THE RAILWAY BILL.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway bill has passed all the stages in the House of Commons, and when reprinted with the amendments, will be sent to the Senate for its approval, which we have no doubt will be extended in a generous manner.

The measure is practically the same as when introduced by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and its provisions meet with general approbation throughout the country, which recognizes the need of another transcontinental railway.

Various amendments were proposed in the Commons by the opposition, but they were more for the purpose of harassing the government and making political capital than to perfect the measure. The alternative proposition moved by Mr. Borden, has very few friends, and was mercilessly riddled by the Premier in his closing speech of the discussion. The Tory leader declines to be written down as opposed to another transcontinental road, but it was necessary from his political standpoint to oppose the government policy, which after all he has done in only a half hearted way. Mr. Borden, who was born and bred a good Liberal, in his heart believes that the government is doing right in pressing forward the railway enterprise, but unfortunately he has permitted himself to be led into a position of hostility to the Grand Trunk Pacific for party purposes.

The Tories are now engaged in making pathetic appeals to the members of the Senate to defeat the bill, but they will fall on deaf ears. The Senate is no longer a Tory machine, but a body well constituted to express the opinion of the country on public questions, and it will give the Grand Trunk measure the support it deserves, and without unnecessary delay the measure will pass the upper chamber, receive the governor general's assent and become law. Next season the greatest enterprise that has been inaugurated in Canada since the inception of the Canadian Pacific Railway will be started up, and within five years it is hoped that the new transcontinental railway will be running from ocean to ocean, colonizing the country, providing outlets for the ever increasing traffic and building up Canada beyond the most sanguine expectations.

In the big railway scheme New Brunswick has an important place. Nearly one-tenth of its entire mileage will be within this province, and its construction will be the means of giving New Brunswick a great impetus. Those who oppose the building of the road through this province are standing in the way of its progress, and their arguments will not be heeded by the people. New Brunswick, as a province, is far from satisfied with its present railway connections with the west. The great heart of the province the most important districts, are practically untouched by railways, and the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific will supply means of transportation, colonization and development, which must be attended with the most important results.

ILL ADVISED SNEERS.

The Moncton Transcript very naturally resents the Telegraph's sneers at its Liberal contemporaries who have criticized the S. John paper's frequent flops on the railway question. All the wisdom of the country, all the knowledge of public questions are not concentrated in the editorial chair of the Telegraph, whose occupant is only recently from New York, and is necessarily ignorant of Canadian public affairs. Add to this

fact that the Telegraph is controlled by a gentleman who is not even a resident of New Brunswick, and it will readily be seen how little authority that paper has to speak for the people of this province. The Telegraph's sneers at newspapers which pursue a consistent political course are in very bad taste, to say the least. There was a time when the Telegraph was a power in the land, when it was edited by men of experience and knowledge of political conditions, but the old Liberal organ has fallen on evil days, and people do not now take its opinion seriously.

The big churches of United States cities, able to pay large salaries to their pastors, are making serious inroads on the clerical talent of Canada. The latest Canadian clergyman to receive a flattering offer from across the border is Rev. Clarence McKinnon, Presbyterian of Sydney, N. S. A Chicago church wants him, and offers a salary of \$8,000. Mr. McKinnon is a very able and eloquent preacher, and the offer is a very flattering one.

The fall fairs are blessed with beautiful weather and other favorable conditions. Fredericton, Woodstock, Chatham, Sussex and Sackville have held successful exhibitions, and the interest and attendance at all of them have been most satisfactory, showing that exhibitions are popular with the people. Nobody denies the educative tendencies of the exhibitions, and no doubt they will continue to draw crowds.

The electors of St. Mary's division of Montreal have unanimously invited Mr. Tarte to resign, but the ex-minister declines to give up his seat in parliament. There is one consolation however for the electors. Mr. Tarte will not seek re-election in St. Marys. He knows better than to try it.

The first session of the inquest on the bodies of the three persons drowned in the David Weston disaster was held yesterday at Glenwood, Kings Co., but no startling developments were made. The enquiry will be resumed next week.

The band of the Coldstream Guards, which has been making a tour of the upper provinces, arrived at St. John this afternoon and was given a very hearty reception.

The presence of Canadian troops at Sault Ste. Marie has restored order and the military are being sent home.

Governor Jones of Nova Scotia was seventy-nine years old Monday, but is still an active and energetic man.

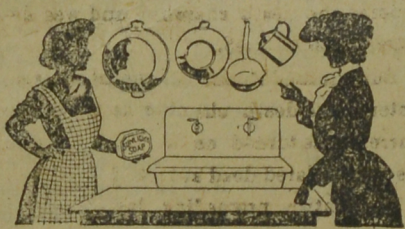

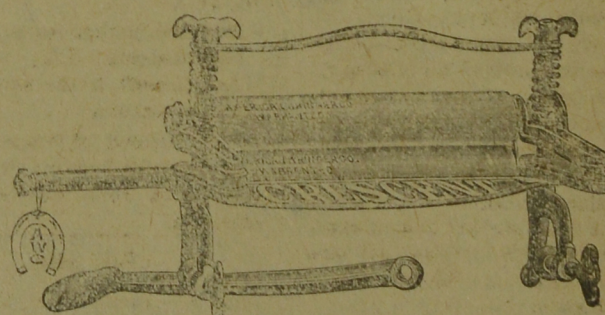
