

FATAL SMASH.

Trains Collided Near
Chatham, Ont.A FIREMAN KILLED AND
BURIED IN THE WRECK.Driver Hurt—Other Train-
men Jumped and Es-
caped Injury.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Chatham, Ont., Nov. 24.—A bad wreck occurred on the Lake Erie and Detroit River Railway about a mile south of this city last evening.

A mixed train north from Blenheim ran into a Beet root special from Wallaceburg shunting at the south end of the cemetery switch.

Fireman Robt. Hutchison of Walkerville was killed instantly, and his body buried in the wreck.

Driver James Flowers, of Walkerville, was badly hurt, but was able to walk.

The engineer of the Beetroot special and his firemen escaped by jumping. The dead fireman leaves a wife and three children.

Ten cars were piled up and destroyed, and both engines were completely wrecked. A car of crude oil was smashed and the ditches flooded.

STEALING OUR FISH.

Dominion Cruiser Sent to Watch Yankee
Poachers on Pacific Coast.

Vancouver, Nov. 24.—The Dominion Government cruiser, Kestrel, sailed today at daybreak for Fort Simpson, to guard Canadian waters against poachers from the United States, who fish for halibut in Dundas Channel and carry them to Ketchikan.

Thirty-three Seattle halibut fishing boats, steamers and schooners are working out of Ketchikan this winter, and over half of them are illegally stealing fish out of Canadian waters.

BANKER ATTACKED.

DESECRATED THE DEAD.

Brutal Conduct of American Officials With
Remains of Late Dr. Steeves.

St. John Star: Mrs. J. A. E. Steeves, formerly Miss Kate Murphy of Fredericton, who came to the city on Saturday bringing with her the body of her husband, Dr. Steeves, was subject to a great deal of inconvenience and contemptible treatment at the hands of a number of officials at Portland, Me. It is possible that more of this will be heard later. When Dr. Steeves died his body was embalmed in Arizona and placed in a perfectly air-tight copper casket which in turn was enclosed in the ordinary wooden shell. These precautions fully met all the United States requirements under the various acts regarding public health, and all went well until Portland was reached. Here some official, less qualified and certainly more ignorant than others of his class, insisted on opening the shell and examining the casket. He handled the casket so rudely and with so little regard for common decency that finally he succeeded in breaking in the glass front, the broken pieces falling on and disfiguring the face of the dead.

Having done this, the official demanded that a new air-tight shell be procured. He had destroyed the value of the casket itself in this respect and insisted that Mrs. Steeves should procure another shell. This was done and finally after twelve hours unnecessary detention Mrs. Steeves was permitted to continue on her way.

She complained of this treatment to some of those in Portland who seemed to hold higher positions in the railway service, but obtained no satisfaction.

Montreal, Nov. 23.—The Quebec French Liberal organ, Le Soliel, which has been owned by Ernest Pacaud, was sold by him on Saturday to a syndicate of Liberals for \$100,000, half being cash.

Mr. Pacaud is too ill to continue in the newspaper business.

The deed was signed by Mr. Pacaud Saturday and was witnessed by Sir Alphonse Pelletier and Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick.

Secured Game Lands.

New York, Nov. 23.—Nearly fifty members of the Canadian Camp, an organization composed of men and women who have camped, hunted and fished in the forests of Canada eat down to a woodland dinner at Sherry's tonight, the dinner being made up wholly of game killed by the members themselves.

During the evening it was announced that arrangements had been entered into with the Canadian government whereby one thousand square miles of primeval forest land stocked with game, is to be set aside as a preserve for the exclusive use of the Canadian Camp.

This is a small, scraggy tree, a native of South America, called the shopala, with thick, tough, stringy bark full of a sort of fire resisting sap. This curious shrub grows largely on the great, grassy savannas, which are swept by fire almost every year during the heat of the summer. There it thrives splendidly, for the annual scourge only kills off its bigger and harder competitors and leaves the ground free for the growth of this vegetable asbestos.
