

WILL BE MISSED.

**Death of William Richards,
the Well Known Mira-
michi Lumberman.**

**PASSED AWAY AT BOIES-
TOWN ON MONDAY.**

**One of New Brunswick's
Most Successful Busi-
ness Men.**

William Richards, the well known Miramichi lumberman, is dead. The end came peacefully at his home at Boies-town at four o'clock Monday afternoon, after a long and painful illness.

Mr. Richards had been a sufferer from kidney and heart trouble and had been confined to bed almost continuously since the month of April, 1902. Last summer he visited Fredericton for medical treatment and spent over three months at the Barker House, under the care of the most experienced physicians, returning home in the fall, but little benefited by the change. He stood the winter fairly well, but a few weeks ago had a bad turn, since which time he has been gradually sinking. Mr. Richards was well known to a great many people in this city and news of his death though not unexpected, was received here with feelings of genuine sorrow and regret.

The deceased gentleman was a native of Cardigan, this county, his father being the late Daniel Richards, who came from Wales with his parents when a lad and settled at Cardigan. The founders of the family in this county were looked upon as a very fine type of people and enjoyed the confidence and esteem of all who had social and business relations with them. Mr. Richards engaged in lumbering when a young man, and continued in the business up to the time of his death, achieving marked success and distinction. For a short time he operated for Alexander Gibson on the Nashwaak, but has been in business on his own account on the Miramichi for the past thirty years. He carried on extensive operations on the Southwest Miramichi, the Renous, Cain's River and other tributaries, and conducted a large saw mill at Boiestown, providing steady employment for an army of men, both summer and winter. About six years ago his business interests were merged into a joint stock company with a capital stock of one million dollars. Mr. Richards was chosen president of the concern and continued to fill that office up to the time of his death.

The late Mr. Richards was a man of high character and was noted for his generosity and fair dealing towards his fellow men. In matters of business he was shrewd and far sighted, and seldom allowed another to get ahead of him in a transaction. His manner was frank and jovial, and he possessed to a marked degree those qualities which make men beloved and honored by their acquaintances. No man was more widely known and esteemed along the Miramichi, and in many homes in that section of the county his death will be looked upon as a personal loss. In politics Mr. Richards was a stalwart Liberal and supporter of the local government, and for years he has been a warm personal friend and great admirer of the present Minister of Railways. He always took an active interest in political affairs, and being a man who wielded a large influence, was able to render yeoman service to his party on election day.

The late Mr. Richards was 68 years of age, and is survived by a widow, formerly a Miss Sansom, one son and three daughters. The children are, David Richards of Nashwaak, Mrs. H. H. Gunter and Mrs. Dell Gunter of Boiestown, and Mrs. Howard McLean of Nashwaak. Another son, William D., who was associated with his father in business, died at Boiestown only a short time ago. Mr. Richards is also survived by three brothers and four sisters. They are: David of Campbellton, Daniel and Joseph of this city, Mrs. Gilmour of Sanley, Mrs. Samuel Bird of Birdton, Mrs. Sanson of St. Marye, and Mrs. Carson of Houlton.

The funeral will take place from the homestead at Boiestown at two o'clock on Wednesday afternoon. It is likely that quite a number from this city will attend.

UNDESIRABLE IMMIGRANTS.
