

CANADA'S PLACE IN BRITISH TRADE.

**Increases Sure to Follow
if Only Best is Sent to**

MARKETS IN ENGLAND.

**Mr. E. Goff Penny, ex-M.P.,
Talks of the Changes.**

**CANADIANS, HE SAYS, SHOULD UNDER-
STAND THE VALUE OF**

**First-Class Articles and Supply That
Demand.**

Strong and healthy after his two years residence abroad, Mr. E. Goff Penny, ex-M. P., of Montreal, returned Sunday from Great Britain, and he comes back to Canada more enthusiastic than ever about the Dominion. When seen shortly after his arrival, Mr. Penny said to The Herald that he was much impressed with the remarkably increased interest taken now in the United Kingdom in respect to Canada, even as compared with the situation when he reached London two years ago, although that was subsequent to the valor that was displayed by the Canadian contingents in South Africa. The importance of Canada as an integral part of the British Empire seemed to have dawned but to some extent upon the average English mind, and one had to look with some care through the London papers from day to day to find even a scrap of cable news from Canada.

CANADIAN NEWS IN ENGLAND.

Things, however, have changed vastly since then. Not one of the great English dailies can now be perused without finding special news by cable from the Dominion. One of the leading papers in London has a separate department, entitled "Greater Britain," and in this column from day to day there can always be found several items of interest to Canadian readers. The interest is not confined to Canadian readers; one has only to come in contact with club life, with the train loads of business and professional men on their way to the city in the mornings, to find colonial items of news occupying no second place in their attention.

The particular subject in connection with the prominent position which Canada now occupies in London upon which Mr. Penny took occasion to express a strong opinion was that he thought the Minister of the Interior deserved the heartiest thanks from the entire Canadian public for his judgment and enterprise in securing offices in the vicinity of Trafalgar Square for the Emigration branch of his department.

CANADA HAS FIRST PLACE.

Mr. Penny said that not only are the offices most favorably situated with a view to secure the direct attention of the vast crowds which have occasion to pass that thoroughfare every day, but that the fittings and general business aspect of the offices are such as must necessarily give Canada a first place in the consideration of the British dependencies among the English people. There are few offices, if any, more business like in their general management, and all this has been attained by the introduction of everything Canadian in fitting up the office. The heating apparatus, so simple and effective in its character, has made it a subject of remark in London that the only comfortable premises during the uncertain weather of March and April were the Canadian offices at Charing Cross. The English architects speak of the effectiveness, simplicity and economy of the Canadian heating appliances, to say nothing of the taste that has been displayed in the selection of the Canadian woods in which the offices are furnished, all of which cannot but be the means of giving Canada an advertisement that is worth far more than the expenditure entailed.

THINGS AT THE OFFICES.

Mr. Penny says that in repeated visits

he paid to the Charing Cross offices he found every evidence of up-to-date methods and undoubted interest in the question more immediately coming under the attention of the officials in the office, that of emigration to Canada. In addition to which he always found not only a large number interested in the grain exhibits in the windows, but always a large number in the office being attended to by the officials in giving personal information respecting the development and prospects in Canada.

Mr. Penny is convinced that the expenditure made under the authority of the Minister of the Interior in this particular is money well spent. In connection with the premises at Charing Cross, Mr. Penny was particularly pleased to find that a room had been furnished which is to be at the service of members of the government who might be in London from time to time, where, without the worry of hotel life, they would be able to transact their business free from the annoyances which naturally attach to an attempt to do business in hotels and clubs.

OUR TRADE AND COMMERCE.

Mr. Penny found a surprisingly active interest in the desirability of an extension of trade and commerce with Canada among what might be known as the larger business circles. He found on all sides an eagerness to purchase Canadian goods. In this connection, Mr. Penny is assured that if the people of Canada could realize the enormous possibilities for the expansion of Canadian commerce in London alone no effort would be left undone, in respect to natural products or certain kinds of manufactures, to cultivate the British market. But to do this, Canada must remember that nothing but the best quality of goods should be placed on the English market. There should be the most rigid inspection to avoid the possibility of mistake on this question, by government officers upon this side of the Atlantic, and if those who might be somewhat indifferent and slipshod in their methods would co-operate with the government in this particular, he is perfectly satisfied that there would be an enormous increase in the trade and commerce.

BRITISHERS WANT THE BEST.

The Englishman is willing to pay the highest price for what he wants, but he wants nothing but the best. New Zealand butter is already a staple commodity on the English market, and it is no common occurrence to hear at one of the provision counters of some great establishment like the army and navy or Bakers, a customer asking for New Zealand butter.

Australian apples are now competing with Canadian in the London market.

Mr. Penny says that if butter can be brought from New Zealand and placed on the English markets so as to become a desideratum for a British breakfast table, there is no reason why the same course should not exist regarding the Canadian product. To attain that end it is necessary that Canadians should thoroughly understand the value a first-class article has on the English market, and then make every effort to supply that demand, and that, he is satisfied, could very easily be done.

Mr. Penny is also satisfied in regard to immigration and trade with Great Britain, that the opportunities were never as they are today.

when she came home, a dog that always followed Mr. Gilmour, would not leave her alone until he got her to follow him to the attic of the house where she found her husband stone dead, with a rifle by his side and a bullet through his head. A doctor was sent for and gave a report of accidental death.

Although the exact way in which Mr. Gilmour met his death will never be made clear, as no human eye saw it, still the theory is that he was arranging to go fishing and that while he was putting down his tackle, it came in contact with his Lee-Netford sporting rifle and the bullet blew the top of his head off.

Although the servants were in the kitchen, they did not hear the shot. Deceased leaves a widow but no family.

CHAMBERLAIN'S NAME

**Is in Everybody's Mouth Since His Famous
Speech—Empire's New Policy.**

Montreal, May 19.—A special cable to the Star says: The new policy of Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain is the sensation of Europe.

Speaking generally the ministerialist journals throughout the country applaud Chamberlain's programme. The Times has another editorial echoing Canadian appreciation of the imperial largeness of Chamberlain's conceptions.

German telegrams indicate that a profound impression has been made. Leading Berlin journals are awaiting official inspiration, but the other journals forecast a political and commercial upheaval, the issue of which is impossible to foresee. They plead that Germany has no desire for a tariff war with Canada.

English liberal journals with a few imperialist exceptions, attack Mr. Chamberlain and quote against him the British blue book, issued today, showing that Britain imported last year merchandise of the value of £421,000,000 and colonial merchandise of a value of only £106,000,000. They argue that Chamberlain proposes to penalize four-fifths for the benefit of the fifth.

The Westminster Gazette deprecates Chamberlain's attitude as inevitably making colonial questions subject to partisan strife in the motherland.

The Chronicle says:—It looks as if Mr. Chamberlain wished to open negotiations with the colonies in view of his elevation to the prime ministership.

The Daily News argues that Mr. Chamberlain is already in open revolt from the government and must resign.

The St. James' Gazette urges that every unionist association throughout the United Kingdom organize an electorate support of Mr. Chamberlain.

No one doubts here but that Mr. Chamberlain is sketching his own electoral programme. The question is whether the ministry will ultimately assent [despite Mr. Balfour's present hesitation, or whether Mr. Chamberlain

will start the campaign on his own accord.

Ottawa, May 19.—In the house, yesterday Mr. Sproule interrogated the government as to Chamberlain's speech, in which he referred to the offer of Canada to extend further concessions to Great Britain and the desire of the motherland to protect the colonies from foreign nations.

Hon. Mr. Fielding replied that all information on the former point had been brought down in the budget, and there had been no recent correspondence on Germany's attitude towards Canada.

Mr. Charlton asked what course the government would follow in case the threats to dump German criminals in Canada were carried into effect.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier stated that no official information had been received as to Germany's intentions. If it was sought to send criminals to this country prompt action would be taken to exclude them. Under the present laws the government had power to meet the situation.

ROBBED OF \$10,000

**August Belmont New York
Millionaire the Victim.**

**THE SECOND BUTLER, THE
THIEF, ARRESTED.**

**Man Has Been in Country
Only Ten Days.**

New York, May 19.—Charged with stealing jewels and silver worth \$10,000 from August Belmont's country place, Blenton Manor, Hempstead, L. I., George Reynolds, recently engaged as second butler, is locked up at Police headquarters.

Reynolds, after his arrest, was amazed at the rapidity with which things move in this country. He had been here less than ten days. During that time he had obtained employment at Blenton Manor, learned where the jewels and silver were kept, stole a large quantity of them, his theft had been discovered within a few hours and he was arrested before he had fairly begun to dispose of his loot.

In appearance Reynolds is a typical English man-servant. He gave promise of being a model servant, never allowing his interest in the affairs of the household to lag. He was punctual in his work, attending to all duties with great care.

He went Friday to the head butler and obtained permission to come to New York on the pretext that there had been some delay in the arrival of his clothing from England and that he wanted to learn where the trouble was. He had no difficulty in getting permission to visit the city and walked down to the railroad station, a short distance away.

In preparing for dinner the head butler discovered that 170 pieces of silver, worth \$5,000 were missing. He immediately suspected Reynolds and an investigation was begun. This showed that a small box in which Mr. Belmont kept four pearl studs valued at \$5,000 also was missing, together with valuable papers.

The facts were brought to the attention of Mr. Belmont who telephoned to Inspector McClusky. Shortly after 6 p. m. the Inspector assigned Detectives Boyle and Charlton on the case. They were instructed particularly to watch a saloon near Broadway and thirty-fourth street, which is known as a gathering place for butlers. There they learned that a man answering Reynolds' description was in a neighboring pawnshop trying to get money on some silver.

The detectives went there, entered into negotiations with the stranger and went back with Reynolds to the saloon to inspect more of the silver he had for sale. There they found a bag containing the silver, pearls and the private papers.

Reynolds was arrested. At Police headquarters he admitted his identity. Word of his arrest was sent to Mr. Belmont and the banker's secretary went yesterday morning to Police Headquarters identified the valuables and also identified Reynolds as the man who had been given employment at Blenton Manor.

Inspector McClusky believes that the prisoner sought employment merely for the purpose of robbery, although he added that Reynolds is not known to the police here.

Reynolds was arraigned in Jefferson Market Court, and on the request of the detectives was remanded until Monday, when his examination will take place.
