John McCoy's Latest Importation in Horse Line.

STALLIONS BOUGHT AT NEW YORK.

One is Half Brother of the Famous Croesus,

THE OTHER HAS A PACING RECORD OF 2.10 1-4.

John McCoy, who went to New York over a week ago on a horse buying expedition, returned home last evening, bringing with him a pair of stallions, which are said to be the peer of anything in the horse-flesh line ever brought to Fredericton. The animals are now at Mr. McCoy's stables, York street, where they have been seen and admired by a large number of local horsemen. The pair go by the name of Young McGregor and W. H. Moody, and both are standard bred stallions, and sold for a fancy figure.

York McGregor is four years old, bay in color, stands a little better than 15 hands high and weighs about ten hundred. He was sired by Robert McGregor, sire of the world famous Croesus, 2.02 1/2, and is of course a half brother of that great trotter. His dam was Victress, 2.28 1/2, by Brown, 2.18 1/2; his second dam, Victoria, with three in the list, she by Dictator, sire of 56 dams and 88 trotters, and his third dam was by Black Hawk, 24. Young McGregor was bred and raised by George H. Ketchum of Toledo, Ohio, who claims that he can easily show a twenty cent hitched to a wagon. He is a handsome and high gaited animal, and Mr. McCoy is justly proud of him.

W. H. Moody, is chestnut in color, 15 hands high, is eight years old and weighs about 950 pounds. He was bred and raised by Lawson the celebrated New England turfman, at the Greenwood farm, near Boston, and has a pacing record of 2.10 1/4. He was sired by Evolution, 2.13 1/2, he by Nominee, he by Stranger, he by General Washington. His dam was by Vicking 2.17 1/2, he by Belmont, he by Abdallah II, and he by Hambletonian 10.

Both stallions will be kept at Mr. McCoy's stables for service during the approaching season.

New Railway Project.

Ottawa, March 20.—Mr. Hance Logan, member for Cumberland, N. S., will introduce a bill for the incorporation of a company to build a railway from Quebec to County Harbor, in the county of Guysboro, N. S. There is an apparently well-founded belief that this route is the one which Messrs. Mackenzie and Mann will take in order to reach the Atlantic seaboard. The acquisition of the Great Northern Railway enabled them to connect with Quebec, where they have a summer port. To obtain a winter port, it is now said they propose to build from Riviere du Loup on the Intercolonial Railway, almost in a straight line through the northern part of Maine and New Brunswick to Moncton, thence via New Glasgow, N. S., to County Harbor.

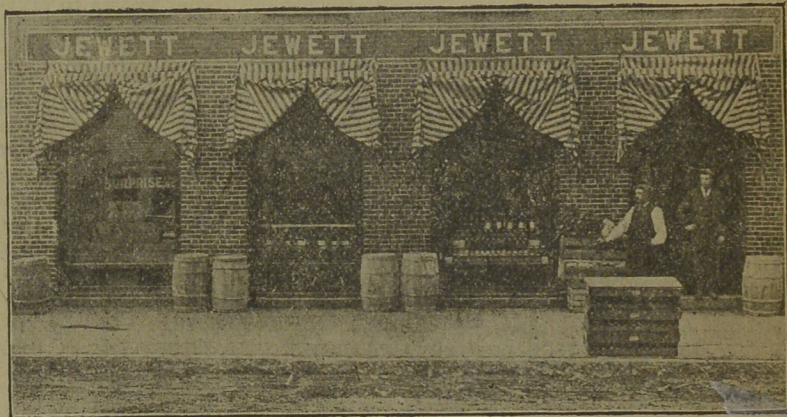
