A quiet wedding was celebrated at St. Dunstan's church at eight o'clock this morning, when Miss Mary, second daughter of Mr. James Boyle, the well known King street meat and provision dealer, was united in marriage to Mr. James Menihan of the city market, St. John.

Owing to the recent death of the bride's mother the wedding was very quiet, only the immediate friends of the contracting parties being present. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Father Carney. The bride was attended by Miss Kate Tracey of St. John, and Mr. J. Vincent Boyle brother of the bride supported the bridegroom.

At the conclusion of the ceremony the happy couple partook of breakfast at the home of the bride, King St., after which they took the morning train for their future home at St. John.

The bride who has many friends in this city and elsewhere, was presented with a number of handsome, useful and costly presents.

Drowning Accident.

A sad drowning accident took place at St. Francis, Que., on Sunday morning by which Matthew Feeney, formerly of this city, lost his life. Although full particulars of the sad affair are not yet at hand it appears that he was drowned while crossing the river at that place. The deceased, who was 43 years of age, was a son of the late John Feeney. Some years ago he clerked for the late Owen McLaughlin, who conducted a news agency on the corner of King and Regent streets. He leaves a wife in the States. Mr. Bernard Feeney of this city, is an uncle of the deceased. It is understood that the remains were interred at St. Francis.

PROMINENT FARMER DEAD.

Mr. George W. Dunphy Succumbs to an Attack of Paralysis.

As a result of an attack of paralysis extending over four years and during which time he sustained six strokes, Mr. George W. Dunphy, a prominent and respected farmer of Douglas, died at his home at 7.30 this morning, aged 74 years.

Mr. Dunphy has been unable to walk without the aid of crutches and has not been able to talk since his first stroke, but otherwise has enjoyed pretty fair health, and was able to go in and out among his friends in the neighborhood. He visited his son's residence near home Saturday afternoon, and his sudden death was quite unexpected.

Deceased is survived by a widow, formerly Miss Ruth Barker of Long's Creek, one son, Mr. Walter Dunphy of Douglas, and three sisters, Mrs. Jacob Barker of this city, Mrs. Thos E. Wheeler of Marysville, and Mrs. W. D. Manzer of St. Marys. Mr. Austin Dunphy of this city, is a nephew of the deceased.

The funeral will take place at 2 p. m. Thursday, services at the late home of the deceased by Rev. George Howard, Baptist, of Keswick, interment in the family burying ground. Mr. R. B. Adams is the undertaker in charge.

MR. PELLETIER'S FUNERAL.

Last Tribute of Respect to the Drowning Accident Victim.

The remains of the late Alfred P. Pelletier, whose death by drowning occurred on Sunday, were taken to his home at Grand Falls by the Gibson branch this morning.

Mr. Archibald Pelletier, father of the deceased, arrived by the late train last evening. He was met at the station by Principal Osborne, of the Business College, and Messrs. James Farrell, N. A. LaForest and other friends.

The sad procession from Mrs. Hugh Edgar's, where the young man had boarded, to the train, took place at six o'clock this morning, and was largely attended. The male students of the Business College walked in a body.

Among the floral offerings were a broken column from the principal and students of the Business College, and a large cross from Mrs. Hugh Edgar.

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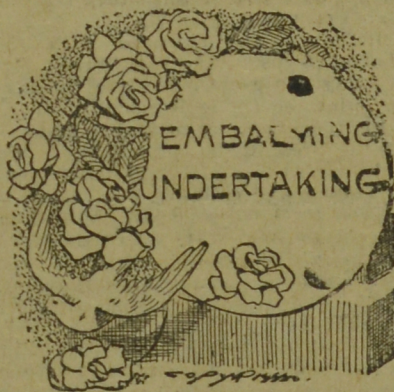
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
