Police Court.

An Editor Injured.

James Watts, editor of the Sentinel, Woodstock, while walking to his office on Friday morning was struck by a horse, driven by some unknown person, knocked down, and badly bruised. The driver did not stop to render any assistance. Mr. Watts is confined to his residence as a result of his injuries.

Ice Still Solid.

The water in the river rose a couple of inches last night but the ice so far as one can tell is quite solid, though black spots are beginning to make their appearance in places. It seems quite improbable that the ice will start before the expiration of another week at least. The ice has broken up at Perth and several other points up river, where the current is much stronger than in this section.

The U. N. B. men are Rideout, Lewin and Howe, and the debate will take place in this city.

Terrible Accident.

While blasting with dynamite at Fernhill cemetery, St. John, yesterday, W. J. Peacock sustained fearful injuries from an explosion. He undertook to heat the dynamite in a dinner kettle and was standing almost directly over it when the explosion occurred. He was frightfully mangled, and on being removed to the hospital it was found that his injuries consisted of terrible laceration of his hand, the braid covering exposed by a wound over the left temple, a penetrating wound in the chest, reaching to the lungs, and severe injury to his leg. His hand was amputated. Peacock was conscious and as well as could be expected this morning. He is 27 years old, married, and has two children.

A Large Funeral at Gibson.

The funeral of the late Silas Flowers was held at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon and was very largely attended, which shows in what high esteem the deceased was held by all who knew him, the cortege being the longest seen in Gibson for some time. There was a burial service at the house, conducted by Rev. W. R. Robinson, assisted by Rev. Mr. Trafton of Marysville, while the choir of the Calvin Baptist church rendered favorite hymns. The chief mourners were children of the deceased, Mrs. Robert Fulton, Mrs. John Akerly, St. John, Mrs. Joseph Roof, and the Misses Lillian and Alma Flowers; there were also four sons present, Richard, Herman, William and Charles, and Mr. and Mrs. Hughes of Marysville.

THE GUNTER CASE.

Plaintiff Recovers a Verdict for the Sum of \$150.

The jury in the case of John B. Gunter vs Samuel Miller, tried before Judge Wilson at the York county court, returned a verdict last evening in favor of the plaintiff for the sum of \$150. The action was brought for malicious prosecution, the defendant having had the plaintiff arrested at Hartland in 1901 for non-payment for an alleged debt of \$27, which he claimed Gunter owed him for his services as sub-agent of the San Life Assurance Company. Miller afterwards brought suit for the amount in the county court of Carleton County, and obtained a verdict. The defence set up, on behalf of Gunter at that trial was that if Miller had any claim it was really against the company and not against Gunter, but the jury took the opposite view. Mr. Gunter is appealing from the verdict to the Supreme Court.

In the case of Gunter vs. Miller, the trial of which has just been concluded, the jury took exactly the opposite view is that of the Carleton County jury, holding that it was the company who owed the \$27 to Miller and not the plaintiff, therefore the arrest of the latter in their opinion was an improper proceeding. They fixed the damages at \$150 or \$50 less than the amount sued for. It is quite certain that an appeal will be taken to the Supreme Court.

R. W. McLellan conducted the case for the plaintiff, and F. B. Carvill for the defendant.

A PLEASANT SOCIAL.

A man named Garfield Brewer belonging to Keswick, is undergoing treatment at the Victoria Hospital for a fracture of the right thigh, sustained about two months ago. He never had medical attendance prior to yesterday, and the bone not having been reset, the attending physician, Dr. G. J. McNally, has found the case a rather difficult one to handle. Last evening the patient was removed to the departmental building, where an X-Ray photograph was taken of the injured limb, the new apparatus lately purchased for the Victoria Hospital, being used. It was operated by H. D. White, G. N. Babbitt and Prof. Scott, Dr. McNally assisting them, and worked very satisfactorily. An excellent photograph showing the fracture very distinctly was obtained. The bone will have to be broken over and the ends drilled and wired together—a difficult operation.

A Native of York

Isaac Woodward Jonett, member of the large Boston grocery firm of Cobb, Bates & Yerxa, who died on March 11, was a native of York county. He was born in 1837 and is survived by a widow and five children. Another member of the firm, Hon. Henry D. Yerxa, is also a native of this county.
