been called on to form a new ministry, but he has a difficult task, in view of the many conflicting elements in the present House. A general election is due this year, and the governor may grant dissolution immediately on the formation of the new ministry. McBride like Col. Prior, is a Conservative.

BURTT'S CORNER.

May 30.—The opening of the new station here is a great convenience to this growing village, and the new station master, Mr. Welsh, is giving general satisfaction.

Mr. Elwood Burtt has enlarged his store and has now one of the best stores in the county, outside of Fredericton. The front store, which contains the grocery department, is 28 x 48 ft. and is finished in the latest style. A rise of five steps takes you into the dry goods department, which is 24 x 40 ft. and well lighted by large light windows and three arches leading to the grocery department. It is finished in native woods neatly grained and painted and will contain large glass show cases and counters. The upper story of the building will be converted into a public hall, which will be a great convenience to the neighborhood. The building is lighted with acetylen gas of fourteen lights, from a generator in the basement. The whole store is a model of convenience and reflects great credit on the energy of Mr. Burtt, and also on Mr. Robert Wield of Royal Road, who had charge of the work.
