W. E. Henley, who has just died, at the age of 54, was recognized for many years as a foremost journalist, poet, dramatist and essayist, a leader in the literary life of London. He was editor of The Scots Observer, The National Observer and of The New Review. He was a protégé of Robert Louis Stevenson. He began life as a laborer, unconscious of latent intellectual power, unversed in the primary elements of education, and a man of dissipated habits. He met with a terrible accident, both lower limbs being crushed beneath a boulder. While in a hospital for treatment he met Robert Louis Stevenson, also a patient in the institution. Then commenced the mental existence, which has led him through the stages of newspaper correspondent, art editor and magazine

contributor, to the rank of poet. His limbs remained paralyzed, and he did all of his work in an invalid chair, out of this towered his massive blonde head, set on a magnificent pair of shoulders. He was noted as a brilliant conversationalist, and was the centre of a coterie of the cleverest literary men in England. Much of his verse was characterized by that dominating, conquering spirit now called Imperialism, as the above selection shows.

FOR THE MOTORISTS.

Sketch of the Man Who Recommends Shotguns for Them.

Sir Ralph Payne-Gallwey, Bart., who has been recommending recourse to shot-guns against offending motorists, says The London Star, knows what he is talking about, for he is the author of those two volumes of "Letters to Young Shooters," which give more practical information on this subject than any like work. He is himself a first-rate sportsman and a good shot, who could be relied upon to bring down a scorching flying. He has been declared the best living authority on wild-fowl shooting, and, though he is a little prejudiced against shooting over dogs, it is clear he has no objection to knocking over a motor-maniac. He is the grandson of that General Sir William Payne-Gallwey who commanded the heavy cavalry at Talavera, and the son of Sir William, who represented Thirsk for a period of more than thirty years. His mother's father was Sir Robert Frankland-Russell, M.P., the seventh Baronet of Thirkleby, whose predecessors occupied their Yorkshire lands for three centuries, and intermarried with the family of Cromwell. He himself was born in 1848, and went from Eton into the Rifle Brigade. He had an uncle who shot eighteen elephants in one day. What a bag he would have made among the big motor cars down the Brighton road on a fine Sunday!

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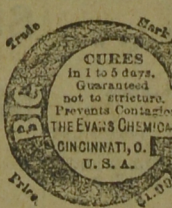
